... I Was That Smart Officer.

When I joined Northumberland County Constabulary in February 1966, I should have realised that Traffic Control and Point Duty were going to play a significant role in my subsequent 30 yrs of service.

My Initial 13 week Induction Course, took place at RAF Dishforth in North Yorkshire. The Home Office at that time, had taken an option on Dishforth to create a new Police Training Centre, and to keep their option open needed to fill a course as soon as possible. Consequently, when I became a member of Syndicate 3B, at Dishforth, I was one of only five other coppers from the North East. The rest of the two syndicates, 3A and B were made up of guys from Forces from all over the country who had been taken away from their own Training Centres, to make up the numbers at Dishforth. As part of our contribution to the grand Passing Off Parade, held in one of the hangars, we provided a display of "Traffic Signals to the Motorist" as a drill movement. Equipped with white cotton gloves, and elbow length white sleeves, (just as you would have seen in a Highway Code of the day) we made a splendid sight. I should have realised then, that this was going to haunt me forever.

First posting, was at Blyth. A vey busy station in those far off times: a bustling town with heavy industry, mines, a thriving (yes, it was then) fishing fleet, docks and harbour, and the shipyard. At 12 noon every weekday, on 1 Beat, there was a Traffic Point on the Main Street at the junction with Bowes Street, to get the shipyard raffic off Main Street and turned right, against the flow onto Bowes Street, and away home for their lunch, and whatever else they may have felt like getting up to for an hour! Talk about a "Life Threatening Experience"

The Shipyard Traffic comprised solely of pedal cycles in various forms of disguise. One thing they all had in common, without exception, was their total lack of brakes. There wasn't only one or two of these hungry stevedores either - there were hundreds of them! It only took about ten minutes, tops, to see them away, but you had to be seen on the point. As in any situation, there was always some public spirited type who would notice the non-attendance of the Pointsman and make it his business to let the supervision know.

So my career progressed.

No matter where you were stationed in the county, there always seemed to be a Traffic Point needing attention. I must have waved my arms about, demonstrating my skilled, Drill Standard Traffic Signals, to motorists, at Point-to-Point meetings, ship launches and innumerable other events. Following the subsequent amalgamations of all North East Forces, to eventually form Northumbria Police, I progressed to performing in the Big City, on Special Duties at Football Matches! The Big Time!

I wouldn't dream of putting myself in the same class as the likes of Arthur Aitken, he who controlled the traffic at the end of Jesmond Road at Barras Bridge. He was a legend. All on his own, he kept the traffic flowing without the need for lights and signals, and was very highly thought of by the motoring public. As I understand it, he was once invited to Oslo in Norway to perform traffic duty in that city as part of some civic exchange. I would also not put myself in the same league as the guys who manned the crossing on Blackett Street at the rear entrance to Fenwick's.

During these times, I also had occasion to be asked to experiment and try out various devices, dreamed up, one can only imagine by the police equivalent of "Q", to help with these onerous tasks. I can recall two in particular.

For duty at Gosforth Greyhound Stadium, which if you don't know, was on the main A1 road where it ran past what is now an Asda Store opposite Gosforth TA Centre, some Brainbox had dreamed up an old ex-County helmet, with a flashing blue light superimposed on the top of it, powered by an extremely heavy and cumbersome battery which ran down your back and was clipped to your belt. I recall that the local Intelligentsia used to shout "Hey Dr Who" at the unfortunate wearer.

The other one which rapidly was kicked into touch, was for use on the Traffic Point on match days at Stanhope Street Foot outside The Black Bull. This was a sort of bandolier which was worn over one shoulder and had a series of flashing blue lights that chased each other along the thing. "Torchy Torchy The Battery Boy" was the humorous merry repartee handed out to the unfortunate wearing this one!

The only good idea, dreamt up by one of my Senior Officers, in relation to Traffic Points, occurred at a Football Match I attended at Berwick. Berwick Rangers had drawn Glasgow Rangers in one of the Scottish Cup Ties, and fortunately Gold Command erred on the side of overkill to protect Berwick Towns citizenry. At some stage during the afternoon of this busy day, a Superintendent, no less, spotted me and another cop on "Standby" at the Pringle wool factory, which had been commandeered as the temporary Incident Control. The other cop happened to be Joe Harkness, the Stamfordham Polis of the day. He detailed the two of us to go and acquire a Personnel Carrier from the Car Pool. He then got hold of a hot water urn and a supply of Maxpac drinks (they were plastic cups allegedly containing dehydrated refreshing fruit drinks), and sent us off around all the Traffic Points in Berwick to relieve the guys on duty and let them have ten minutes in the van for a smoke and a hot drink. In all sincerity, I thought that that was quite a good bit of Man Management on his part. But now we come to the pinnacle of my Traffic Point career.

We look forward to the second part of John's saga next month.

Stamfordham Parish Council - A Parking Issue

It has come to the Parish Council's attention about inappropriate parking along North Side (The Green) whereby vehicles are being parked at an angle to the road, as opposed to being parked in a straight line.

