Laura England and Jane Edmund-Davies of Flintshire County Council's School Meals Service handed out tasters from their new menu to both children and parents and explained how meals are prepared.

Jane said: "Children can go through the menu in the morning with their teacher, decide what they want and order it. The full order is then passed to our central kitchen at Ysgol Glanrafon where meals are freshly prepared and delivered to Gwernymynydd in time for lunch.

"Children can choose a packed lunch, jacket potato or a choice of one of two hot meals. It means they have a choice and get to eat what they want and what they will enjoy."

But there's plenty of opportunity for people who would enjoy getting involved behind the scenes too.


Clwyd Creatives has been set up by professional actor, Claire Barron, who hails for the village, with the idea of creating a new piece of theatre from scratch.

Claire, 36, (pictured right) who trained at London's Rose Bruford College of Speech and Drama and is part of the Clwyd Theatre Cymru Company as well as being artistic director of the Shed Theatr Company, says it doesn't matter if people have no previous theatre experience.

She said: "The idea is to start a project from scratch which will, hopefully, end up with a production being put on in the village centre in the spring. We are looking for actors but also writers, set designers, costume makers.

"In fact everything needed to put a performance on stage. We want to see new people and if someone has experience, of say comedy,

then we'd look to widen their experience by getting them to try something different.

Former Community Councillor, Elwyn Owens, is working on the Clwyd Creatives project with Claire and says it's something that will bring people together.

He said: "We have decided to make it an adult project, for those 18 years and older from Gwernymynydd and the surrounding areas. We felt the hugely successful village pantomime caters for children so this will be solely an adult production.

"We are fortunate to have a professional actor such as Claire to lead the project. Initially we will meet at the village school with the first meeting taking place on Thursday, November 6 at 7.15pm and anyone interested should get in touch or just come along.

"I think it's an exciting project and, like the stories, the possibilities are endless."
