FROM THE CLERGY TEAM

Puzzles

Each November in Oddington church, joined by Charlton, we hold a Toy Service when families bring new or good second hand toys to be given to a local children's charity as Christmas presents for deprived children. To make it more interesting we have a different theme each year, and one year the theme was puzzles, which produced a lot of lovely books, jigsaws, games and other toys relating to that subject. I managed to find a large jigsaw of the head and face of Jesus which could be assembled onto a whiteboard. This was duly done and enjoyed by the all-age congregation. But at the end of this activity, one piece was missing. Can there be anything more annoying for lovers of jigsaws? This time, however, it was deliberate, illustrating the fact that in this life we can never know or understand everything about our faith. There will always be gaps. "Now we see through a glass darkly, but then face-to-face" (1 Corinthians 13: 12-13). That is why it is called faith.

Another Puzzle which this service brought to mind was a question often asked by children, "What did Jesus really look like?". Well, of course we don't know. The New Testament doesn't tell us. But the creator of that jigsaw had the right idea because his picture was not of the fair-complexioned European-looking Jesus as so often depicted by great artist, but of a swarthy, dark-haired, brown-eyed Jewish man of Middle Eastern appearance. One thing

we can be sure of though, is that although Jesus could show righteous anger when confronted by evil, his normal expression must have been kind and welcoming. Otherwise he would not have attracted the sick, the troubles, and above all the children, as we know he did. And it really doesn't matter that we don't know what he was like physically, because we do know who he was and who he is, we know what he did and what he said, and we know what he still does in the lives of all believers

The important thing for us today is to hold fast to the Easter truth, that the risen Jesus who appeared to different people in different ways was recognised by the followers who saw him after the resurrection, and they knew him. Is he a key person in our lives - not just a puzzle, but a reality?

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The annual Parish Meeting was well attended and featured speakers from the Village Hall, Play Group, Garrison, Allotments, Neighbourhood Watch and Bulb Planting. District Councillor Lucinda Wing and District and County Councillor Dan Sames also attended.

Chairman's annual report.

The meeting was an opportunity to give updates on the achievements, on-going issues and some of the more challenging areas that your Parish Council have been involved in during the last year.

This year we have also welcomed and new Parish Councillor, Wendy Cheeseman.

Budgets

Last year I mentioned that the Parish Council has suffered increasing costs, both in staffing and grass cutting over the year, there was a slight increase again this year to cover increased costs, the loss of the New Homes Bonus which the District Council now retains. The completion of the traffic calming in Merton Road was installed by Croudace, releases some Parish Council reserves for other highways projects.

Planning

Planning issues have again taken up a considerable amount of time for the Parish Council this year.

It is exciting to see the finished scheme at Springfield Farm, which has taken 5 years hard work from the Parish Council to ensure that great scheme is built: We are on the final legals to adopt the allotments, but this has been a struggle and has been referred back to the enforcement team at the Planning Department.

Croudace Homes have now completed works for the development of 45 houses at Ambrosden Court, and we welcome all our new neighbours at Springfields Farm.

In January 2015 developers also made a presentation about a potential development of Blackthorn Hill Farm, at the edge of the village, a planning application has now been submitted and being considered by the District Council. The developer has offered to provide football pitches, allotments, woodland and play areas as part as their proposals. Despite support from the Parish Council and Parishioners the District Council's Planning Department refused this application. The developer has decided not to appeal.

In 2015, the original developer of Springfields Farm, Archstone, attended Parish Council to promote an extension to Springfields Farm of about 100 houses. An application for 85 houses was submitted a few months ago. The Parish and District Council have requested significant amendments, as part of the planning process. This application was approved by the District Council despite ongoing objections from the Parish Council and development has now commenced.

Construction of the first two warehouses on the A41 opposite Ploughley Road, despite strong objections from the Parish Council, and a number of enforcement complaints remain outstanding. A planning application to increase the size and height of future warehouses has also been opposed by the Parish Council and goes to Planning Committee on 24th May, we would ask our District Councillors to object to this detrimental increase in height, and remain

frustrated that Bicester Town Council have not joined us in objecting to these proposals.

