# We're giving money away!

Do you know that the Village Centre Committee has money to give away? No? Then read on ...

In 1934 a Village Hall was built on Hafod Drive (the lane opposite the old Rainbow pub) using money raised by the local community. When it was sold in 1973/74, proceeds of the sale were used to create the Gwernymynydd Village Hall Fund (GVHF) and in 1974 a charity was established to ensure that the money would be used for the benefit of local people.

The GVHF closed in June 2024 and £1740, which was the remains of the original Fund, was transferred to the Gwernymynydd Village Centre, which is also a registered charity. A Village Hall Fund sub-committee manages the money, which is ring-fenced and available in the form of grants to support people living in Gwernymynydd or Cadole and to organisations based here. *Continued overleaf ...*

**WHAT CAN MONEY BE USED FOR?** The scope of the Fund is wide-ranging, with beneficiaries including: children and young people; elderly people; people with disabilities; people of a particular ethnic or racial origin; and charities and voluntary bodies.

In addition to helping general charitable causes, the Fund has also supported recreation and amateur sport, and environment, conservation and heritage initiatives. The village school has received money, as has the Village Centre (most recently for tables), the pantomime and the Bowls Club. Over the years, people have also asked for grants to help them to buy musical instruments and textbooks.

**HOW DO I APPLY?** The maximum grant that can be awarded to any applicant is officially £1000 but, given the relatively modest amount of money left in the Fund, it is unlikely that so much would be donated to a single applicant.

An application form is available from Bridget Meadway at treasurer.gvc@gmail.com.

Anyone wishing to apply must be prepared to explain what their goal is and what they expect a grant to help them acquire or achieve and should also consider how a grant might benefit the wider community.

The Village Hall Fund sub-committee will also want to know the total cost of a project, how much money has already been raised and what, if any, other funding has been applied for.

#### **QUARRY UPDATE**

Situated at the bottom of Ffordd Glyndwr, the disused Cambrian Quarry is being filled with some 500,000 square metres of soil and building waste, with the aim of restoring the area so that it can be used by the local community.

Work is being carried out by ASH Resource Management (Cambrian Quarry) Limited, and the latest progress report by Director John Dennan reveals that the bat population living in the old mine workings and caves is flourishing.



There is a fine of £5000 or six months imprisonment for killing a bat, so to stop the caves from flooding and potentially drowning them, a new cave entrance has been created.

In other good news, the badger population is using an artificial sett which ASH built for them 10 years ago.

However, no great crested newts have been found on the site, despite there being two artificial ponds for them to breed in and ASH paying specialist ecologists to monitor for them twice a year.

ASH has now completed over 80% of the infilling and the site is nearing the final restoration point, with soil placing and planting soon to take place.

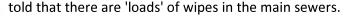




#### **DON'T FLUSH THOSE WIPES AWAY!**

People are politely asked not to throw wet wipes and similar products down the toilet.

Some local residents have recently had to call out Welsh Water to deal with blocked drains and have been





Because drains in the village flow into each other, it's difficult to pinpoint where the problem is originating - but that doesn't make it any less serious: one lucky resident was told they were just 24 hours away from having toilet waste backing up into their house.

Wet wipes are the biggest cause of blockages on its network, says Welsh Water, which urges people to dispose of all wipes, cotton buds and sanitary products in the bin, not down the loo.

So please be considerate when disposing of wipes and other materials - and remember that not properly getting rid of wet wipes could mean that one day it's your house that gets stinking waste coming up through the drains.
