FROM THE CLERGY TEAM

CS Lewis is well known to have been an Oxford scholar. You can't live where we live and not know that he lived close by. And the mention of his name brings to mind book titles such as: 'The Chronicles of Narnia', 'Screwtape Letters', 'Mere Christianity', 'The Problem of Pain', and 'Surprised by Joy'.

He was a friend of JRR Tolkien and their exploits together are well covered in films or in visits to exhibits in Oxford. We conveniently overlook the fact that he was also an academic at that other place (Cambridge) – hardly worth a mention!

I wonder if you knew that he also had links in Chicago. I had the opportunity to stay with the leading authority on CS Lewis, Jerry Root, who wrote 'The Quotable Lewis'. Jerry was very proud of their museum at Wheaton college which contained many belongings of CS Lewis which had been bequeathed to the college.

Despite the fact that the museum was closed at the time, I was allowed to see some of the exhibits there including the wardrobe. Of course, I'd read the book and, of course, I had heard that the story was inspired by an actual wardrobe in CS Lewis' study where he wrote the book, but I never expected to see the wardrobe 'in the flesh'.

Some wag had put a notice next to the wardrobe: 'Wheaton College takes no responsibility for anyone getting lost in this wardrobe'! How apt!

One Christmas, many years ago, I arranged for the school chapel where I was working to be transformed into Narnia. The porch was adorned with wardrobe doors, a rail of fur coats hung inside. There was fake

snow on the floor and a Narnia lamp post as you entered the chapel, and the pulpit was adorned as a roaring lion. I dressed as the grandfather for our Carol Service and we explored having a spiritual adventure together.

It was a memorable occasion as we looked at the themes of good and evil, a parallel spiritual world, a spiritual battle, the concepts of time, consequence and forgiveness, together with the mind-blowing consideration of resurrection.

CS Lewis was so clever at weaving these theological themes into a story book for children. We owe him a debt of gratitude for being able to pen words about the complex in such an understandable way. I truly hope that we are able to imitate his ability in some small way across the benefice as we try to explain the limitless qualities of God in words we can all understand

Meanwhile, in the spirit of thankfulness, we have Harvest time around the corner when we take time out to thank God for His provision once again, and also to thank our farming community who work so hard throughout the year and especially at this time. We prayed for God's blessing on their work at Rogation and now we see the fruit of all their efforts.

Harvest is nature's way of explaining something about the faithfulness and providence of God, how He is the Creator who sustains life throughout the world – without using words at all!



COUNCILLOR RESIGNATION - Andy Poppitt has resigned from his seat on the parish council. Andy became a councillor in November 2017 and the parish council would like to say thank you to Andy for his help and involvement.

HS2 - Eiffage Kier (main contractor) has no current plans to use G site or the railway for aggregate distribution. A small part of H site is being used for early works activities. Discussions about the possible future use of A site will be investigated.

WOODPIECE ROAD PARKING – phase 2 - CDC has begun initial work for phase 2 and will hopefully update the parish council on a monthly basis as to what progress has been made.

GRANT MONEY FOR SPORTS & OUTDOOR GYM FACILITIEs – CDC has given the go-ahead.

The parish council now has great deal of work to do to arrange for the new additional facilities.

ADDITIONAL & NEW PLAY EQUIPMENT -

The parish council is currently investigating the best options, price and supplier(s) for the provision of additional and new play equipment.

ADDITIONAL GRANT FUNDING – This funding will be applied for and used over time for any improvements to the village hall and for any suitable indoor sports activities within the hall.

VEHICLE ACTIVATED SPEED (VAS) SIGNS

AND ROAD MARKINGS – The consultant who advises OCC about road signage and markings is helping the parish council with this project.

FREE RANGE EGG PRODUCTION UNIT OFF

PALMER AVENUE – The planning application was withdrawn. It remains to be seen if a new application will be submitted.

Autumn Beckons!