At Wretchwick Green, there are fundamental objections from the Environment Agency with regards to flooding which have stalled the application for 1500 houses and more warehouses, and application appears to have stalled

Traffic Calming and Highways
The traffic calming scheme at the west end
of Merton Road has now been installed by
Croudace. This frees up Parish Council
reserves for alternative Highway Works, such
as replacing the railings on Ploughley Road,
where new quotations have been requested.

Oxfordshire County Council have agreed to edge the cycleway from Ploughley Road to the A41 to widen this back to its original 1.8m providing the missing link from Arncott to Bicester.

OCC are also considering a pilot scheme to allow local residents to fill pot holes, and we have been placed on a consultation list.

The installation of white lines along Ploughley Road from the A41 to the entrance to the village, has been a great success and no cars have left the carriageway since the lines have been painted.

Construction traffic

The construction traffic for network rail created considerable impact on the village roads, and in conjunction with Merton Parish Council, we are still seeking repairs to Merton Road this year. OCC advise that they have now received funds from Network Rail and we are lobbying for repairs to Merton Road.

Litter and Dog Waste
The April litter pick was a huge success and a

substantial amount of rubbish was collected, supported by the loan of equipment from CDC, who removed all the rubbish.

We are seeking volunteers for a repeat litter pick later in the year and a working group to clean the road signs around the village We will shortly be installing 2 new dog waste bins in Merton Road, and will relocate one duplicated bin in Springfields.

Crime

A review of local crime was undertaken after becoming a concern to local residents. Crime has remained relatively static in a time of a rising population in the village, but the level of Violence and Sexual Offences are a concern.

The Parish Council is promoting the setting up of a Village Neighbourhood Watch Group, to complement the village Facebook Group.

The Parish is also engaging with support organisations to reduce crime levels.

Traffic Speeds

This remains a continual concern of the Parish. The Parish will be commissioning new speed tests in 2018 to review the changes of speeds in Merton and Ploughley Roads, and will add additional surveys in Blackthorn Road and further along Ploughley Road adjacent Old Arncott Road to review the impact of previous traffic calming methods.

Previous surveys have shown that the installation of Vehicle Activated Signs show the biggest decrease in traffic speeds, with the VAS on Merton Road showing the average speed of traffic entering the village dropped from 42mph in 2006 to 27mph in 2008. The installation of white gates and the removal of white lines from the road had a minimal effect on speeds. OCC have provided initial costings of £5000 to lower the speed limit to 20mph in the village, will also examine the installation of additional VAS, and request greater

police enforcement.

LITTER PICK

One of the Parishoner proposals raised at the Annual Parish meeting was to hold a street sign and road sign clean during the summer as most of the remaining litter is now obscured by plant growth.

The Parish Council will seek to obtain or borrow appropriate equipment to enable this. Please contact the Parish Clerk for more information.

Annual open meeting

The annual parish open meeting took place in the village hall on Tuesday May 1st.

Attendees were 12 parishioners, the MOD Garrison adjutant, the secretary of the VHMC and representatives from the village community organisations and societies. Paul Wilson and Lee Savidge were re-elected as parish council chairman and vice-chairman respectively. The minutes of the open meeting and the chairman's report are available to see on the parish website.

Woodpiece Road parking

The parish council has been advised that the planning application for the phase one work is due to be considered by the CDC planning committee meeting on May 24th. It is worth mentioning that a recently discovered letter shows that on October 25th 1998, Mr Tony Lewis (Arncott PC Chairman at that time) wrote to CDC about the possible creation of off-road parking in Woodpiece Road. The possible solutions he put forward to CDC at that time were the same as those that are due to be implemented nearly twenty years later!!

Speedwatch

The parish council is planning to start this year's program towards the end of June. However, help is required from our community as volunteers are desperately needed to help out with this program. As always, we would ask you to consider becoming a volunteer. If you can help us then let us know by emailing the parish clerk, the parish email address or by contacting any parish councillor directly.

Murcott Road Build-out

The parish council has had no success in getting OCC to give a definite construction start date for this project. OCC have suggested a possible start date in August this year.

Greenfields Communal Room

The parish council voted unanimously to object to the Sanctuary Homes planning application to convert the communal room into housing. The parish council consider the communal room to be a very important and vital resource to the residents of Greenfields.

