## New for 2024

As you can see from the list of classes the Committee has had a revamp and responded to feedback given after last years show. Whilst some classes have been rested for this year, others have been introduced. Here are a few helpful notes as a guide to the new classes, but please do get in touch using the email address on the front page if you have any queries.

The 'wild card' categories for photography will change theme every year, challenging photographers to interpret the theme as they see fit and capture the perfect shot.

For some of the baking categories a flavour of cake or scone has been specified. This will be rotated each year so bakers can try to get the best bake with different flavours.

To ensure we can display all the wonderful exhibits brought in, we've limited entries to two per person, per class. But you can still enter as many classes as you'd like.

The children's writing section has been broadened out to include the chance for older children to use their imagination and creative flair to write a short story or poem.

Finally, as a special class for 2024, we're asking children aged 5-16 to design a logo for the show to be used on posters and marketing for 2025. This class will be judged by the Kirkwhelpington & District Show directors.

# MEN'S BAKING CLASS (56) RECIPE: Cherry loaf cake Ingredients:

175g glacé cherries 225g self-raising flour 175g softened butter 175g caster sugar Finely grated rind of 1 lemon 50g ground almonds 3 large eggs

## Method:

Preheat oven to 180°c/ fan 160°c/ Gas mark 4.

Grease and line 900g/2lb loaf tin.

Cut cherries into quarters, sieve and rinse. Drain well and dry on kitchen paper.

Put all remaining ingredients into large bowl and beat well for 1-2 minutes. Lightly fold in cherries. Turn into the prepared tin. Bake in the preheated oven for  $1-1^1/4$  hours or until well risen, golden brown and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.

Leave to cool in tin, then turn out to finish cooling on wire rack.
