So, whilst it is not possible to give any firm dates, if we are awarded the LEADER grant, building work will be started.

The application for funding through the LEADER programme has been submitted. LEADER, a French acronym, funds projects that create jobs, help businesses to grow, and benefit the rural economy. Supporting new businesses is an important way of promoting growth in rural areas and we hope that our project will be successful.
