ST MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS CHURCH

Not really my cup of tea!

How do you like your tea? What sort of books do you read? What kinds of music do you like to listen to? Which TV programmes or films do you prefer to watch? What's your favourite colour?

The choices available to us in these and any other areas of our lives are as endless as our preferences. If we don't like something, we might say, 'that's really not my cup of tea'.

Take prayer and praying for example. Prayer is the essential element of any gathering in a 'church' setting, wherever it is and whoever is leading it. Unlike tea, or music, or TV programmes, there is really only one essential element of prayer: it's simply a conversation with God, focusing on any sort of problem or issue that concerns us (or others) at any particular time. But as with any other activity we are able to *choose* how we do it. We might prefer to pray openly and publicly in a



worship setting, or we might sometimes prefer to be alone. We might pray out loud, or pray silently. We might make up our own prayers, or we might prefer to say a prayer written or spoken by someone else (the Lord's Prayer, for instance).

Wherever and whatever we pray, the options and variations are endless, just like our particular preferences for anything else. And of course there are people who feel that prayer really isn't *their* cup of tea. But I wonder how many of us actually pray without realising we're doing it? How often do we say, 'oh my God' when we feel angry, or frustrated, or anxious? Isn't *that* prayer too?

Just as there are four main types of tea*, there are four stages of prayer:

Pause: just stop thinking about what's going on around you;

Reflect: focus you mind, think carefully about what is really bothering you and why you feel the need to pray;

Ask: just talk to God. Even if you can't see him, he is listening, whatever we say and wherever we are;

Yield: just be patient and open to what God has to say in answer. It may not be what you hope for or expect, but there *will* be an answer.

PRAY. Just like that! Try it, it's so easy, and God will *always* listen. It's *everybody's* cup of tea! *Revd Gary Williamson*

BAT BOXES - and some batty facts!

Four new bat boxes have been placed in the churchyard, in an oak and a horse chestnut tree. Trees on the field boundary were chosen because bats navigate using straight lines, eg field hedges and guttering on high walls. They have been kept away from the church to prevent flying bats constantly triggering the security lights and to avoid the build up of droppings on walls and the church garden.

All four boxes are at the height recommended by the Bat Conservation Trust and they face south to maximise internal day time temperatures.

The PCC would like to thank Michelle and her team from the Tree Care Company for installing the bat boxes in the churchyard. Why not take a dusk stroll to see if you can spot of the results of their efforts?.

Did you know?

• Bats are not blind but most have poor night-vision (a bit like humans) so they rely on echolocation to navigate, hunt and 'see' the world.

• A tiny pipistrelle can eat up to 3,000 insects in a night.

 Plants adapted to be pollinated by bats give us dates, vanilla, bananas, breadfruit, guavas, iroko timber, balsa wood, sisal, Tequila and chewing gum!

• Bats are more closely related to humans than they are to mice.

• Bats usually only have one baby a year and can live for up to 30 years

We've heard a lot recently about affordable housing, so everyone was very excited to see some rather smart new homes in the trees in the churchyard. But who would be lucky enough to live there? The mice looked up wistfully at the cosy homes, but they knew they could never climb that high. So that left the birds and the squirrels to squabble over residency, which soon led to a bit of a scuffle. But the boxes were very small and strangely flat so, squeeze as they might, neither the squirrels nor the birds could force their way inside. So who were they for? A few nights later the new owners moved in. They were very small, but they were not mice. They were furry, but they were not squirrels, and they flew, but they were not birds. Yes, we have four new families of bats as neighbours! I wonder what mischief they will get up to? *Yellow Rabbit*

ECO-TIP: keeping water butts fresh in summer

Summer is here and, in spite of a very wet winter, you can bet there will still be a water shortage. Collecting rainwater means that you can use it to clean muddy bikes and boots as well as watering plants, though do make sure that wildlife has something they can use as an escape ladder to climb out. If you can't cover your water containers to keep out breeding insects, make sure you clean them regularly and, if rain is due it can be helpful to completely empty any remaining water in the bottom of the butt onto the



ground, to get rid of out any mosquito larvae or eggs lurking there. They can't survive out of water, the butt can fill with fresh, mozzy free rain, and the damp ground will absorb the rain more effectively than ground which has been baked in the sun!

MAY GARDENING TIPS from Wellie

Pinch out tips of new growth on figs at the end of month, when the shoots have five leaves. Stop cutting asparagus now and topdress with a general purpose fertilizer. Regularly pinch out side shoots of cordon tomatoes. Summer prune gooseberries. Sow salad crops at two week intervals. Plant out pumpkins and squashes, put straw around strawberries.

Clip box and privet hedges, but check there are no



birds nesting. Prune spring flowering shrubs such as wiegela and philadelphus. Dead-head and cut back oriental poppies after flowering to stimulate new foliage
