FROM THE CLERGY TEAM

Did you notice how resilient the daffodils and snowdrops were earlier in the month? Stems bent right over; yet when the thaw came, they bounced back. St David would have been proud of them!

But the cold weather was a trial, wasn't it? And it wasn't just the relentless cold. There were burst pipes, frozen ground, black ice, people stranded in their homes and people without access to food or water.

As we watched it on the TV or read the news in our papers, we saw thousands of people put through hardship and misery. And our hearts went out to them. Somehow, what we were going through paled into insignificance, inconvenient though it was.

And yet, just like the battered flowers, we have straightened up again. Animals are nibbling on the grass, pipes have been fixed, paths cleared and stores replenished. We too can be resilient. And, of course, we have one big advantage over the bulbs that were flattened - we could help each other out. How heartening it was to see neighbours checking on each other, friends ringing each other up, 4-wheel drive owners fetching shopping or medicines for others living in the village. We rose to the occasion. Indeed, in some ways, we are all the better for the experience (not that I'm asking for more snow!). Good things can come out of adversity. And if that isn't a cue for thinking about Easter, then I don't know what is

Out of the bleakness of Good Friday came the wonder of Easter Sunday. Out of death came life. Jesus rose from the dead. Hallelujah! It is the source of all our hope as a Christian Church. Not only does the resurrection prove

that Jesus was indeed the Son of God as He claimed, and that therefore His teaching has an authority we can't ignore, but it also inspires us with hope. If Jesus rose from the dead, then so can we. We are, to use His words, inheritors of the kingdom of God.

Easter means that we the opportunity to be forgiven of our sins, to be made righteous in the eyes of God and to be welcomed in to heaven for eternity. It means that death is not the end but the beginning of something new and exciting. Heaven is free from pain, free from illness, free from sin, free from tears. It is something to look forward to. In heaven we will see God in all His glory, His radiance and His majesty.

One of the big complaints of the freeze and thaw and subsequent chaos with water supplies around the country was that of the lack of communication from various water boards. As Christians we have such good news to communicate: there is a solution, the problem is solved, there is life after death!

Jesus described Himself as the water of life inviting us to drink of Him and quench our thirst for ever. Good news worth sharing. I pray that you have a wonderful Easter and that the hope of the season continues to be uplifting for you. May we blossom and flourish in the light of the risen Christ.

COUNCIL TAX

While council tax is going up, everyone in Ambrosden will be paying less for the Parish Precept than 2 years ago in 2016/17. There was a reduction of 8.3% last year and an increase of 4.4% this year.

This reflects increased grass cutting, litter picking, extra dog waste bins/ collections, increased support for community campaigns against planning applications all against a 50%

reduction in County Council grants and the loss of a few thousand pounds of New Homes Bonus Grants from the District Council as it now keeps it all.

The Parish Council has recently supported the Scouts and the Brownies and grant aided last year's summer party, which turned a profit. The Parish Council is highly restricted in what it can fund, but its here to help make the community better where possible.

Plans for the next financial year include working with the Garrison to sort out the railings and to assist in community events, railings replacement of the railings along the school side of Ploughley Road, where they have been removed without authorisation, and on the school side of road, bollards in the footway to stop cars driving along the footway adjacent the school.

We now have a sports common in the village, so we are looking for interested people who may want to set up sports groups such as five aside to use the common at Springfields. If we get interest, we can unlock grants and s106 funding to put a store building up, and inflatable goal posts etc.

Allotments Paperwork is in the hands of solicitors, but there is a hiccup on land ownership as a householder has fenced off some of the land included in the title.

REPORT FROM ARNCOTT VHMC & ACA MEETING 27th FEBRUARY & PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 6th MARCH 2017

WOODPIECE ROAD PARKING

CDC have advised the parish council that the planning application is still subject to consultation by the various departments involved in this project. The application can be seem on the CDC website for residents to comment on if they wish. For anyone who is interested in having a look at the application documents and plans, the CDC website link is ; https://www.publicaccess.cherwell.gov. uk/online-applications/ . Type Woodpiece Road Arncott into the search box then select Woodpiece Road option then view the documents. A disabled bay will be provided in site 3. As mentioned previously, CDC have also approved a financial option to provide subsidy to Woodpiece Road residents wishing to submit an application to get the kerb dropped to enable parking in the front of their houses. CDC have agreed that the boundary lines between the parking areas and residents' property will be clearly demarcated.

