SCOTS GAP MEDICAL GROUP FLU CLINIC

for patients registered at Scots Gap and Stamfordham Practice

Flu season 2020 is nearly upon us and we're coming to a village hall near you!

After extensive planning we are ready to book eligible patients (over 65, pregnant, certain long term conditions, carers) into our 2020 flu clinics. We have had to make changes in our usual flu clinic arrangements to protect patients and staff according to COVID guidelines. Flu appointments will not be available at either of our surgery sites, unless you have a face to face appointment already prearranged with a clinician. **This year we are planning our flu clinics to take place within local village halls.** We would like to sincerely thank all the village hall committee members for their support and making this plan achievable.

The dates and locations are –

Stamfordham Village Hall - 5th October Cambo Village Hall - 13th October Middleton & Todridge Village Hall –12th October Kirkwhelpington Village Hall - 19th October Elsdon Village Hall – TBC

Please can you observe the following guidance to protect us all:

- Do not attend if you are unwell or have any of the COVID symptoms.
- Only patient with appointments will be seen (no walk-ins). This is for flu vaccination only. If you wish to discuss anything with the clinicians this must be arranged at another time.
- Please wait outside or in car until schedule appointment time. Appointment times are staggered to ensure minimum people in the village hall as possible.
- On entering the building a mask in mandatory and use the hand gel provided.
- Tell the receptionist at the entrance that you have arrived.
- We will have a one way system in place so please adhere to this.
- Wear clothing that ensures left arm is easily accessible.
- Come alone if possible or with household member if they are also receiving a flu vaccination.

If you do not wish to have your flu vaccination please could you let the surgery know by telephoning or emailing us at norccg.scotsgapsurgeryadmin@nhs.net. This means we can give that vaccine to another person.

Patients aged 2 - 17 years who are eligible for flu vaccination will be contacted and an appointment will be made at the surgery.

50-64 year olds will be included in this year's flu vaccination program. Please note that people in the **50-64 year old age group will not be vaccinated until November and December, providing there is sufficient vaccine, and no appointments will be offered for this age group until then.** This is to ensure that those who are most at risk are vaccinated first. If you are 50-64 and you are in one of the other groups eligible for the flu vaccination, for example you have a health condition which puts you at risk from the flu, you will be invited earlier.

New Traffic Restrictions in and around Stamfordham



Residents will be aware of the new double yellow lines around Stamfordham Primary School. Northumberland County Council also propose to introduce new speed restrictions in and around the village. Dave Stanley has kindly summarised the (slightly complex) detail of the highways order:

"Using the original 30mph signs as reference:

20 mph limit is for everywhere in the village, including all side roads, within those 30mph signs. EXCEPT

30mph remains in all of Dark Lane and Hawkwell;

40mph is introduced starting at the existing 30 signs and outwards: on the Matfen Road to just past the entrance to Mainsbank; on the Heugh Bank to about the end of the lay-by just beyond Chapel Farm entrance; on the Whittle Dean road to just past the Playing Field and on the Newcastle road to just beyond Lane House."

From the County Council...

Council scheme extended to 15,000 free trees

A pioneering new initiative launched by the council has received phenomenal response from residents, schools and community groups in Northumberland.

Northumberland County Council is one of the first local authorities in the country to launch a scheme that works with its own residents to help tackle climate change through planting more trees.

The scheme, which offers residents, schools and community groups the chance to claim free trees to plant on their own premises, received a flurry of orders, with tree bookings reaching capacity in just four days.

Cllr Glen Sanderson, cabinet member for Environment and Local Services, said: "The public's response to this scheme has been absolutely amazing, with thousands of our residents showing their support to tackle climate change.

"Because of this we're delighted to extend the scheme to offer an additional 5,000 trees to our residents, schools and communities across Northumberland."

Nine different species of trees are available, which are suitable for small, medium and large gardens, with hedge, copse or native harvest packs available for schools and community groups.

Residents that do not have areas where they can plant a tree will be offered a small cell grown shrub which they can plant in their own container and will be suitable for properties with limited garden space, balconies or rented properties.

Collection points are currently being established, but will open in Autumn/Winter and will follow social distancing guidance and be held in easily accessible areas to help minimise residents' travel and reduce their carbon footprints.

