

Winter Roads Maintenance Briefing

"Winter is here"

A belated but massive thank you to all those who worked during the festive period, both in and out of Aberdeenshire council, to the people who make the North East of Scotland a better place to live in.

After the early onslaught of Storm Arwen, the less turbulent winter conditions experienced over the past couple of months has been a welcome respite to all. It has been challenging to deliver winter with Covid-19 absences, but hopefully this will improve as we move into the spring.

Over the holidays, the winter maintenance team have been working most days as per our decision making flowcharts in our winter operational plan to ensure the safety of our people, roads, and infrastructure. In this second issue, we'd like to update you all on the latest improvements to our service, how they have performed, and what new innovations are to come.

Salt

To keep our depots stocked, our supplier delivers an average of 3650 Tonnes of salt on every winter month.

As seen in the map, salt is sent from Teesport to Aberdeen Harbour, then to our depots, and finally to our roads and grit boxes.

Our supplier mines their salt mostly from The North Sea or The North Yorkshire Moors, but during high demand, their salt can come from as far as Ireland or Spain.

In December we used over 9,500 T of salt, 1,500 T of which were used over Christmas Eve to New Years Day.

So far this winter season, we have used 17,834 T of salt on our roads.





Road Sensors

Since the installation of our road sensors in December, the winter maintenance team has seen improvements to our weather data gathering network. The additional sensors have allowed for better determination of road conditions, weather, and observation of previously unmonitored roads within Aberdeenshire.

The Vaisala DRS611 sensor is battery operated and embedded within the tarmac under the road surface. The data the road sensor is able to collect, can range from surface temperature and surface dryness, to the amount of salt remaining on the road surface.

For those yet to download the app, the Digital Service Team has added the "Roadworks" function. This shows the current and scheduled road closures / restrictions within Aberdeenshire. This can be viewed in map or list format, and users can filter this information by time, type, and area.



Additionally, users can set up and receive road closure / restriction notifications from the "Roadworks" function. Just go into settings and specify your desired roadworks notification preferences - time, type, and area.



More Functions

Notifications can also be set up for waste bin collections and school closures. That way, users can be notified of any ad-hoc issues in real time, such as:

- Unscheduled school closures,
- Waste vehicle breakdowns,
- Extreme weather affects on services.





Another feature the Digital Service Team has refined over time is the "Reporting" function. App users can report road faults, defective street lights, fly tipping and other items. There is an active map which shows all reports previously made, and user can even report a missed bin collection.





Our Grit Bins

There are now three ways to request for a grit bin refill, our new QR Codes, the MyAberdeenshire app, and our website:

Aberdeenshire Council has just over 1800 grit bins spread across the area.

As part of the Councils Internet of Things (IoT) initiative, smart sensors will be trialed on a selection of Grit Bins. This will allow us to monitor salt levels inside of our bins in real time. If the trial is successful, this would mean that in the future, you will no longer need to request for a refill, as the sensors will inform us when a top up is needed.

At this time, the sensors are still in the early stages of installation, until then our QR codes, website, and app will still play an integral role in the restocking of our grit bins.



- (6) Salt spreader
- (7) Snow pushers
- (8) Grit Salt
- (9) Wooly hat
