School Poets Work Rewarded



Village school pupils wrote poems on the subject of the First World War as part of a competition set by community councillors.

And three of the young wordsmiths had a big surprise after ASH Group, who sponsored the event, handed over prizes of family cinema tickets to the poets who came up with what were judged to be the best work.

Steve Rymill, ASH Group environmental manager, community councillor and former soldier Carl Jackson and World War Two veteran and village resident Norman Smith, 94, acted as judges for the competition.

Deputy head teacher Daffyd Johnson says the work produced by all pupils was of a very high standard and he didn't envy the judges' task.

"To me every pupil was a winner, they all worked incredibly hard and the poems they produced were simply amazing. They clearly have an understanding of the horrors of war and what soldiers and their families back at home had to go through.

"Some children chose to write poems from a soldier's perspective others from a child at home waiting for their dad to return and others simply about the war itself. A great deal of the work was touching and full of emotion. I'm really proud of what the children produced."

Steve Rymill said: "We had an incredibly hard job choosing two winners, one from Years 3 & 4 and one from Years 5 & 6. We also gave an additional prize for best effort.

"The standard was amazing and some really did bring a lump to the throat."

"It was a lovely afternoon and I was pleased to spend a bit of time after we had judged the competition answering questions the children asked me about





Everyone enjoyed a lovely meal and entertainment and as ever the Plas Hafod team pulled out all the stops to ensure everyone had a great time.



Children in Need Appeal

Village school pupils helped raise a bucketful of cash by wearing their pyjamas to school.

It was all part of the BBC's annual Children in Need Day fundraiser.

Children, or rather their mums and dads, paid a small sum to allow pupils to wear their jim-jams for the day and head teacher Louise Ankers and staff all joined in too.

Mrs Ankers said: "It was a fun day and we managed to raise more than £120 which was fantastic. Children enjoy dressing up and we had lots of fun throughout the day too.

"It's fabulous that schools in the Hafod Federation, Gwernymynydd and Ysgol Y Waun, Gwernaffield play their part. It helps our pupils learn important lessons about citizenship and caring for others."



#BacktheAsk

The County Council is working to set the budget for next year and it's proving a huge challenge.

A funding gap of some $\mathfrak{L}15.3$ million - which would have seen council tax rise by as much as 15% has been reduced thanks to some extra cash from Welsh government.

However, we still face a gap of more than $\mathfrak{L}3.5$ million and that still means asking council tax payers to stump up a rise of around 6%.

This is despite the fact Flintshire has cut costs and made efficiencies of many millions of pounds over recent years.

There is nothing else we can cut without stopping essential services that we all rely on.

The situation has been made worse by the fact the Westminster Government increased teachers' pay but left local authorities to pay the increase along with pension contributions.

So, as a council, we have been developing a campaign strategy to encourage Welsh Government to increase the amount of money Flintshire will receive through the funding settlement.

We have launched a #BackTheAsk campaign.

The campaign is designed to keep the pressure on Welsh Government to pass all the additional funding they received from the UK government through to councils, as they promised that local government would be 'first in the queue' for this money to support vital services.

We are all clear critical services for children, young people and the elderly/vulnerable are at serious risk if additional funding is not given to the Council to protect them.



We know how much stress this ongoing austerity is causing communities and the frustrating thing is Welsh Government does have the funding available to relieve some of the pressure.

We need to encourage them to improve the settlement before the final budget is announced on December 19th.

Please use the #BackTheAsk campaign and e-mail your Assembly Member, MP and anyone else that might listen. The more we can get that will pledge their support the better.

I would also ask people to sign up to support the campaign via the Flintshire County Council website.

Time is running out for a fairer funding for Flintshire and all Welsh councils. Help us keep the pressure on Welsh Government to give us more funding for our schools and core services.