SPEEDWATCH

The program will be starting again soon and we need help from our community to run this program. Please consider becoming a volunteer and signing up to help. If you can help us then let us know by emailing the parish clerk, the parish email address or by contacting any parish councillor directly.

MURCOTT ROAD BUILD-OUT
No updates have been received from OCC

about this project so the parish council are hopeful that work will begin early into the new financial year (April onwards).

DEFIBRILLATOR UNITS

There are two public defibrillator units within the village. One unit is fitted to the village hall outer wall facing Murcott Road – cabinet ID number AR84. The other unit is fitted at The Tally Ho Hotel and is located on the building end wall in line with the hotel car park entrance – cabinet ID number AR82. To gain access to either unit you need to dial 999 and speak with the ambulance service. The call desk operator will decide if the use of a defibrillator is necessary. If asked for then tell the call desk operator the ID number on the cabinet door. You will then be given the code number to open that door.

MOTOR PARC

District Cllr Hughes advised the meeting that he had received correspondence from the new operators of the Moto Parc. The parish council requested him to ask the new operators to please keep the parish council informed about proposals / developments regarding the possible construction of noise attenuation bunds. As previously mentioned, the parish council will agree to support the operators of the moto parc with any application they may make to CDC for permission to construct noise attenuation bunds on the site.

LITTER PICK

On behalf of everyone in the village, many, many thanks to the good folks who spent the best part of a day in the middle of February clearing out all of the litter and rubbish in the scrubland area at the bottom end of the football pitch. Together they filled four hippo bags with all sorts of rubbish. Not just litter but things like bike parts and a car exhaust system. Many grateful thanks and very well

done to Naomi and Eleanor (surnames not known at time of writing), Stuart, Ellenis, Louie, Henry and Isabella Panter. Millie, Olivia and Max Butler. Jack Begley. Jarrett Good. Reece Uwen Palmer. A brilliant effort indeed. Very much appreciated. If you took part in this activity but are not mentioned here then please let the parish council know. The parish clerk was asked to contact CDC to ask for arrangements to be made for the remaining bags to be collected.

PLAYING FIELD DRAINAGE

During the above mentioned litter pick exercise, an open manhole full of rubbish was found inside of the scrubland area. As a result, Cllr Savidge has started making enquiries as to what drainage system it is connected to, where it goes and who is responsible for it. Cllr Savidge has also made contact with the MOD about the condition of an adjacent drainage ditch next to the MOD perimeter fence. He has been advised that the drainage ditch is on the MOD estate. The ditch has been inspected and the necessary work needed to be done to the ditch will be carried out. It is to be hoped that any blockages found can be cleared away and this then might possibly alleviate the water logging problem with the football pitch and surrounding green space.

GRANT MONEY FOR SPORTS FACILITIES

Cllr Barnard has been and still is exploring the options of the possible construction of a stand-alone changing room and storage room facility next to the village hall. He has spoken with CDC and will be making contact with some recommended architects.

GRANT MONEY FOR VILLAGE ART PROJECT

Following on from previous correspondence

community CDC with development, Cllrs Savidge and Wilson met with artist Will Glanfield on 15th February. He is an experienced artist who uses wood to create furniture, sculptures etc. and he was commissioned by CDC to do work on the Kingsmere project in Bicester. You can see the sort of things he makes by going to his website; http://www.willglanfield.co.uk Discussion as to what could be created for our village led to the idea about possibly replacing the recently removed memorial bench at the playing field with a new set of curved benches and maybe a table. This work would fit within the available budget and would be an acceptable project for CDC to release the funding. Will also agreed that he would be able to hold a design workshop event in the village around July / August so that residents could learn about the design process and provide input of some ideas into what could be made. There would be 10-20 places available with priority being given to our village youngsters. Updates will be given closer to the time.

DOG POO

The parish council has, to date, received two of the three new dog poo bins. When the third bin has arrived, installation will be arranged. When the three new bins have been installed, there will be nine bins throughout the village so absolutely no reason for anyone to leave dog poo on our green spaces, pavements and garden paths etc.