Defibrillator Units

There are two public defibrillator units within the village. One unit is fitted to the village hall outer wall facing Murcott Road – cabinet ID number AR84. The other unit is fitted at The Tally Ho Hotel and is located on the building end wall in line with the hotel car park entrance – cabinet ID number AR82. To gain access to either unit you need to dial 999 and speak with the ambulance service. The call desk operator will decide if the use of a defibrillator is necessary. If asked for then tell the call desk operator the ID number on the cabinet door. You will then be given the code number to open that door.

Community emergency response
A draft action plan has been compiled.
For the action plan to work a response
team needs to be created. A response team
cannot be created without people within our
community coming forward and volunteering
to get involved. Again, we would ask you

to consider becoming a volunteer for this team. If you can help us then let us know by emailing the parish clerk, the parish email address or by contacting any parish councillor directly.

MOD / Garrison

Kevin Jessop, the Garrison Adjutant, confirmed that if there was a need to contact the garrison out of hours then this contact should be made through the Guardroom. He confirmed that the unit at St David's Barracks is likely to remain there until 2028 when it is hoped that it will then be replaced by another unit. To ensure the viability of the Bicester Garrison it is important that there is a critical mass of soldiers to keep their structure of support – medical centre, shop, recreational facilities etc. The MOD are currently looking at their land holding and it is possible that connections with the MOD base at Kineton will be strengthened to create an arc of engineering excellence between Kineton and Bicester. He confirmed that there had been a significant investment in the DEMS unit on A site and, as a result. the DEMS presence was likely to continue into the foreseeable future. Munitions will not be stored at Arncott because Kineton has the special structures needed for munitions storage.

Oxford / Cambridge Expressway The Government is proposing a new road, the Oxford to Cambridge Expressway, between the A34 south of Oxford and Milton Keynes. Three different route corridors are being considered for the road. One option is for a route across Otmoor. Highways England are expected to announce the chosen route sometime during the summer of this year. However, County Councillor Dan Sames understands that the Otmoor option will likely be the most expensive. Please note that the parish council has no legal power(s) to deal with this. We can only reiterate previous advice – whenever possible, get witness statements, take photographs and / or record video of the behaviour and report it to the police.

Roads and streetlights

Cllr Savidge received a reply to his formal complaint to OCC regarding the condition of our roads. He was advised that OCC will look at possibly carrying out repairs where potholes in the road are of a minimum depth of 40mm and potholes in the footways / pavements are a minimum depth of 20mm. County Councillor Dan Sames is also pushing OCC to get both the potholes repaired and the road markings renewed.

Parish Council meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of the month at the village hall from 7.30pm. (Subject to any last minute cancellations).

What does Merton Parish Council get up to? If you want to know what a Parish Council actually does, the minutes of every meeting are posted on the website at: www.mertonparishcouncil.co.uk. A hard copy is also posted to the Notice Board on the side of the Bus Stop.

However, the minutes are a bit on the dry side to be honest, so here's a brief summary of what we do:

1. Planning

If you're planning any kind of extension or new build at your property, it comes before the Parish Council for consideration.

The Parish Council then either accepts or rejects your plans. Obviously there have to be good, legal grounds for a rejection — we can't just reject your plans because we don't like them.

The Parish Council's decision is not binding – the final decision is taken by Cherwell District Council, but the Parish Council's decision is a key factor in making their adjudication.

Many people choose to come along to the particular Parish Council meeting that is considering their particular plan – it often helps to explain plans in detail, rather than rely on architects' drawings – but you don't have to. We'll make sure you're informed of the decision either way.

2. Keeping a close eye on all the major infrastructure projects in the pipeline for Oxfordshire

You may have seen on the news / heard on the grapevine that huge developments are planned for Oxfordshire.

Sensitively planned, infrastructure improvements in Oxfordshire are to be welcomed – we are by far the "shabbiest" of the Home Counties with poor services, and "London prices on Birmingham pay".

However, plans for new developments need to be sensitive to the people who already live here. We've already lived through:

- Rapid expansion of Bicester
- Huge new "sheds" disrupting the traffic flows from Ploughley Road onto the A41
- The railway line with all its disruption and damage
- The development in Ambrosden and Thames

Water's almost permanent encampment there, with huge disruption, damage and cost of driving round through Fencott, Murcott and Arncott.

• There are persistent rumours that a new A34 relief road will be going in "north of Arncott". There was even a suggestion that the existing bridge just outside Merton would be used as a new junction onto the M40. The structure of that bridge is unsuited to major traffic flows, so we're hoping this is just a bad idea that will come to nothing.

