FROM THE CLERGY TEAM

To 'Give up' or to 'Give back'

Here we are in the season of Lent again and the usual dilemma of what to give up is well under way?

We don't have to just give up things but we can give back too. Consider giving the money you save from giving up chocolate or cheese, or whatever your guilty pleasure may be, to charity?

A few years ago Matt and I tried to live Lent on the minimum wage, this proved to be really challenging. The radio gave you the figures of what you would have to spend on food each week and so we went shopping as normal and soon found that our allowance had gone in no time at all. On one occasion at the checkout we had exceeded the weekly allowance for food and we had to look through our shopping and decide what to put back, it was all a bit awkward and embarrassing. The money we saved during Lent on our shopping we donated to charity. It made us appreciate how difficult it is trying to survive on a small amount of money when you needed expensive items such as washing power. Something has to give.

This year for Lent I have decided to visit the foodbank for a shift or two. There I met some really wonderful people; both clients and helpers. There were several things that I learnt from my first visit that I would like to share with you: The most popular items that they run short of are long-life milk, tinned tomatoes and tins of rice pudding. Also, toiletries such as (shampoo, shower gel, deodorant).

Secondly, the donations tend to include a lot of repetitive items such as tinned tomatoes, tins of tuna, pasta, rice, baked beans and breakfast cereal. If you are reading this and have some great simple

recipes made from tinned goods please can you pass the recipes to me and I will forward them to the foodbank. Some of the clients at the foodbank were good at cooking but others found the random items a bit challenging rather like playing 'Ready, Steady, Cook'. The foodbank have taken the initiative to provide simple cooking lessons for their users but would like some new recipes please.

Some local churches and people are holding Lent and Easter lunches and giving the proceeds to the foodbank which is a fantastic idea because it is not just food that is needed to keep it afloat.

So, what are you giving back this Lent? Could you offer something extra at Easter? The foodbank are already collecting Easter eggs to give to those clients who have children who would normally miss out.

I hope you all have a wonderful Easter and, if you have a little extra capacity, make Easter a happy time for those who are not so fortunate. When I was a fundraiser I had on my desk the words from 2 Corinthians 9:7 'God loves a cheerful giver' and by making a donation to the Bicester foodbank or another charity we can enable others to be cheerful too.

If you read this and are struggling financially to put food in your cupboards please contact 01869-357181 and they will tell you who to contact to get assistance.

May God bless you all this Easter and feed you both bodily and spiritually.



The Annual Parish meeting, is your opportunity to hear from speakers from throughout the village community and Mod about events and community groups.

This will include annual updates from the Parish Council, Garrison, Church, Village Hall Committee, Guides, Brownies, and Scouts, and hopefully updates on the allotments, and your opportunity to ask questions to the speakers. We look forward to welcoming everyone to the meeting.

VILLAGE LITTER PICK

Thank you for the great turn out for the annual village litter pick. This year we concentrated on Blackthorn Road and The Horseshoe Walk. Litter picking equipment was provided by the District Council, who also collected the rubbish.

Five Acres School kindly donated some cakes from their cake sale for refreshments.

DOG WASTE

The Parish Council is relocating and purchasing additional dog waste bins for Merton and Ploughley Road due to a growing problem with people putting dog waste into the normal parish litter bins. A friendly reminder, that dog waste bags should only be put in the red bins marked dog waste, and rubbish should only be put in the rubbish bins. The Parish Council is now paying nearly £1500 per year for the emptying of dog waste

bins, which is a sizeable proportion of our budget, but we can constrain our costs if the correct bins are used

Remember, there is up to a fine of £1000 if you are caught dog fouling.

MERTON ROAD PLANNING APPLICATION FOR 84 HOUSES

18/02056/OUT - Erection of up to 84 dwellings with public open space, landscaping and drainage, accessed from Merton Road The Parish Council is pleased that this application has been refused by the District Council. The applicants have advised they will be submitting a Planning Appeal and the Parish Council are considering what steps to take to oppose any proposals to develop this site.