LITTER LOUTS

If you witness people leaving bottles / cans / litter in public spaces then please report it to CDC. Again, video / photographic evidence is useful. If the problem persists, CDC can assign an enforcement officer to get involved.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

At the February meeting it was agreed that the parish council would explore the use of CCTV in an effort to try and identify acts of anti-social behaviour. However, it's very pleasing to mention that reports into the parish council about anti-social behaviour during the last month seem to have been non-existent so, on behalf of us all, many thanks to all concerned for making the change – very much appreciated. Hopefully, this will continue to be the case. Research into the installation and use of CCTV has shown that it is likely to cost a substantial sum of money to install and also that it is not a simple process to implement because of the necessary legal requirements and obligations. It was agreed that, if thought really necessary, the possible use CCTV would be considered again later in this year.

YOUTH FACILITIES

As mentioned last month, the parish council is hopeful that something can be done to improve the facilities in the village for the youngsters. This topic will be discussed in more detail at the April meeting where thoughts, ideas and proposals will be considered and the possible funding options explored.

ROADS AND STREETLIGHTS

Cllr Savidge has emailed OCC highways department yet again in an effort to get an acknowledgement and agreement from them that the surface damage and potholes to roads within our village need to be properly repaired. Our roads were looked at by OCC highways personnel at the beginning of February but the

parish council has not yet been advised as to what, if any, remedial work will be done. Trying to get this work scheduled to be done is a struggle. OCC highways do not have the budget or capacity to fix all of Oxfordshire's roads so we don't know where we sit in the list of priorities that the highways department is working to. The non-working streetlights within the village have been reported but no dates yet as to when repairs will take place. COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PLANNING

OTMOOR PARISHES LIAISON MEETING Together with the chairpersons of our local parishes, Cllr Wilson attended this meeting which took place at Merton village hall on the evening of Tuesday 27th February. This meeting was initiated by Piddington parish council. Opinion is that a small parish council on its own doesn't carry too much weight with district and county councils. They are mainly interested in the towns and large parishes. It was felt that a collective of small parish councils (representing a large combined electorate) acting together might achieve a much better response when trying to get common issues / problems resolved by CDC / OCC. Items discussed included traffic / speed, public transport, communications, road maintenance, CDC local plan, fly tipping, funding, cycle routes, GDPR and better liaison

with OCC, BCC, CDC and AVDC. It was agreed that future meetings should be held – possibly at quarterly intervals. Overall, a very worthwhile meeting. Grateful thanks to Merton parish council for hosting the meeting.

Merton's Longest-Serving Councillor Retires

Just over 80 years ago, a family by the name of Leaver moved into Merton with their very young son, Ron. Over the intervening years, the village has seen enormous changes, in its size and character, its facilities, and its residents. One thing that hasn't changed, however, is the presence of Ron. Known to almost everyone as Titch, he grew up here, then got married and brought up his own family in the village.

Throughout his life in Merton, Titch has had a profound and hugely positive influence on the community. As a young man, he initially served as the representative for Merton on the Ploughley Rural District Council, and then moved on to become a councillor with Merton Parish Council when it was formed in 1961.

At the annual parish meeting in 1963, there was a vote that a new village hall should be built. Titch set up the Pioneer Committee to take the proposal forward, and a temporary hall was initially constructed. He then became one of the founding members of the Sports Field Committee which was formed in 1964, and negotiations began the following year to buy the land that forms part of the current playing field.

In 1967, Titch was elected Chairman of Merton Parish Council, and he continued in that role until 1980. During his chairmanship, he presided over the purchase of an additional $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres to extend the playing field in 1972, the construction of the current village hall in 1974, and its extension in 1979.

In addition, Titch was involved in negotiations to obtain the land on which the bungalows in The Orchard were built, to provide affordable housing for the community. He also negotiated the purchase of Merton Wood from Thames Water, for the sum of £1.

After standing down as Chairman, Titch later served as Clerk to the Parish Council for a further 8 years, from 1983 to 1991. Over the years, in addition to his coaching of young footballers in the village, he also served on various other village bodies including the Pioneer Committee, the Sports Field Committee, the Sports Pavilion Committee and the Village Hall Committee.

To this day, Titch also prints Parish Matters and distributes it around the village. And quite apart from his work with the Parish Council, he has regularly gone out of his way to help people in the village, for example by driving them to hospital appointments when they couldn't get there by themselves.

In total, Titch served for around 28 years on the Parish Council, of which some 13 were spent as Chairman. It was therefore with great regret that we received Titch's letter of resignation at our meeting of 19th February this year.