Parking a vehicle at an angle onto the grass is causing the verge to become excessively eroded, and also the body of the grass on the green becoming damaged. There have been several incidents where vehicles have protruded further onto the road at an angle – this being particularly noticeable along the middle part of North Side. This has caused obstructions, not only for larger vehicles, as in the Refuse Collection vehicle, and also the possibility of an ambulance or fire engine unable to gain access. Some vehicles have been parked onto the grass in a dangerous way whereby they are facing down the slope. Human and mechanical error on occasions do occur, the hand-brake can fail and if not correctly applied can result in a vehicle moving down the hill and causing an accident. Refraining from parking in this manner will remove the risk of an accident occurring.

It is the Parish Council's request that all residents along North Side refrain from parking their vehicles in the manner described and to park in an orderly and considerate manner straight along the side of the road, thus avoiding any damage to the grass, verge and causing obstruction.

The Council appreciate that there are now more cars and vehicles per household along North Side and this has caused problems with lack of parking space. When this occurs residents along North Side have on many occasions used the lay-bay adjacent to the Village Hall and those on the western edge, have parked in the area near the Bay Horse

The Council would appreciate all residents heeding this request. For those who may need some reminding, photographs of offending vehicles will be included in the next Stamfordham Communicator.



Stamfordham Parish Council Minutes of Meeting held in the Village Hall at 7.30pm on Thursday 18th January 2018

- **1. Apologies for absence** There were no apologies for absence.
- 2. To confirm the Minutes of the meeting held on 16th November 2017 The minutes were agreed as a true record.
- 3. To confirm the Minutes of the extraordinary meeting held on 4th January 2018 The minutes were agreed as a true record.
- **4. Matters arising from the Minutes, not otherwise on the Agenda** Clerk had emailed British Telecom regarding public telephone box cleansing and possibility it would close, and would follow this up.
- 5. Planning Matters: Amended Application received: 17/01950/OUT, land west of Stannerton House. Applications Approved: Mr W Crichton, land north west of 25 The Oval, one No dwelling; 17/04040/FUL: Dr K Duffield, North Lough Farm Cottage construction of two storey rear extension to provide additional bedrooms and study; 17/04649/FUL: Mr & Mrs Nicholson, construction of single storey rear and two storey side extension, Herondale, 22 Grange Road, Stamfordham supported
- **6. Benches** Replacement benches could be of recyclable material, however wood is more appealing. Prices had been secured, and benches that require replacement to be confirmed. Clerk to provide photographs of recyclable benches in Rothbury.
- 7. Financial Matters Expenditure Authorisation: D Stanley 184 £89.79; D Stanley 185 £64.96
 To discuss request from Ponteland Town Council for bus service subsidy

 Annual request had been received from Ponteland Town Council regarding the PC subsidising the Saturday Evening Bus Service 74, and it was agreed to contribute £400 to the service. Improvements to rural issues regarding transport could be available in the future.

8. County Councillor's Report

- Tree had been trimmed at Grange Road.
- Planning permission had been granted for Ponteland school/leisure complex.
- Community Chest funding open for community groups to apply.
- County Council budget being finalised, despite year on year cuts to council, funding sources have increased to the council, with balancing available to budget with no major cuts.

- Northumberland County Council Pharmacy Needs Assessment (PHA) Consultation
- Acknowledgement of grant received from Great North Air Ambulance
- North of Tyne Devolution Governance Review Consultation devolution to bring in £20 million per year over 30 years, with Northumberland to receive education funding

10. Proposed closure of Stamfordham Surgery, 12 Grange Road

The Parish Council regret the decision the surgery is to close on 31/3/18. PPG meeting scheduled for 14/2/18 where questions can be asked regarding future arrangements. Correspondence had been received from person attending the surgery who was confused to the issue being of NHS funding and finding insufficient doctors to stay with the practice, as the list of doctors at the practice had increased recently. They believe the surgery is a wonderful service and well appointed, with these comments echoed even by patients from Ponteland who choose the practice as their preferred option. It is certainly an important village amenity worthy of any support that can be mustered with the authorities responsible and would be happy to promote its continuity. However, the Parish Council agreed it was ultimately the White Group's decision to close the surgery.

11. Annual Review of Risk Assessment It was agreed the Risk Assessment was acceptable for the current needs of Stamfordham Parish council

12. Other business admitted by the Chairman as urgent

• **Parking** along North side of concern with vehicles parking at an angle, which would lead to churning up the grass verges, with some vehicles causing an obstruction. It is becoming habit forming, and it was agreed an

article should be placed in the Communicator, with Cllr Sharp to compile with the addition of photographic evidence.

- No **road signage** reported for Stamfordham at Dalton road end, at T junction, turning left at Limestone Lane, which is within Ponteland Town Council. County Cllr Jones to report.
 - Accident had occurred at school with refreshment of road signage required.