ALLOTMENTS

The District Council's enforcement team remain on the case chasing Bloor Homes to complete legal paperwork to hand over the allotments. Thanks to Cllrs Lucinda Wing and Dan Sames for chasing this.

SPEED SURVEYS SHOW REDUCTION IN SPEEDING

The Parish Council commissioned 6no 7 day long speed surveys, in differing locations in three places in Ploughley Road, one position in Blackthorn Road, and two locations in Merton Road. These surveys were undertaken in February 2019, and an additional speed survey has been undertaken in Ploughley Road at the Old Arncott Road junction in March as a result of an initial review of the speed data.

The good news is measures which the Parish Council have campaigned for are reducing the speed leaving and entering the village and in the centre of the village, speeds are below 30mph, but at speeds of drivers exiting the village are still too high and more needs to be

done, so the Parish is using the speed surveys to progress discussions with Oxfordshire County Council to install additional traffic calming measures.

Since 2006, the Parish Council has installed white gates, village signs, had lines added to the edge of the carriageway on Ploughley Road between Briar Furlong, and the A41, installed dragons teeth on all four approaches to the village, removed white lines from the centre of the roads within the villages, extended verge grass cutting to all 30/40mph zones, installed a 30mph flashing sign on Merton Road, required Croudace to install a chicane and road hump in Merton Road, and developers have paid to extend the 30mph zones in Blackthorn and Ploughley Roads, and install traffic islands and bends in the Road on Ploughley Road

Using the Parish Council's resource of speed surveys dating from the 1970's, 1990's 2009, 2011, and 2012, to understand any trends, this shows 85%tile speeds of.

The data appears to suggest, the chicane in Merton Road has dropped vehicle speeds by 5mph to the speed limit for vehicles entering the village, but the speed of vehicles leaving the village is too high.

The vehicle speeds on Merton Road and outside the school on Ploughley Road meet or at below the speed limit, which may give an opportunity to apply for 20mph limits in these zones.

The changes in speed limits on Ploughley Road, appear to have reduced speeds slightly outside Three Corners Garage, but the speeds are of concern along this stretch or road, so the Parish Council is requesting a 7th speed survey to be undertaken a little closer to the edge of the village, so that we can map the impact on the junction of Old Arncott Road, where many pedestrians cross the road.

While the 30mph speed warning signs have an impact on speed as seen adjacent Briar Furlong, the speed survey results suggest VAS warning signs used without other measures such as a combination of chicanes, road humps used in Merton Road would not lower speeds to the desired levels.

The Parish Council will use these new speed surveys, and the substantial increase in traffic flow to work with the District and County Councils to develop a proposal for additional traffic calming measures.

MERTON ROAD REPAIRS

After three years campaigning by the Parish Council, OCC Highways Department have obtained compensation from Network Rail for the construction vehicle damage caused to Ploughley Road, and comprehensive repairs have been undertaken. We understand this will be white lined and topped later in the year.

A41 FOOTWAY EDGING

At the request of the Parish Council, OCC Highways have commenced cutting back the bushes overhanging the cycleway along the A41, and edging out the footway, to take it back to its original width.

FIVE ACRES SCHOOL

The proposal to replace the portacabins with two new permanent class rooms has now received planning permission. This will cause a small amount of disruption while being built, will significantly improve the quality of the school buildings, but will not increase the capacity of the school.

Councillor appointment
As reported last month, Mrs Di Selby
resigned from the parish council in January.

The vacant position was advertised and Mrs Linda Hooper kindly volunteered to stand for the position of councillor. The committee unanimously agreed to co-opt Linda onto the parish council.

HS₂

The parish council was advised last month that the railway line to the MOD base could be upgraded to allow for trains to take in hard core and aggregate for HS2 and store the materials at "G" site. The haul route for the HS2 lorries would include Palmer Avenue. Surveyors have been seen on the MOD railway line so the clerk was asked to request an update from OCC on the HS2 project.

Woodpiece Road

As reported last month, CDC will not be considering any of the work needed for the commencement of the phase 2 construction until April 2019 at the earliest. The parish council have not received any update as yet with regard to the repairs needed to the corner of Woodpiece Road.