From The Blackthorn Codger

April is the traditional time to spring clean the house, throw open the windows, turn off the central heating and prepare for summer as the days grow longer!

Conversely September is the month light late evenings shorten and we start clearing the debris from our summer flower beds, digging over our summer vegetable beds, transplanting any perennials, pruning ornamental shrubs and trees, cutting back hedges especially our natural Saxon hedges with all the 'aitches' hawthorn, hazel, holly, hornbeam and squeeze in that final cut of the lawn, or two, as we so often seem to get that final spurt of growth resulting in that unkempt tufty look.

September is also the month when we should finally start to take some of those maintenance repairs seriously, the slipped tile or slate on an outbuilding or house roof, the cracked or broken pane in a shed or summer house window, taking a tiny fraction of an inch off a sticking or sagging door, sealing that leaking gutter and making sure that fences are secure enough to withstand the inevitable winds.

September is also the month when much of our fruit will be ripe for the picking; apples, pears, damsons, quinces. Time to dust off the apple racks, carefully inspect apples and pears and carefully wrap the perfect ones in newspaper and store them in the cool through the winter, ready to be enjoyed right through to spring. It is time to bring out the demi-johns, buy litres of cheap gin or vodka and make those wonderful winter country drinks like damson or quince gin and vodka. As autumn progresses, we will be able to add sloe gin or sloe vodka to that delightful cocktail list.

As nature's bounty starts to run scarce for our native birds it is time to check that the bird table is secure, or if you don't have one, now is the time when perhaps you might consider erecting one. Wild birds are a joy to watch as they feed and they will more than pay you back in Spring by eating all those bugs, slugs and snails from your vegetable and flower beds.

NO EXPRESSWAY GROUP

The No Expressway Group (NEG) continues to be busy with more orders for "Under Threat" signs, four village and town meetings and two travelling pagoda events. Winslow Town Meeting was particularly successful, attracting over 250 people, generating more requests for presentations and contacts with more skilled people along the Arc who can help our campaign.

Have you registered as a Highways England Stakeholder yet?

Unfortunately, Highways England (HE) gave us incorrect information about the stakeholder sign up process for individuals. Having spoken with HE directly again, we can clarify that Individuals currently need to register using this process -

Please contact us if you have any problems. We've been told that **ALL group and individual stakeholders**, will receive the same consultation information at the same time.

Update on NDAs. HE has finally provided us with a list of the eight parties it asked to sign NDAs for the expressway project, so it could discuss route options. Those that signed are England's Economic Heartland (EEH), HS2, Oxfordshire County Council, South Oxfordshire District Council (DC), Vale of White Horse DC, Milton Keynes Council. Buckinghamshire County Council Aylesbury Vale DC refused to sign. Why didn't HE want Cherwell DC's input? Corridor B1/ B3 goes through Cherwell. Why do businesses involved in Local Enterprise Partnerships (part of EEH) get to see and feedback on route options, when the general public doesn't so far?

General election & HE Consultation are opportunities to have your say. There are more signs that politicians are questioning the Ox-Cam Expressway. Several Councils have already voted to oppose the proposed

Expressway, including Oxford City Council, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse DCs. Aylesbury Vale DC will debate and vote on an expressway motion on 18th September. Cambridge MP Daniel Zeichner has written to the Secretary of State for Transport, Grant Shapps MP, to ask for the proposed expressway to be scrapped and East West Rail be electrified. When a general election is called, we have a fantastic opportunity to ask candidates their (and their party's) position on the Ox-Cam expressway and one million homes along the Arc. How can they justify 100% increase in Oxon's population by 2050 when the national average growth forecast is 16% in the same period?

When the HE consultation on route options is announced, everyone should be involved and contribute. This is our first opportunity to have our say! Get the latest news and updates on noexpressway.org.

CHILDREN'S PLAY AREA - Viridor Credits have agreed to allocate a grant of £31,241 towards the renovation of the play area behind the village hall.

