Dog Exercise -Area Open at Village Centre

A new facility just for pet pooches is up and running at the village centre.

And the new dog exercise area is already proving a big hit with village pet owners who now have somewhere safe for their dogs to run and exercise off their leads.

Thanks to a Gwernymynydd and Cadole Community Council grant plus some funding from the Village Centre Management Committee the dog exercise area is already proving its worth and is in regular use.

Dog owners are welcome to use the area to exercise their pets, free of charge, just so long as they clean up after their animals and use the dog bin at the entrance to the village centre.

Nancy Matthews, who chairs the Village Centre Management Committee, says the idea was to give dog owners somewhere safe to exercise their pets while making sure dog fouling is no longer an issue within the village.

She said: "It's a fantastic facility and one I'm sure dog owners will be thrilled with. We have to thank John Hommersley, his brother Eric and Carl Jackson for all their hard work. They really have done an amazing and professional job.

"We just hope people appreciate the facility and clean up after their pets. There is a dog bin at the entrance to the village centre. It is important to accept that dog owners using the facility do so at their own risk." Vicky Hinstridge, chair of Gwernymynydd Community Council, says councillors were delighted to support the initiative.

She said: "It's a wonderful community asset and I'm sure dog owners will appreciate using it. The double gate giving access to the area means dogs can't run off and it saves owners exercising their dogs in areas where there may be livestock.

"The guys have done an amazing job and so far we have had only very positive feedback from pet owners. This is a really positive asset that will, I hope, see a reduction in dog fouling within the village."

Children of a village school quizzed a former pupil who attended their school more than eight decades ago.

Gwernymynydd CP School pupils have been working on a project all about their school and were thrilled to welcome former pupil Morfudd Shawcross, 91, to their classroom and quiz her on what school was like when she was a little girl.

Morfudd, who lives in Gwernaffield, told pupils she attended the school when it was located in the old school house on Ruthin Road and how she later returned to the school as a teacher.

She said: "It's been lovely visiting the school, it's not too much different just a lot more modern as you'd expect really. It's taken me back a few years, I feel like I'm back in school myself.

"I've always lived in the area and I returned to the school as a teacher. Education was different then and far stricter."

She added: "The children have been so nice and asked some lovely questions, it's been wonderful and I've really enjoyed visiting."

Teacher Molly Parry said: "It's been amazing having Mrs Shawcross visit and the children



have clearly been enthralled listening to what she had to say about school life all those years ago.

"It has been a really interesting project and one the children have thoroughly enjoyed."

Pupil Maisie Hayes thanked Mrs Shawcross, who was presented with flowers, for visiting the school.

She said: "It's been amazing; I've loved talking to Mrs Shawcross and wish she could stay all day. It's so interesting to hear what school was like a long time ago."

Climb Every Mountain!

Dedicated fundraisers once again took to the hills for an annual sponsored walk to raise a mountain of cash for a breast cancer charity.

More than 50 walkers - and a few pet dogs set off on either a 2.5mile gentle walk around the base of Moel Famau or a more strenuous 4.5 mile hike taking in the Jubilee Tower at its summit.

The sponsored walk is one of the main fundraising events organised by the committee of the Flintshire group of the national charity **Breast Cancer NOW.**

The hard-working band of committee members have raised a huge amount of money, more than $\pounds 85,000$, since they began fundraising and aim to raise a minimum of $\pounds 1,000$ a year.

Committee member, Gwen Kime, of Gwernymynydd, says the Moel Famau sponsored walk began as an event in 1995 in memory of one of the groups' original members.

She said: "Doreen Toogood loved Moel Famau. As one of our founding members she was a very loyal and hard-working supporter right up to the end of her life.

"The walk, dedicated to Doreen's memory, has remained a popular event and we were delighted to see so many come out yet again to help us raise so much money. "It's become a diary fixture enjoyed by people of all ages. There is no pressure to come up with huge amounts of sponsorship we are just thrilled that people support the event and pay a small entry fee."

She added; "Well done to everyone that took part. The atmosphere was, as usual, lovely and the weather was kind to us.

"Money raised so far is in excess of £650 which includes a whopping £150 raised by mum and daughter Suzanne and Seren Humphreys of Gwernymynydd which is a brilliant result.

"As a group we would like to thank everyone for taking part and helping us raise so much money. Every penny helps in the fight against this horrible condition."

There around 16 players, both men and women of all abilities, enjoying playing on the club's two mats each week.


No experience is needed and there's a warm welcome for all with the £2 a week fee covering refreshments too.

The village is looking spic and span after villagers tackled the annual spring clean.

An army of youngsters, parents and youth club members donned fluorescent jackets and used litter grabbers to clear rubbish from hedgerows, pavements and open spaces.

Vicky Hinstridge, who chairs Gwernymynydd Community Council, says she was thrilled with the turn-out despite the overcast conditions and threat of rain.

She said: "It's been a very productive morning. The amount of litter and rubbish collected is simply amazing. It seems to be crisp packets, plastic drink bottles and fast food wrappings that people discard the most but we also collected everything from beer and spirit bottles, nappies and even the odd shoe!"

She added: "If people would just take their rubbish home it would make such a huge difference. As a rural community we don't want plastic and rubbish getting into fields where it could cause injury or illness to livestock.