Grant money for sports facilities
The parish council is in the process of
obtaining updated quotes for this work. When
final details and costs are known, planning /
building permission will be applied for.

Children's play areas

The parish council have agreed to formerly adopt the two play areas in Village Close.

Vehicle activated speed signs
As mentioned last month, the parish council is considering the installation of vehicle activated speed signs at the entrance / exit points on Ploughley Road at Lower Arncott and Murcott Road at Upper Arncott. Work is being done to determine the costs and best available option.

Speedwatch campaign
This initiative will start up again in the
Spring. As always, we are appealing for
volunteers to help in the running of the

volunteers to help in the running of the program. If you can help then contact the parish clerk or any parish councillor for more information

Dog Poo

Defibrillator Units

Two public defibrillator units are within the village. One unit is fitted to the village hall outer wall facing Murcott Road – ID number AR84. The other unit is fitted at The Tally Ho Hotel and is located on the building end wall in line with the hotel car park entrance – ID number AR82. To gain access to either unit dial 999 and speak with the ambulance service. The call desk operator will decide if the use of a defibrillator is necessary. If asked for then tell the call desk operator the ID number on the cabinet door. You will then be given the code number to open that door.

SPRING

Those of us fortunate enough to live in a rural location like Blackthorn or a neighbouring village will probably notice the end of winter and the arrival of spring before our urban neighbours.

While out walking around the village, we can smile as we watch new born lambs gambolling around under the ewes watchful eyes, for spring also brings out 'Charlie Fox' always ready for a lamb dinner. Hens enjoying the longer, warmer days respond by starting to lay once again, after the meagre offerings of deep winter and cockerels are shouting out that winter is over to all that must listen.

We are living in tense and difficult times and it is worth reflecting for a moment or two on the reassuring predictability of the seasons and to enjoy nature's daily gifts.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Recent Neighbourhood Watch Alerts & Local reports

Oil Theft: Thieves forced a lock on an oil tank on Thame Road (discovered around 6th March) and caused damage to the tank in order to steal the oil.

Vehicle Keyless theft - Theft of 'keyless entry' vehicles continues to be on the increase and becoming more frequent in the Thames Valley Area. Some thieves now have equipment that can fool the vehicle into thinking the key is close by and therefore open, and even start, the car without the need for the key. One criminal stands by the car with his 'receiver' whilst the other one stands closer to the house with his 'amplifier'.

Tips from the police include:

• If possible, turn off the key to stop it transmitting the signal.

- Keep keys away from the front of the house in order to reduce the chance of the thief being able to receive and transmit the signal.
- Store keys in a 'Faraday' pack or metal box. (These block the signal being transmitted)

Please be alert and report any suspicious activity to 101. If you suspect a crime is in progress, report it to 999.

Over the past 2 weeks, Oxfordshire Trading Standards has seen an increase in cold callers offering product and services such as roofing, gardening and selling mattresses door to door.

Their advice is 'If you're not sure, don't open the door'

- 1. Use a door chain to check who is calling.
- 2. Don't trade on the door step & never hand over money up-front or pay cash.
- 3. Ask a trusted friend or family member for advice on reputable traders.
- 4. Display a "No Cold Calling" sticker outside your door.
- 5. Always report any suspicious activity.

Please also keep an eye out for any neighbours who may be vulnerable to this type of scam.



When you come right down to it, what's the Parish Council FOR?

The PC is going through a period of reflection and self-examination. Why, we ask ourselves, is there a Parish Council at all?

Since the last AGM, councillors have arrived at the following set of priorities. We want to serve the needs of the Village effectively, with a particular focus on:

- The lack of a community heart
- Exploiting and protecting community assets
- Targeting the Precept (income) at what's important
- Improving communication by inviting your opinions, and by explaining our decisions

Lack of community heart

We currently don't have much in place that functions as a "heart" for the village. The loss of the pub has had an ongoing negative effect. The Beer Festival has now come to a close.

There are some things in place which provide a focal point including the Church, and the Film Nights. The first MacMillan Coffee Morning was a great success. These have a role to play in building community spirit.

