

Planning Inspector To Decide On Siglen Uchaf

Almost 50 villagers attended an informal hearing to decide the fate of a Wainhomes application to build 18 new dwellings on land at Siglen Uchaf.

The hearing, on Tuesday, March 4th, was called after the original Planning Inspector, who conducted a hearing last October, had been taken seriously ill and was unable to complete his report.

At the new hearing, the Planning Inspector who had been appointed by Welsh Ministers to determine whether the appeal by Wainhomes should be allowed, heard arguments from both sides. The hearing was necessary as Wainhomes appealed a Flinthsire County Council's decision to refuse planning permission.

Many villagers at the hearing struggled to hold back laughter as the agent for Wainhomes told the planning inspector the four meter high retaining wall, that forms part of the plan, would be sympathetic to the village's character.

Village resident, Tom Rosedale, questioned where surface water from the site would go, what were the plans with regard to mine shafts on and near the proposed site as well as raising the issue of lead contamination should the former mine site be disturbed.

Gwernymynydd farmer, John Williams, raised concerns over contaminated water and made it clear he would not allow water from the site to go across his land as he feared for the health of his livestock.

Councillor Kevin Hughes, on behalf of the Community Council, told the Inspector that, on top of residents' fears over the retaining wall, road traffic concerns where a major issue. And he pointed out to the inspector, who later made a site visit, that with approval now granted to infill Cambrian Quarry it is anticipated there would be an additional 60 HGV movements a day through the village.

County Councillor Nancy Mathews says that, having heard all the evidence the Planning Inspector would now consider the evidence before coming to a decision.

She said: "There were some very valid and well-made arguments and the inspector certainly has a great deal to think about before coming to a decision. We can expect that decision sometime during April. I was delighted with the turn-out and conduct of the meeting."

And while Cadole residents have seen a rise in dog fouling incidents according to Community Councillor Vicky Hinstridge, incidents are occurring all over the village.

She said: "What we are experiencing in Cadole is dog dirt being found on a set few stretches of road which leads me to think it is one owner, using a regular route and failing to clear up after their pets. However, we have also been getting reports of dog dirt being found on pavements and grassed areas near the village school.

"We would ask dog owners to be more considerate and can promise that the Community Council <u>will</u> take action if we can identify those responsible."

Centenary of the First World War

I was pleased to be part of the launch of the Heritage Lottery Fund's (HLF) new small David Hanson MP. grants programme, First World War: Then and Now, which will allow people in Gwernymynydd to secure funding to mark the centenary of the First World War.

The HLF is making at least £1m available per year for six years and will provide grants of between £3,000-£10,000 to enable groups to explore, conserve and share their First World War heritage and deepen their understanding of the impact of the conflict. The programme can also provide funding for the conservation of war memorials. Police cuts

I've recently voted against government plans to further cut police funding as figures show we've already lost 118 officers in Flintshire since 2010. I know from correspondence people in the village care about this issue.