This, along with a £19,526 grant from Cherwell District Council and donations from the Parish Council, The Pantry and the kind folk who organise the Bike Night in Ludgershall, means that work can now begin. Many thanks to Mario Terzino for his perseverance and organisational skills, the Village Hall Committee for their support and to Olivia Barrett and Morwen Ashton for their village fundraising efforts over the last year. Updates will be posted via the village email.

NETWORK RAIL, PIDDINGTON ROAD

CLOSURES - Between 30th September and 5th October, and again from 7th October to 12th October, Lower End, Marsh Gibbon Rd, plus Bicester Rd from the A41 will close at night from 2200 hrs to 0530 hrs. This is due to essential works being undertaken by Murphy's on behalf of Network Rail who will be adding or widening passing places ready for the delivery of materials in connection to the Blackthorn – Piddington embankment work. No work will be undertaken in the village itself.

OX-CAM EXPRESSWAY - The Parish Council wrote to its District Councillors to put pressure on Cherwell District Council to hold a meeting on the subject in the same way that recent events have been held in Oxford and Brill. There has been no feedback to date. The Parish Council has been listed as a stakeholder for consultation purpose.

HS2 - Eiffage Kier (working on HS2) has been in discussion with the MoD about using its local land for offices, logistics and materials storage. It has already moved offices into 'H' site, and the potential use of the old Home Office area at 'A' site is under consideration. A Community Liaison Officer for Eiffage Kier is in contact with all local Parish Councils. Updates will be sent out on village emails and through Parish Matters.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS - The new entry system is now active. The new key code entry pad is situated to left of the doors. Regular hall users have been issued with a 4-digit code unique to them. The old system has been decommissioned and no longer works. A new set of oak veneered doors will be fitted in the autumn.

The new heating system should be installed during the week beginning 11th November. The hall will be closed to users that week, and possibly part of the following week. The new system will be based on air sourced heat pumps, which will also cool the hall in the summer. Heat loss will be improved by the recently installed interior double doors, which form a new entrance lobby. The interior of the main hall will be decorated after the new heating is up and running.

VET'S REPORT

The Other Tom Jones

This month I have a story about Tom Jones – not the one you're thinking of but a black & white feline version with a heart of gold who sadly

succumbed to cancer recently at the age of 18 yrs.

Tom was an occasional visitor to Bicester Vets. He had been adopted from a farm where he had lived the first half of his life but readily adapted to life indoors. Initially Tom started coming over for meals before heading back to the farm. Eventually, he decided that the easy, indoors life suited him better, so he moved himself in!

Tom was very easy going and got on well with the dog and the other cats. He

was especially friendly with "Baby" and they enjoyed lying together grooming each other. His days, like many cats, were spent eating and sleeping. He would sometimes sit patiently waiting for his owner to get up out of the sofa so he could jump into the recently vacated warm spot.

Tom was a pretty healthy cat. We saw him for occasional dentistry and in later life a respiratory issue which didn't cause him any ongoing concerns. However, in June this year he suddenly was unable to use his left back leg properly and was struggling to walk at all. An x-ray showed that Tom had a tumour growing in the bone below his left knee. This may have been growing for many weeks without affecting him particularly. As the tumour grew it gradually

weakened the bone until suddenly it fractured through the weakness.

At 18 yrs old, the difficult decision was made to end his pain by euthanasing Tom. Thanks to pain

killers, he was comfortable and in good spirits when the time came. Tom went to sleep peacefully with his owner by his side.

This type of tumour is called an osteosarcoma. It is rare in cats and more often is seen in a toe where amputation can be curative. We felt that Tom wasn't able to manage with amputation of his whole back leg primarily due to his age. If he were younger & fitter this would certainly have been an option.

We fondly remember Tom as the slightly battered farm cat who "upgraded" his lifestyle and made the most of his new situation. He was a gentle cat with a lovely manner and he is sorely missed by his owner.