Is there a role for the Parish Council in organising a major village event specifically designed to replace the Beer Festival. We've tossed around ideas including an Oktoberfest. What do you think?

Oxford Cavaliers and village heart

This is where we hope the Cavaliers will have an important role to play within the village.

They <u>are</u> paying us a fee to rent the Field and Hall, and this will play an important role in digging us out of a financial hole. But we don't see the finances as the major impact of hosting the Cavs within our village.

We're really hoping many of us will want to get involved as spectators with tournaments and matches held on Saturdays over the summer. There are currently 5 Saturday sessions planned.

After the matches there will be a get-together, with food and drink being sold. BBQs will be held whenever possible, and all of us invited along. It'll be something like a pop-up pub, hopefully in the sunshine!

Of course, we also hope that children and

teenagers from the village will want to join their youth teams which train on Tuesday nights during their season (April – August). The village has pretty much nothing to offer to our younger residents – I really hope that some of them at least might give Rugby a whirl. Remember, it's girls as well as boys!

For those of us who still have concerns about hosting the Cavaliers in Merton, we're paying particular attention to solving potential problems including:

- · Traffic and Parking
- · Anti-social behaviour
- Alcohol consumption (with a focus on prohibiting under-age drinking)
- Light and noise pollution

The pitch has been sited so that it sits as far away as possible from the houses that overlook the field, and from the Hall itself. This should reduce or remove the risks of:

- Noise and light pollution
- Balls entering gardens
- Balls breaking windows

It's also sited as far away as possible from the <u>Children's Play Area</u>. Even during match days, children should be perfectly safe to play in there, and they will certainly be permitted to do so.

The old football goal-posts have been removed, but have been replaced with Rugby posts.

It's important to state that the Fields will be completely available to us all, as they are now, except when the pitch is in use. Dog owners are asked to be extra scrupulous in scooping the poop – but we ask that anyway, so no change there...

Limited duration

We're looking at the Cavs are coming for <u>one</u> <u>year only</u> at this stage, on a kind of trial and error basis for both sides. If the benefits of having

them here don't materialise, or if any problems can't be overcome, we'll call it a day.

Community Assets

It's definitely is the role of the Parish Council to seek ways to improve our shared facilities – which means the Hall and Field, and the Woodland.

As I mentioned in the last Parish Matters, we need to refurbish the Village Hall.

We've fixed broken roof tiles, which should tackle the damp patches inside. Now we're planning to give the interior a good lick of paint.

In terms of major developments, we have no choice but to tackle the storage area to the back of the Hall – it's wide open to the elements, and the chairs and tables stored there might as well be kept outdoors.

In addition to rebuilding this storage area, do you have any ideas about changes you'd like to see made to the Hall. At least a couple of villagers want to knock it down and replace it with an oak-framed building – which would be lovely but probably cost-prohibitive. Does the Hall meet your needs? Do you use it? Would you use it more if it could be improved?

The Woodland continues to be a valuable asset for the Village for people who enjoy walking / riding there. We're grateful to the doughty band of volunteers who maintain it, often through wind and rain.

However, the Council doesn't actually know:

- •How many people actually use the Woodland?
- Do you even know what it has to offer?
- What do you use it for when you do go?
- Is there anything else you'd like to see there that would make you use it more?
- Would you like to join the volunteer group, but don't know how to?

Improved Communications

The Parish Council has historically not been great at communicating. We've tried to fix this via:

- Publishing a detailed article in Parish Matters every month
- Posting on the village Facebook page
- Developing a new website, with some decent content
- Distributing questionnaires and leaflets highlighting particular issues

Traffic Calming Group

Thank you to so many of you who filled in and returned the questionnaire we circulated asking your opinions on speeding and other problems with traffic through our village. And thank you, also, for turning up to the meeting held at the Hall on 13th March - 41 people (and 1 dog) turned out which was great. 52 questionnaires were received.

There are 138 dwellings in the Village, so over a third of you felt strongly enough to give up your time to respond – which indicates that this is indeed an issue people care about.