Few people possess such selfless generosity, and there must be few villages blessed with someone so dedicated to the welfare and development of their community as Merton has been. We shall all greatly miss Titch's commitment, knowledge and wise council. On behalf of the entire village, we therefore wish to thank Titch for all that he has done over the years. We should perhaps also thank Freda for lending her husband to the village so often and for so long! Our very best wishes for the future to both of them.

Nest Boxes in Merton Wood

This year, National Nest Box Week ran from 14th – 21st February. As a result, the Woodland Group spent Sunday 18th February installing nesting boxes throughout the wood. On the day, 11 volunteers turned out to carry out the work. In total, 34 boxes of varying types were put up, including two roosting boxes for bats. As a result, we hope to see an even greater number of wild birds in the woodland during the spring and summer months.



WIDNELL PARK, PLAYING FIELD AND MEADOW

The pedestrian gate to the playing field now has

a proper latch and new fencing will soon be installed along the side of the pond, to secure the area for parents and dog owners. The Parish Council is hoping to improve the pedestrian access at the entrance to Widnell Park, which will make it more accessible for buggies and wheelchair users. It is also researching grants to provide funds for the purchase of a small community outside gym or fitness trail. The Parish Council is keen to hear any other ideas villagers might have for improving the amenities provided in this area. Please contact either Mario or Francesca. Grass cutting will begin this month.

DOG POO

With spring on its way, it is increasingly important for dog owners to be responsible when using the playing fields. Emergency poo bags have been provided and a cannister holding supplies has been positioned near the bin. These are obviously not an alternative to buying your own! Cherwell's dog warden is now officially monitoring the playing field and the Parish Council asks dog walkers not to forget to pick up after their four-legged friends.

There have been a number of reports of poo being left around the village. There is no excuse for this as there is a dog poo bin and two waste bins at Widnell Park and the playing fields, and two bins in the village: one opposite the entrance to Ludgershall Road and the other at Vicarage Lane. Please use them! The Parish Council is also investigating a dog poo bin for Lower End.

RURAL POLICING

The Bicester Rural Resilience Group investigates policing issues for Bicester and the rural villages surrounding it. Meetings are regular and are currently chaired by Ken Howard. The next meeting will be held on 13th June (Ardley Village Hall) and 5th September (Piddington Village Hall). Everyone is welcome

The group agreed that there are a number of issues shared by rural communities and intend to bring these to the attention at district and county levels. The main intention is for parishes to work together and lend each other their support. The next meeting will be held in June.

Quotations have also been received for portable Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) which can monitor traffic flow and speed at certain points in the village. The Parish Council is investigating available grants for the purchase of a unit.

Back in February Hazel Roberts gave us a vegetable talk with a different twist, how to avoid ending up with gluts of produce and ideas for different things to do with the produce to avoid boredom. VET REPORT

The Heart of the Matter

I saw many lovely pets this morning during consulting but one 12 yr old cat caused us a bit of concern. She was having a routine check up on our Healthy Pets Plan and we spotted that she had dental disease. This was starting to cause her gums to recede, a sign of progressive gingivitis, which can often lead to erosion of the enamel and tooth root problems. A routine scale and polish under general anaesthesia should stop this in its tracks.

However, I also detected a heart murmur, which is an abnormal whooshing sound heard as the heart beats. This was a new finding which is often a sign of heart disease. This in turn could make the anaesthetic riskier and so we had a dilemma. With any anaesthetic we must make a risk assessment but with only part of the information this is very difficult to do. Fortunately, we have Rachel Marsden, who is a Vet with a special interest in Cardiology. Rachel completed extra studies after her veterinary degree and has continued to gain experience and knowledge in this field over the past 20 years. I was able to admit the cat for Rachel to perform echocardiography (a heart scan) which showed that the heart had some mild changes in muscle thickness which was the cause of the murmur. The heart was beating normally and showed no signs of being under any stress. Most importantly, there was no evidence of impending heart failure.

So, within a few hours we detected a potential



problem, performed some advanced imaging tests and were able to show that the heart abnormality wouldn't create any increased risk for our anaesthetic. This was a great relief to her owner who is pleased to be able to go ahead with the dental procedure to improve her cat's oral health.

Whilst we can never totally remove the risk of an anaesthetic, the advances in veterinary medicine in my lifetime have meant that these procedures are extremely low risk. Knowing in advance of any extra risk factors like heart disease means that we can plan appropriately and minimise that extra risk. Luckily for this little old cat we have shown that her heart abnormality is only mild and won't affect her anaesthetic risk at all.
