Although there is a feeling of optimism due to the fact that we are potentially coming out of the pandemic it is important to remember that there are still restrictions in place which are all designed to prevent the spread of Covid as we'd all like to avoid another wave.

Sadly things are also getting back to normal for criminals who are now able to enjoy the same freedoms as the rest of us. We have noticed an increase in domestic burglary as people leave their homes unattended and we have also noticed an increase across the beat in the number of catalytic converter thefts as the price of the precious metals within them increases.

The beat team are working hard to combat the above issues and we would urge everyone to be vigilant. What would really help is for people to sign up to Neighbourhood Link so that we can pass alerts and appeal for help from the subscribers with aid such as sightings and CCTV.

Focus on: Wildlife Crime Officers (WCOs)...

Wildlife Crime Officers (WCOs) are police officers who are designated by their forces to deal with wildlife crime issues. The majority of forces now have at least one WCO, at Market Bosworth Station we have three in total, this is due to the vast area we cover, the majority of which is rural landscape.

Wildlife crime includes offences such as poaching, killing or disturbing protected species or damaging their breeding and resting places, and illegally trading in endangered species. It is one of the pressures that can push animal and plant species closer to extinction. Some wildlife crimes, such as badger-baiting and the illegal use of poisons and traps, can cause animals unnecessary pain and suffering.

This time of year we get quite a few calls about tree or hedge work and the effect it may be having on nesting birds. If there is evidence that a bird, its nest or its eggs have been disturbed, damaged or destroyed, then we will endeavour to deal with the offender. But if there is no evidence of that and the call is just to say that nesting birds are possibly being affected, then it's likely that there are no offences.

**You Said:** Burglaries in Groby Area.

**We Did:** We identified an increase in burglary offences in Groby so at the relevant times local officers and response colleagues were deployed to disrupt offenders and detect crime. Officers have made direct contact with 320 residents. We encouraged the installation of CCTV which is an excellent deterrent. We are also working with the local authority to review street lighting in the area.

## Beat Priorities

### Rural Crime

Catalytic Converter thefts. Extra vigilance requested following thefts in Market Bosworth area. Occupants of a dark blue hatchback were disturbed but not before removing the unit from victims vehicle. Local garages have been asked to participate in 'cat marking schemes' which may help identify recovered units.



### Road Safety

Areas covered this month – Main Rd & Twycross Rd Sheepy on the A444, B4116 Sheepy Magna, B582 Desford Rd Newbold Verdon, B582 Manor Rd Desford, Desford Rd Newtown Unthank, Leicester Rd Groby, Main Street Stapleton, Newbold Rd Barlestone, Peckleton Lane Desford and Station Rd Market Bosworth. The offences per hour figures are available on our Facebook page.

### ASB

Increase in Anti-Social Behaviour on park areas, and students from various schools setting fire to playground equipment. Contact made with all senior schools on the beat, and workshops to take place over the following months, ASB Busters with HBBC, Fire Awareness with LF&R Service, and Market Bosworth Police ASB Prevention Team. Regular patrols of the areas and contact made with Parish Cllr's to work together to prevent.

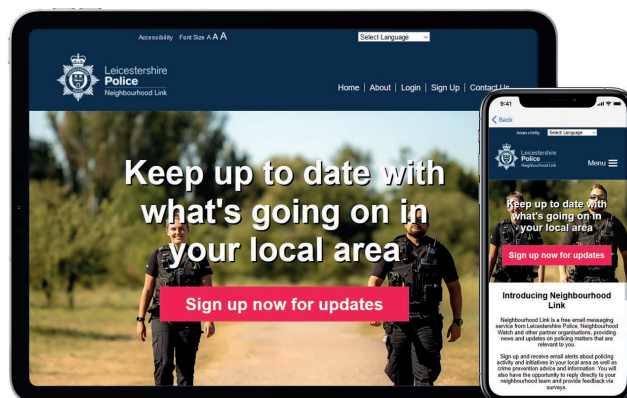