We are trying very hard to get information out of the Highways Agency, and out of OCC, both of whom flatly refuse to tell us anything, despite Freedom of Information requests. We're engaging with Councillors from Cherwell District Council to try and get their help—they are willing to do what they can, but are hampered by the same refusal of the planning bodies to tell them anything.

We had a meeting with members from all the Otmoor Parish Councils this month in an attempt to create a united front to tackle any unwelcome development on what is an important wildlife habitat. You may not know that Otmoor gives a home to one of the largest starling populations in the country – perhaps 50,000 birds live here in the Summer months – which explains why we see such extraordinary aerial displays at migration times. Other species make their home on Otmoor. It is important that both human and animal lives are given proper protection from insensitive planning officials.

3. The Council "owns" and runs the Woodland (just outside Merton) on behalf of the village The Woodland is a community asset belonging to the whole village.

It's a bit of a hidden gem that some people don't

know about. It's a largish site with a stream running through it. It's carefully managed to encourage natural wildlife habitats, rambling paths, and bridleways for horse riders.

Dogs are welcomed in dedicated parts of the Woodland (although we are pretty rigorous about dog mess!)

It's a fantastic spot for toddlers and young children to put on wellington boots and explore muddy puddles, and English nature species.

It's just outside Merton on the Right Hand Side of the road to Ambrosden. It's not very well signposted at the moment, but it's the first gate / clump of trees you find as you leave the village.

4. Run the "Public Space" at the centre of the Village.

This means we make sure everyone can benefit from:

- The Village Hall, which can be used for oneoff events or regular clubs. The Beer Festival is the biggest event, but we also host children's parties, clubs and even wakes of local people.
- If you'd like to book the Village Hall, please get in contact with Wendymeads@yahoo.co.uk or call on 01865 331766
- The children's playground very popular on Summer evenings with Merton's younger residents
- •The playing field where all kinds of activities take place from football, to flying drones, to dog walking (as long as you scoop the poop!) If you know a club who'd like to use / rent the playing field, please do put us in touch with them.
- The allotments. There are 10 allotments available for rental at very low cost, of which 2 are currently available. They are currently somewhat smaller than usual for allotments, so we're considering increasing the sizes, or cutting new ones. We'll only resize if current holders consent we don't want to bump existing allotmenteers off patches they've laboured hard to develop! If you'd like an allotment, please contact clerkmertonpc@gmail.com and we'll try and sort you out.

5. Improving Merton

Current plans include:

- Moving the 30 signs on the way into the Village in an attempt to make the bends at the Ambrosden end less dangerous. Seeing a car in a ditch is a pretty common sight, and with horses and cyclists using the road frequently, a car flying round that blind corner is a serious accident waiting to happen.
- Introducing House Numbering through the Village. Many of our residents live in closes / small streets, and have "findable" addresses for DPD, Amazon etc etc etc. For those of us who live on the main road, with multiple houses starting with "Stone", or people tucked away up tracks, getting deliveries is a permanent hassle. We're only investigating this at the moment and we will be canvassing people's opinions. Feel free to share your thoughts via clerkmertonpc@ gmail.com or on 01865-331481.
- Making the Church clock run on time! As you know, the church is very ancient - the clock itself dates from the 19th century. It's our job to make it tell the right time, which is easier said than done. We're on the case, slightly at risk of injury to life and limb. Just don't tell Health and Safety!

If you can think of other ways to improve the Village, please do contact any of the councillors above.

6. Free film shows

These take place in the winter months when you're fed up of your own 4 walls! The films are good quality.

Hopefully, there will be a 2018/19 'season' of films starting in September.

7. Floodlighting the Church

You can get the church floodlights switched on for a small fee. Many residents have found this helpful in winter months when inviting nonresidents into Merton because we have no streetlighting. OXFORD - CAMBRIDGE EXPRESSWAY

Details of the preferred route will be published in July. The Parish Council will be attending a meeting to be held at Charlton on Otmoor on 8th June, a summary of which will be sent out to the village and put on the noticeboards. Route B crosses the Otmoor Nature Reserve and is likely to come close to the village. Cherwell District Council has officially written to Highways England rejecting any routes that cross the Otmoor Nature Reserve. A campaign group, the 'Expressway Action Group', has been set up by Oxfordshire residents to protest against the damage that the route could have on the area's green belt.