The upshot of the meeting was to set up a campaigning group to address the problems with speeding and weight of traffic. This was the approach adopted by Islip Parish Council in their successful campaign to get the speed limit through their village dropped to 20mph.

I'll keep you posted on further developments via Parish Matters and the Parish Council website. It's worth noting that the issue of speeding was raised by a village resident who came to the last Parish Council meeting with his concerns. A lot of the work of the Parish Council is about risk assessments and setting the church clock, but we can also act as a mouthpiece for the village as a whole. If there are other issues you think the Parish Council could help address, please do attend a meeting, or simply contact one of your councillors.

Expressway and Relief Road

This probably represents the greatest threat to our health, wealth and well-being. And there's currently nothing we can do about it. Various councillors have attended various events / groups and the truth is that, until they actually publish a proposed route, we're boxing with ghosts. All we know is that the Expressway won't affect Otmoor, but what that means for villages which border it is anyone's guess.

Freedom of Information requests have been submitted regarding the routes under consideration, but they've been turned down for reasons I don't pretend to understand.

We will keep you posted when we hear something concrete. We will fight any proposal that has a negative impact on the life of the village. But, for the time being, we're in limbo.

The Appeal Inquiry started 26th March with a revised timetable lasting for 7 days, subject to the involvement of the MoD. At the time of writing it was not known whether this would be an extension of the existing timetable or an adjournment to a later date for days 5-7. The Parish Council will continue to advise through the village email and noticeboards.

The inclusion of an extra two days has meant that legal costs have increased. 

VET REPORT

Vaccination of Pets

Protective vaccination in pets (as well as in people) seems to cause debate and controversy from time to time. Some concerns are reasonable; whilst others are unscientific and unhelpful. Our friend Dr Google can provide useful information, as well as unhelpful misinformation; so take care when browsing online for "facts". The MMR vaccination scares of the past, which were based on what has been proven to be flawed scientific information, has led to measles outbreaks which have put many lives at risk.

In pets, we advocate vaccinating regularly to maintain immunity. In dogs, there are some conditions that we vaccinate for less often than others. This is based on what we know about duration of immunity for the majority of the canine population. The other benefit from vaccination booster visits is a full health check which is a very important part of preventative healthcare.

Many people ask what is covered by the vaccine? The answer is quite extensive, so I'll give some information about 3 commonly vaccinated conditions in pets.

Feline herpesvirus & calicivirus – these 2 viruses can cause the symptoms which are commonly known as "cat flu" even though neither is actually an influenza virus. Unprotected cats can develop sneezing, a snotty nose and sore throat, conjunctivitis and sometimes ulcers on the cornea, which in severe cases can cause rupture of the eyeball. Some cats will get ulceration on the tongue also. Along with all this they feel very unwell, have a high temperature, don't want to eat and will soon become dehydrated. Once you've seen a 6 week old kitten fighting for

its life with cat flu you'll never want to see it again! Myxomatosis in rabbits – this is a terrible disease caused by a virus which is endemic in the wild rabbit population in the UK. It can be caught by direct contact with affected rabbits but also can be transmitted on insects such as flies. Unprotected rabbits develop swelling of the lips, nose, eyelids and genitals. A creamy discharge is often present from the eyes & nose and the rabbit is systemically very unwell and can easily die from not eating and dehydration. Often rabbits are euthanased with this condition though, with intensive nursing & treatment, some will survive.

Parvoviral infection in dogs – this is another very serious viral infection seen most commonly in puppies and young dogs. The most obvious signs are severe vomiting and watery, bloody diarrhoea. This rapidly causes dehydration, shock and often death. The virus also affects the dog systemically and can even cause heart disease in very young puppies if the mother hasn't passed on any immunity ie if the bitch hasn't been vaccinated. Treatment is intensive, costly and often unsuccessful.

There are many other conditions covered by vaccination and I'll write about some others next month. Vaccination is a modern invention which has led to a huge reduction in certain conditions. It isn't totally without the risk of side effects but in most cases the benefits far outweigh any risks, but this is a discussion to have with your vet – not with someone on an internet forum who isn't aware of all the facts.
