Snow Joke for Angry Residents

VILLAGERS WERE LEFT FURIOUS after hordes invaded Cadole in the wake of the storm that left the fields covered in snow.

FAMILIES took to the field that slopes down to Ruthin Road causing major traffic issues due to indiscriminate parking, damage to fencing and leaving behind a mountain of broken plastic sledges on what is private land.

Cadole resident Vicky Hinstridge, who chairs the community council, says for two days the village resembled a war zone.

She said: "We had people parking all over the verges despite the road signs clearly stating it was prohibited. The other issue is the damage to the field. The fence was broken down and the amount of plastic left from broken sledges was horrendous."

She added: "We have had drives blocked so residents can't get out and when people are challenged they just resort to threats and insults. Hopefully we have seen the last of the snow but we need to get things sorted so we can put a stop to this madness."

Denbighshire county councillor Martyn Holland, who represents Llanarmon-yn-lal and Llandegla said: "We had a productive meeting before the snow arrived involving the police, countryside services, highways, community and county councils.

"People seem to become possessed when snow arrives and they will stop at nothing to go sledging. That includes abusive behaviour, criminal damage, littering and civil trespass. "Although both counties have traffic enforcement officers it has been difficult for them to get to Loggerheads in the bad weather, especially with other incidents going on. We now have an agreement from Denbighshire County Council that next time we have snow they will allocate two traffic enforcement officers to attend."

Gwernymynydd county councillor Kevin Hughes said: "I went down to Cadole on the Sunday and it was appalling. The road was almost blocked with parked cars over the verges and the damage to the field, which is private property, was horrendous.

"We will work to deal with this issue before next winter so we can hopefully prevent a repeat of what we have witnessed this winter. Cllr Holland has already done a great deal of work in trying to find a solution and I fully intend to support his efforts."

Out for a Birthday Stroll!

A village thrill seeker will take to the roads for a 192 mile hike to raise a back-pack full of cash for the CYSTIC FIBROSIS TRUST AND ALDER HEY HOSPITAL.

Richard Smyth is tackling the coast to coast walk from St Bees Head in Cumbria to Robin Hood Bay on the north Yorkshire coast to raise funds as his granddaughter, Leif, eight, has suffered cystic fibrosis since birth.

And to make his marathon walk even more memorable Richie plans to dip his feet in the North Sea when he arrives at Robin Hood Bay on Sunday, June 3rd on what will be his 70th birthday.

Richie, who a decade ago took part in two legs of the Round the World Race on board the Cardiff Clipper, says tackling the coast to coast walk is a birthday present to himself.

He said: "I'll start at St Bees Head and I'll be walking across three national parks, The Lake District, Yorkshire Dales and the Yorkshire Moors.

"I've booked hotels, guest houses and hostels on route. It's going to be important to be able to have a good soak in a bath each night! I've planned on an average of 12 miles a day with odd days being 16 or 17 miles.

"I've been training by walking from Gwernymyndd to the top of Moel Famau and back and I'm going to do Gwernymynydd to Cilcain, Moel Famau and back when the weather improves."



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Richie, the former licensee of the Owain Glyndwr Inn, said: I wanted to raise some money to help The Cystic Fibrosis Trust as Leif, my granddaughter, has being having treatment since birth, the estimated cost of which is £85,000 a year.

"She has to take two tablets a day and has a six week and a longer yearly assessment that takes all day.

"She's a wonderful child and has a sister Bella, they fight like cat and dog but are really very close. I want to raise money for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust and Alder Hey Hospital as a way of showing my appreciation for all the care she has received."

He added: "I've set a target of £5,000 and if I raise that then I'll do the whole walk again next year for another worthy cause."

Richie's wife Maureen, says she will be at Robin Hood Bay waiting for her husband to arrive on his birthday.

She said: "I'll be with our daughter, Maxine, we are going to put a ribbon across the road for him to walk through."

Our Man in Westminster

RAINBOW INN I have continued to write to Flintshire County Council about the Rainbow Inn to see what action is being taken. It may have come to the attention of many of you that an application has been made to the council to demolish the building.

Constituents have been in contact with me over their concerns about certain aspects of the building being of historical importance such as the fireplace and bay windows. I know understand planning officers have refused the application to demolish the building I will await devolpments.

COUNCIL TAX The unanimous decision by all political parties and independents on Flintshire County Council at the end of February to endorse the leadership's financial plans for 2018/19 was a tough decision, but one that had to be taken.