The trees are small cell grown plants, sourced from the UK and provided along with a biodegradable shelter guard, cane and an electronic link to planting and aftercare instructions.

The free trees are being offered on a 'first come, first served basis' and once all of the available trees have been ordered, the Council will then just take contact details for anyone applying for a free tree who will receive priority when the scheme is launched again next year.

Time limited browsing offered in some libraries

Northumberland Library members will now be able to browse for a new book as the service introduces time limited browsing at some of its libraries.

From this week time limited browsing will be available at Rothbury, Bellingham and Wooler libraries with further libraries offering the service in coming weeks.

Customers will have 15 minutes to browse and make their own selection. At smaller libraries, where space is more restricted, members who are concerned are advised to contact their library prior to their visit to discuss social distancing measures in place.

Family groups will be admitted as one unit but members are again asked to bear in mind the size of their local library and to avoid disappointment, ring ahead to discuss their visit with staff. Children must be accompanied by an adult.

The Select and Collect service continues to be available at Amble, Alnwick, Bedlington, Berwick, Blyth, Haltwhistle, Hexham, Morpeth, Ponteland and Prudhoe.

Again members can request books either by contacting their local library or via the <u>mylibrary.co.uk</u> website. They will then be allocated a date and time to collect their requested books.

If a specific book which has been requested is not available staff will choose a similar option. The service also includes children's books.

Books can be returned without a pre-arranged appointment, although members are advised to contact the library in advance to ensure this facility is available. Books which are returned are quarantined for 72 hours.

Cllr Cath Homer, cabinet member for library services at Northumberland County Council said: "Time limited browsing is the next step in our phased approach to being able to offer physical library services to our members.

"We have had some fantastic feedback from members about the select and collect service and we hope that the time limited browsing will further support members.

"For those members who are not able to, or do not wish to access these physical services, we continue to offer a comprehensive digital offer with our online library giving members access to hundreds of ebooks and audiobooks. We are also continuing with our home library service for those more vulnerable members of the community."

Library service offers digital helpline for all

Northumberland Libraries is now offering a digital helpline for anyone who is struggling with IT at home.

Members of the public can now request a call back from staff to help with anything from getting online to setting up an email account or accessing digital books to read or listen to.

The Digital Helpline is open Mon-Thurs 8.30am-5pm and Fri 8.30am-4.30pm. All help is free, private and done by staff and is open to all public, not just library members.

A member of the team will call you back once you have requested a call back appointment. They can help with:

- Getting online (connecting to existing WiFi at home)
- Using the internet.
- Setting up a free email account.
- Accessing free digital books to read or listen to.
- Supporting access to all digital NHS services.
- Setting up Zoom, Skype and other video chats.
- Online shopping.
- Troubleshooting other basic problems.

Call 0345 600 6400 or fill out an <u>online form</u> to request help. If you're not already a member of the library and would like to access the digital library from home you can still sign up at <u>mylibrary.co.uk</u> and start accessing hundreds of eBooks, eAudio and eMagazines today.

Library recipe book launched for Macmillan Coffee morning

When staff at Northumberland Libraries realised they wouldn't be able to host their annual Macmillan Coffee morning this year they decided to come up with another way of raising money for the charity. Staff from libraries across the county have submitted their favourite recipes which has now been turned into an e-Book. The e-Book is available to download for free on BorrowBox, the library service's digital library. Any member downloading the recipe book will be asked to give a donation to Macmillan Cancer Support via <u>www.macmillan.org.uk/donate</u> The tried and tested family favourites include everything from warming soups to delicious sweet treats like buttermilk scones and a coconut and lemon cake.

There is also a gluten free Rainbow cake and quick tea ideas like lamb kofta kebabs and bacon and chorizo frittata. Macmillan has also added their own recipe for a Sticky Toffee Cake. Lorraine Bewick, Senior Library Assistant at Blyth Library who came up with the idea said: "We were really disappointed when we realised that we wouldn't be able to host our Macmillan Coffee morning this year, as it's always such a lovely event which people from the community enjoy coming along to. "So, we got our heads together and came up with the idea of this recipe book which would allow people to continue to support the charity from their home, whilst getting a few nice, new recipe ideas at the same time. "It is available for anyone who has an online library account and we are asking people to make a small donation to Macmillan Cancer Support when they download it."