"I'm really grateful to the young people and parents who turned out and spent several hours filling more than 40 bin bags full of waste that were collected by Flintshire County Council."

Flintshire County Councillor Kevin Hughes, who recruited his two granddaughters who live in Connah's Quay as litter pickers for the day, said: "This was once again a fabulous community effort. Well done to all those that took part and collected so much litter and rubbish.

"And a big thanks to Mold Town Council who loaned us the fluorescent jackets, litter pickers and gloves. The village looks so much better.

"If we can encourage and educate people to take their litter home and not throw it from car windows we could protect the environment for everyone."

BIG LOTTERY FUNDING IN DELYN

I recently received an update from the Big Lottery Fund on how much funding we have had from them in the past 12 months. It was a pleasure to see that we secured the investment of £679,679.

This demonstrates the huge effort of charities and organisations in our communities to secure funding to improve their services or facilities offered to residents. It is with great pride I can see that some of these projects got the funding after first getting in contact with me.

The news of this massive investment into our area coincides with the announcement of new funding being made available. This year the Big Lottery Fund is making £34m available with grants available between £300 and £500,000. This funding is to put people in the lead and support communities to identify what matters most to them.

To ensure people have a better chance of securing funding the Big Lottery Fund have created the National Lottery Awards for All scheme. This will make grants from \$5,000 to \$10,000 available.

Earlier this year, it was announced that the Welsh Government is to introduce a broadband outreach team to support those areas not currently covered by suppliers.

Pupils of five small rural primary schools have come together to learn computer coding techniques.

The event saw pupils of, Ysgol y Foel, Cilcain, Nannerch, Nercwys and Ysgol y Waun, Gwerrnaffield spend an afternoon at Gwernymynydd CP School to take part in a science project thanks to a Flintshire County Council Small and Rural Schools Grant.

Dafydd Johnson, deputy head teacher of the village school, says the £5,000 grant allowed the five schools to collaborate on improving ICT provision while also raising standards in literacy, numeracy and the digital competence framework.

He said: "Having been able to secure a grant I approached Ysgol Y Foel, Nannerch and Nercwys as we are federated with Ysgol Y Waun to get the collaboration underway. We set out an eight day action plan and invited all schools to come to Gwernymynydd to see what we do.

"We asked the company, MCC Digital, along to demonstrate the equipment we have bought

from them. We are now looking at ordering more."

He added: "The Small and Rural Schools Grant shows the importance of schools collaborating and sharing good practice."





Ritchie Makes Progress - Despite Blisters



Village trekker Richard Smyth is well on the way as he tackles a 192 mile hike raising funds for Cystic Fibrosis Trust and Alder Hey Hospital.

Richie set off from St Bees Head in Cumbria and is aiming to walk to Robin Hood Bay in North Yorkshire, a popular hike known as the Coast to Coast Walk.

He aims to arrive at Robin Hood Bay on June 3rd, his 70th birthday, and is pretty sure he'll make it on time.

Speaking from Reeth, in Swaledale, Yorkshire almost a 100 mile into his trek, Richie says the Lake District was a nightmare.

He said: "I never knew or expected it to be so hard. It was an absolute killer and the hardest thing I have ever done in my life. I ended up with badly blistered feet and had to take a two day rest, I had no option.

"But I'm now back on track and trying to catch up the time I lost. It's been amazing an amazing experience though and I have made lots of new friends. I'm currently walking with a Canadian guy, Ron, who is 73 and fit as a fiddle.

"I also bumped into George, who runs the auto electrical shop at Loggerheads Garage. He was doing the walk a different way and in any case was far too quick for me. But it's amazing who you meet on route."

He added: "I was thrilled to reach Shap and see the end of the Lake District but it's now the second leg, the Yorkshire Moors, and I'm not expecting it to get much easier. I'm still aiming for around 12 miles a day but it does take it's toll.

Richie, who a decade ago took part in two legs of the Round the World Race on board the Cardiff Clipper, is determined to raise all he can for Cystic Fibrosis Trust and Alder Hey Hospital.

His granddaughter, Leif, 8, has been treated at Alder Hey for the condition since birth and has to take daily medication and undergo rigorous all day tests every year.

He said: "I'm just trying to put a bit back to show my appreciation for all the care she has received.

"I'm now dreaming of reaching the finish line and seeing my wife Maureen and daughter Maxine waiting for me. This is without doubt the hardest thing I have ever done but I am determined to see it through to the end."

Gymnast Strikes Bronze at Welsh Championships

The village can boast of a budding Commonwealth or Olympic gymnast in the making.

Phoebe Basnett, 7, a pupil at the village school attended the **Welsh Rhythmic Gymnastics championships** and came away with a bronze in the Under 10's Level 1 event.

Phoebe's proud mum, Imogen Rosedale, says she never expected her little star to come back from Cardiff, where the event was held, with a medal. She said: "Phoebe was competing against girls much older than her so we never really expected a medal. We went for the experience and to just have fun to be honest.

"She performed her free routine beautifully and had me in tears watching her. We are so very proud of Phoebe; she has trained so hard for this first competition and is looking forward to competing in many more events."

She added: "It's amazing to be involved in the Welsh Championships which were held at Cardiff's National Sports Centre.

"Phoebe is seven and only started Rhythmic