Many people wrote to me worried about the future funding settlement for their schools and that is why the council have decided to increase the funding for education - supported by an increase in Council Tax.

Our councillors have been doing their utmost in the past eight years to protect our services from the cuts imposed in Westminster by the UK Government. For many years the council has attempted to protect school budgets and have had to cut other services to ensure our children and young people have the best possible start in life.

These are desperate times for our local authorities and I will be pressing for any public sector pay rise, which could be announced in the coming weeks, to be funded by central government and not local council budgets so residents are not further burdened.



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A Heartfelt Message of Thanks

I MOVED INTO BLAEN WERN in September 2012. I didn't expect to stay long. I saw it was a close knit community and was pretty certain I wouldn't fit in.

My home is my sanctuary. It is where I go to be me, have down time and switch off to the outside world, not to socialise. My aim was to only be visible when I went from house to car and car to house. I would be polite, of course, but I wasn't up for conversation; definitely if it revolved around me.

I didn't want the world to know my secret because I didn't want them to think me weird. I still wanted to fit in but become inconspicuous and just get on with my life without anyone noticing me. This is because I have Asperger's. I'm not high up on the spectrum, but enough for it to impact on my life.

Some people, not all, when they see this term think of perhaps a recluse with weird obsessions that can't manage eye contact and lives in their separate world. I'm not like that, but I still keep it a secret as I have had many negative reactions that have taught me to do that. I have also spent many, many years camouflaging it to the outside world, and still do, so I can just get on in life.

I wanted to drive, own a car, study to post grad level, get a good job & live independently. I have managed these things but there was still this cloud that hung over my head when dealing with the outside world. When I moved into Blaen Wern, what I expected to happen happened; people said hello, asked me how I was and how I was settling in. I was polite; went back into my house and carried on. It is not that I didn't want to be sociable; but I just don't want them to know about me.

Months and years went by and suddenly, I realised these people weren't going away, and I loved that. They accepted my declines to go out socialising and realised I enjoyed a cup of coffee and a chat more; they didn't push me to

do things, impose on my life but continued to accept me for me.

In fact, I started to make friends, friends that even witnessed when I was struggling with a situation and drew closer and more supportive, people who weren't judging me and asked me only about the things I wanted them to ask about; my job, my sisters and nephews who often visited, when my birthday was. I never wanted to rely on people but my aim was always to be independent because I can rely on myself most of all.

Two particular neighbours, who live across the road from me, I realised had amazing perception, they knew when I was struggling, they knew when I needed support, but they also still wanted to still be my friend. They let me in, accepted who I was and never judged me - and still continued to befriend me! It took more than five years to spill the secret of my diagnosis to them and, funnily enough, they are still my friends. I don't think they realise how much they have helped me to feel accepted in this community.

I now want to make friends, find out about people and carefully let people in. I still need my down time, I still need my own space, the ability to meltdown when I'm struggling and not be judged, but I think I also need my friends in Blaen Wern. Take them away today and I would be lost.

Thank you for accepting me for me and helping me to become part of the community.



Council Matters

It's been a tough couple of months at COUNTY HALL especially when it came to setting a balanced budget

Trying to fund the vital services we all rely upon with much less money coming in from Cardiff who in turn received much less money from Westminster has been extremely difficult.

It did seem that schools across Flintshire would have to make do with a 'cash flat' budget which in real terms, due to inflation and small pay increases, would mean a reduction of income of around 3% in real terms.

Add to that the pressures brought about by social care, waste management, roads, and everything else the council has a duty to provide and protect while trying to balance the books was an almost impossible task.

I know many people were upset at the £30 a year charge levied on garden waste collections. However, I'm not sure many people know that Flintshire was one, if not the only, council providing that service for free and we got to a point where we couldn't carry on doing so.

Equally upsetting will be the 6.7% ride in council tax. Somehow the council had to fill a £5million funding gap and if we wanted extra to try and help schools we were left with no choice.

It does sound uncomfortable – about £74 a year on a band D property – but I think it worth pointing out that even after the increase our council tax bills will still be considerably lower than in Chester and on a par, or cheaper, than Wrexham.

I do believe the difficulties we faced in setting a balanced budget, something we are legally obliged to do, is solely down to the lack of funds we receive from Cardiff and Westminster.