SEVEN STARS PUBLIC HOUSE

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The Parish Council is looking for someone in the village to act as a principal co-ordinator, who will act as the key contact point for the scheme. The role requires you to act as liaison between the police, the Parish Council, scheme members and the village, as well as non-member residents when necessary. If you are interested in this position or in being part of a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, please contact the Parish Clerk.

ROAD-CALMING MEASURES FOR THE VILLAGE

The Parish Council is waiting to hear if it has been successful in obtaining a grant towards the purchase of white gates from our County Councillor's Community Fund.

Volunteers have come forward to work with the Parish Council on setting up a Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) for the village and, as a consequence, the Council has agreed to purchase one. As well as, we hope, acting as a deterrent to speeding in the village, the device will collect data on traffic flow and speeding at certain points in the village, which can be analysed and passed on to the police as evidence.

EMERGENCY PLAN

We now have a number of emergency coordinators within the village who will work with the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee towards a plan and grant applications.

There is a request bus service from Piddington on Friday mornings to Bicester, returning early afternoon. Bus passes are not accepted on this route.

PVHMC AGM

A limited number of residents came to the Piddington Village Hall Management Committee AGM on Tuesday evening. The main topics of discussion were the kitchen refurbishment and the future of the children's play area behind the hall

Kitchen Refurbishment - The committee were asked if any information regarding the details of the final design could be shown. A mockup of the proposed design was later circulated in the village email update. PVHMC held a consultation last year. The kitchen will be wider than the existing design and will hold a fridge/ freezer. The units will be contemporary and easy to clean and the work is expected to cost around £13,000 excluding VAT (to include furniture, flooring, sinks and fittings, electrical equipment, accessories, electric work and painting). PVHMC has submitted two grant requests to WREN and Viridor. It has also received a £3000 contribution from The Pantry. It is hoped that if successful work can start this summer.

Children's Play Area - Over the years this has been a well used facility for young children, parents and grandparents. However, PVHMC now fears it will not pass its annual safety inspection in July. The CLP suggestions also indicated that many villagers found the equipment outdated compared to other play areas. However, although it is on the village hall site the play area has previously been run and funded by villagers (PVHMC pays for the insurance). The area now needs a new group of volunteers to take over this responsibility otherwise there is a very good chance this facility will be lost. There are still plenty of people making use of it and it is hoped

that someone can take up this responsibility and work with PVHMC to inject new life into what has been a much loved amenity. Please speak to Rosemary Cox (01844 237583) or Chris Weavers (specman53@yahoo.com) if you are prepared to help.

VET REPORT

Travelling Pets

It is quite common these days for owners to take their dog with them on European holidays. We have a number of clients with homes in France or Spain, so why wouldn't you take your beloved pet with you?

Dogs, cats & even ferrets can legally be taken to Europe and back again on the Pet Travel Scheme which has been in place for many years now. My dog Bella has accompanied us on 2 European trips which have been great fun and all the better for having her along.

However, there are a few things to consider before taking a pet on

holiday. Initially pets must be microchipped, have a rabies vaccination and Passport; then must wait 3 weeks before leaving the UK. When you are returning all dogs will require a tapeworm medication to be administered by a Vet and recorded in the passport within a specific time frame (not required for cats or ferrets).

Other considerations include:

Does you pet enjoy travelling – long car trips to the south of France could be very stressful for a pet who hates car journeys. Some pets would definitely be happier in a boarding kennels or with a house sitter.

In the UK we are very fortunate to be free from many parasites which are present in some areas of the mainland but these are big considerations if your pet joins you.

For example there is a parasite called Leishmania which can be carried by Sandflies in Southern Europe. If your pet is bitten &





contracts the parasite then it will be with them for life, potentially causing debilitating and life-threatening disease. Another parasite called Babesia can be contracted from ticks and causes anaemia by making the body attack its own red blood cells!

Prevention is provided by using repellent insecticides and avoiding areas known to have these conditions – the local Vet practice should be a good source of this local knowledge. Your Vet in the UK can also give advice on potential parasites and preventative measures for different areas.


Travelling with you pet can be a great experience but get some advice from your Vet in plenty of time before you head off.


