In Sarah's Memory

Art students at a Mold school now have a quiet place to sit and reflect thanks to the family and friends of a teenager who passed away after a horrific car crash.

Sarah Jepson, of Cadole, was just 16 when she suffered head and chest injuries in the crash on November 1st, 2013 on the A5104 at Penymynydd.

The popular Mold Alun High School student loved art and to celebrate what would have been her 18th birthday, her mum, Jacqueline and close family and friends have presented the school's art department with a bench dedicated to Sarah's memory.

A plaque attached to the seat states that it is 'Sarah J's Space' and that she is 'Forever in our Hearts'.

Sarah's mum, Jacqueline Jepson, says the family wanted to remember what would have been her daughter's 18th birthday with a positive gesture.

She said: "Sarah loved art and enjoyed her time at Mold Alun High School. I wanted there to be a space where students could sit and remember Sarah or just have somewhere for quiet reflection.

"Sarah would have loved it and I'm sure students will enjoy having somewhere they can sit quietly and take time out. I'm delighted with the bench and plaque." Gerald and Anne Hugo, Sarah's grandparents, went along to the presentation.

Mr Hugo said: "I'm really pleased with the bench and I'm sure students will see it as a place where they can sit and remember a beautiful and lovely young woman."

Mold Alun High School science teacher and head of Sarah's house when she a student at the school, Steph Hodby, says the bench is a fitting tribute to a wonderful student.

She said: "I know students will appreciate the bench. There are still many pupils at school who will have known Sarah.

"She was a superb and absolutely delightful student who loved art. She was a credit to her family and the school and is sorely missed."

Sarah's former boyfriend, Dan Tanton, 18, and one of her closest friends, Nadia Lahraoui, 17, also attended the presentation.

Dan, who now works as an operator at a Flintshire manufacturing firm, said: "I really like it it's definitely a fitting tribute to Sarah who was such a wonderful person."

School Aims to Help Children in Nepal

Pupils of the village school are reaching out to help the victims of the devastating earthquakes that struck Nepal.

The school is to hold a Table Top Sale on Thursday, June 11th with all proceeds being donated to the Nepal Earthquake Appeal.

Children and parents are being asked to sort out any unwanted items to help raise money for the Appeal.

Willing Support

And the event isn't just open to pupils and parents as anyone from the village willing to support the Appeal can book a table at the family fundraising event. Headteacher Louise Williams says the idea came about after she was approached by children, members of the community and school governors to see if something could be done to support the Appeal.

She said: "As a school we feel this is an excellent opportunity to raise money for a very needy cause as part of our Global Citizenship curriculum to teach the children in school about other parts of the world.

"I think it is important we fundraise to help our own school as much as we can but on occasions we need to look beyond our own needs.

"We know that in Nepal thousands of schools have been destroyed and that tens of thousands of classrooms need replacing.

"Almost one million children who were enrolled in school before the earthquake could now find they have no school building to return to. Prolonged interruption to education can be devastating for children's development and future prospects."

She added: "As a school we value how important going to school each day is and would like to help raise money so like our children they can return to school as soon as possible.

Good Cause

"This is an ideal opportunity for a good sort out of unwanted items while raising money for a good cause. We would suggest selling toys, books, bric a brac, dvds, games and unwanted household and garden items.

"Any unwanted clothes, bags, shoes can be donated to school via the bags2school scheme."

The Table Top Sale will take place between 3:15pm and 5:30pm on Thursday, June 11 although tables can be set up from 2pm.

The sponsored walk is one of the main fundraising events organised by the committee of Flintshire Breakthrough Breast Cancer Group which was set up in 1995.

The hard-working band of committee members have raised a huge amount of money, more than $\pounds 80,000$, since they began fundraising and aim to raise a minimum of $\pounds 1,000$ a year.

Committee member, Gwen Kime, of Gwernymynydd, says the Moel Famau sponsored walk began as an event in 1995 in memory of one of the groups' original members.

She said: "Doreen Toogood both lived on, and loved, Moel Famau. As one of our founding members she was a very loyal and hard-working supporter right up to the end of her life.

"The walk, dedicated to Doreen's memory, has remained a popular event and we were delighted to see so many come out, despite the drizzling rain, to help us raise so much money. We already have more than £400 donated with other people still getting their sponsor money in.

"It's become a really popular event enjoyed by people of all ages. There is no pressure to come up with huge amounts of sponsorship we are just thrilled that people support the event and pay a small entry fee to take part."

Like Running Half Way Up Everest


CLAIRE House Children's Hospice will benefit from the fundraising efforts of a veteran village athlete who is running three 'hilly' marathons in five weeks.

Eric Davies was due to run the local Excalibur Marathon in May 2013, but on the eve of the race his mum was diagnosed with cancer and died just 11 days later.

Eric said: "I felt bad about not running in 2013, as people had sponsored me. So this month I'll be running in the Howgill Fells, near where the ashes of my Mum and Dad are scattered; then doing Excalibur in the Clwydians; and in June - if my legs still work - I'll be racing round Coed y Brenin, near Dolgellau, where my parents did some of their courting."

So at 58 years of age, Eric will be running 78 miles and climbing 14-15,000 feet - the equivalent of running half way up Everest!

"I'm aiming to raise £2,000 from family and friends and I'm already well on the way to that total but what the pupils are doing is amazing and it's really going to boost the total we can hand to the charity. So far, I've raised approx £1,200 with three events to go."
