Quarry Plans Take Centre Stage at Public Meeting

MORE than 40 concerned villagers attended a public meeting in the Village Centre to discuss an on-going Cambrian Quarry planning application.

ASH, formerly Alan's Skip Hire, are seeking permission to fill the quarry, over a period of years, with inert materials and carry out recycling processes on the site.

The proposed works would see up to 150 HGV movements per day coupled with increased traffic movement onto the busy A494 at the Glyndwr Road junction.

Residents heard from the chair of Gwernymynydd Community Council, Marjorie Thompson, who gave a detailed update with regard to amendments made to the previously submitted plans.

She told residents: "There are many issues which the community council have tried to address such as the potential for excessive dust, the proposed working hours at the site, disturbance to wildlife, including the resident bat population, as well as the issue of noise and vibrations from crusher machines.

"Then of course we have to look at the huge increase in traffic. Community councillors believe further lorry traffic through the village is simply not acceptable and there has not been a proper traffic assessment completed.

"For these, and a number of other reasons, the community council has asked that the views and objections of residents, and community councillors, be taken into consideration and the planning application refused."

A former Marine Commando, Morris saw action fighting in Burma and surrounding islands during the campaign against the Japanese in World War Two.

Always smartly dressed Morris was rarely see out without a shirt, tie and blazer and with highly polished shoes.

For many years he marched, and carried the flag, through Mold for the Remembrance Day parades. His coffin was draped in the Union Jack and bore

his beret and campaign medals at his funeral service which was held at Gwernaffield church on Monday, November 18th.



Donations made by the packed funeral congregation will be given, in Morris' memory, to the Royal British Legion and the People's Dispensary for Sick Animals.

A proud and loyal man Morris Lloyd Thomas will be sadly missed by his family and many friends in the village.



GFT COOKING WITH CAFFI FLORENCE CHEFS



Squash, lentil and chestnut soup

THIS is a recipe we made at our recent soups workshop and of the four delicious soups made that morning this was by far the favourite.

We are still getting wonderful squash from Mostyn Gardens and the chestnuts give this soup a real taste of Christmas. It would make a great soup for lunch after a walk on Boxing Day. And it will freeze well.

Ingredients:

One pumpkin or squash 225g red lentils One litre of vegetable stock

Two onions Sprig thyme & sage One small pack of vacuum packed chestnuts

Two tbsp olive oil salt& pepper

Method

Sautee chopped onions in oil. Add chopped, peeled and scooped out squash and lentils and stir for two-three minutes, then add the chestnuts.

Add stock and herbs and continue to cook for a further 30 minutes until squash is soft. Remove stalks from thyme. Purée, taste and season. Christmas in a bowl!

County Councillor, Nancy Matthews, says she has invited ASH executives to a site meeting.

She said: "This has been agreed and will take place in the New Year. There are many issues that remain unresolved. The applicants have addressed some of the issues raised by the community council but there are a number of other important matters they simply haven't answered."

Resident Chris Bradshaw drew plans of the proposed alterations to the A494 junction with the Glyndwr Road to give other residents an insight into the proposed changes.

He said: "It is simply ludicrous and the potential for serious traffic issues should be obvious. We would have HGV's emerging onto a busy main road with very little views in either direction. And there are other issues such as water run off, drainage and the fact residents will lose out as property prices plummet. We must fight this application all the way."

Residents wishing to make their views and any objections know to Flintshire County Council with regard to the Cambrian Quarry need to do so in writing by December 12th. A copy of the community council's letter of objection is available for download on www.gwernymynydd.org.uk.

County councillor Nancy Mathews has spoken to Wheeler Homes who have confirmed that work on the construction of nine new dwellings on land adjacent to the former pub will get underway in the coming weeks. And the Rainbow Inn is to be converted into two, two-bedroom homes but due to the poor condition of the building's fabric, work may take longer than expected.

A Word Or Two from Nancy

Our Council Tax notifications come around every Spring and is made up of three separate charges: Flintshire County Council, North Wales Police and the Community Council. But I'm often asked how is that money spent?

Flintshire County Council: Community services, education, environment (highways, waste collection, drainage, etc) and corporate services.

North Wales Police: Flintshire collect this and pass it on.

Community Council: The precept – collects £14,000 from Gwernymynydd. The amount carried over from 2012-13 was £26,843 therefore the council's budget for 2013-14 was £40,843. This included £12,000 saved to cover the cost of the BMX cycle track.

The council's Budget for 2013-14 has been allocated as: Administration £5,500, street lighting and energy £2,000, subscriptions £300, support grants £3,000 (Village Centre, school, etc), community development £20,000 which covers, support for the youth club, recreation/play areas, summer play scheme, street light improvement, Gwernymynydd Development Plan and community festivals.

This should leave an estimated carry over of £10,000 for 2014-15 therefore enabling the Community Council to maintain the precept at £14,000, which is good news.

Every year at Christmas, we have the opportunity to get together with friends and family at this special time and putting up the Christmas tree is just the start of the excitement at our house. This year we have two toddlers with us so Christmas Day will be very different.

In Gwernymynydd we are looking forward to school plays, pensioners' parties, and the Lunch Club festivities as well as various Christmas fairs. There's an exciting month ahead.

Cambrian Quarry
