# How are you doing?

I expect that you have by now often heard that these are strange and troubling times. And certainly they are. It is wonderful though to see how small communities like ours can pull together, to help each other out whilst at the same time maintaining the necessary precautions and not putting friends and neighbours at risk.

You will have also noticed that there are changes in the shop. In line with Government advice, and in order to enact it appropriately, no more than two customers are allowed in the shop at any one time, and if both those customers require the same till, then that may be reduced to one.

We have also introduced a lunchtime closure of 1 hour to allow vital tasks to be carried out without risk to staff or customers. Generally though, the shops is still open, still providing service to the community.

#### Did you know?

- Many people get out of the habit of shopping locally and are surprised by the range of local products available.
- Supermarkets would like us to think that local shops are expensive. However, add in travel, parking costs and your time, and the overall cost is often much higher.
- Local, independent shops create a distinctive shopping experience and stock a variety of different products.
- Local, independent shops keep traditional local produce alive.
- Local, independent shops respond more quickly to the needs of local customers, stocking products to meet the changing needs of the population.
- Evidence from numerous surveys shows people receive better customer care and service in local shops. Traders survive by their reputation and repeat business - so shopping local means that you get a higher standard of service.
- People do not like losing shops and services in small towns and villages but they do not equate this to where they spend their money. Local shops will only survive if customers spend locally.

# **Keeping the Community Fed**



Creaton Village Shop will deliver to people selfisolating, aided by the wonderful group of volunteers from Help Creaton. The shop would not function without the staff and the band of volunteers ready to serve our customers.

Before the pandemic, the shop had a pool of about 30 people who could be called upon to help out and serve when necessary. Now, due to the virus, this number is down to <u>ten</u>. Shopworkers who keep going to help their community are as much in the front-line as other key workers with the exception of those on the medical front line.

However it is just as important that the guidelines are respected by all: staff, volunteers and customers, and that minimum distances are adhered to, that hands are repeatedly washed and that if you are unwell, you stay at home—and we will bring your groceries to you. Keeping the shop stocked is much harder now. As soon as things come in, out they go out again. Time was when the trip to the cash and carry was a sedate weekly affair and Simon and Sue would return with a car laden with goods and then a handful of people would be put to work to fill the shelves.

Now, these trips happen several times a week and are timed to coincide with the temporary lunchtime closure so that the shelves can be stocked whilst the Post Office staff are changing over.

Even these trips are not easy as small shops all over the country are experiencing problems getting what they need for their customers. The Plunkett Foundation, an organization which helps community shops and pubs get organised, have been talking to the major cash & carry suppliers to try and sort this problem, so that shops like ours can provide the things that the big supermarkets often cannot.
