FROM THE CLERGY TEAM

December is upon us once again and with it the usual frenetic round of activity - Christmas events, carol singing, planning, food shopping and present wrapping. This year, one more thing to add into the mix is the General Election on 12th December, something that many might feel puts a certain dampener on the festive spirit. I can't help feeling sorry for all the brave souls who are standing for election (especially brave in the light of the widespread reports of intimidation and bullying of many outgoing MPs) trying to campaign when evenings are long and dark and people probably feel they have other things to do than listen to candidates trying to win their votes.

Nevertheless, most of us realise the particular significance of this election since it will surely determine what happens about Brexit, what action with regard to our rapidly heating planet will be taken, as well as deciding what other issues too long neglected will be prioritised.

Yet, many will wonder whether any government will be able to end the paralysis at the heart of national life or conduct debate in less shrill terms. Many of us will be praying for an outcome that brings politics out of disrepute and our country out of the morass of stalemate. And if we don't know what to pray, I do commend a very thoughtful, theologically informed article our Bishop of Oxford has written about this on his blog at https://blogs.oxford.anglican.org/how-to-pray-for-thisgeneral-election/

Christmas is often regarded as a time for putting

aside our differences as the Christmas Truce in the trenches in 1914 demonstrated. On this occasion, soldiers on each side were able to recognise the humanity of those against whom they were fighting and were able to allow that truth to trump other considerations for this short period. It reminds us too of the power that Christmas still has to bring out the best in people and to bring unlikely people together in recognition of something more important.

At the heart of Christmas is a story involving an event common to every human society — the wonder and the vulnerability of a newborn baby. Nothing else would have had the power to gather people from such different backgrounds as shepherds and wise men.

Whatever the election outcome, vulnerability is part and parcel of our human condition and in his parable of the Good Samaritan Jesus reminds us that when one human responds to another in human need, race, tribe or politics become unimportant.

May you be blessed by the hope and promise of the Christ child this Christmas.



TRAFFIC CALMING/ SPEEDING

The Parish Council co-ordinated a number of speed surveys in the village in February 2019, which highlighted speeding issues throughout Ploughley Road, and Blackthorn Roads. Over the last few months the Parish Council have had a series of meetings with the County Council to review road safety. This has now progressed to the design stage and the Parish Council is negotiating funding. With road build outs costing £7000 each and speed humps at £5000 each, major works will significantly exceed Parish Council reserves and budgets so the Parish Council is concentrating on the locations with the

greatest issues. You will notice survey work being undertaken around the village over the next few weeks

VILLAGE HALL RE-OPENS

PARISH COUNCIL - Parish council meetings take place in the village hall at 7:30pm on the first Tuesday of the month. Parishioners are welcome to attend. HS2 – The parish council has been advised that site H is being used for an office location for doing early works and this will continue for the foreseeable future. Regarding site A, some environmental surveys have been carried out with a view to developing the scope in preparation for a planning application. Extent and details not yet fixed. The parish council will ask to be kept up to date with developments.

Woodpiece Road parking – phase 2 – CDC has already authorised this work to be done. The parish council has contacted CDC and asked for an update

as to when the work will be done. CDC cannot give dates at this time. No dates have been given. Outdoor gym eqp, new / additional play eqp & new changing room / showers – These projects are very involved. Work is ongoing and will be ongoing for some time to come.

Vehicle activated speed (VAS) signs and road markings – The parish council has been advised that OCC have given permission for a VAS unit to be fitted onto and hard wired into the street lamp post near to the new road build-out along Murcott Road and virtually opposite the entrance to Village Close. An unmetered electrical connection agreement needs to be arranged with Southern Electric Power Distribution. When this has been done OCC will install an electrical isolator to the lamp post and the VAS unit will be ordered and fitted. The parish council has asked for additional safety markings to be painted onto the village roads.

Green Lane / Village Green - replacement posts — The parish council has accepted a contractor's quotation for the necessary work to be done. The old posts have been removed. An order for new oak posts has been placed. The delivery date is to be advised. When weather and ground conditions are favourable, the new posts will be installed and the ground area will be levelled out as best as can be achieved.

Defibrillator Units - Arncott has two public defibrillator units. One unit is at the village hall on the wall facing Murcott Road – ID no. AR84. The other unit is at The Tally Ho Hotel on the building end wall in line with the car park entrance – ID no. AR82. Telephone the ambulance service on 999 to gain access. Tell the call desk operator the ID number on the cabinet door.

Litter louts and fly tipping - Please report this to CDC. Video / photographic evidence is useful. If the problem persists, CDC can assign an enforcement officer to get involved.

Anti-social behaviour - Get witness statements, take photos and / or record video of the behaviour and report it to police. The parish council has no legal power(s) to deal with this.

The Common Cold

It's that time of year when all around you, people are coughing and sniffing. In traditional Chinese medicine (TCM) it is thought that the cold enters through the back of the neck. The theory is that wind batters down the body's defences and the cold slips in through the gap created. So, scarves and hats are very much encouraged through the winter months.

Spotting the very early signs of a cold are essential if you want to be able to do something about it. If you are feeling slightly chilly, or get that tickle on the roof of your mouth, this is the time to act.

Creating a sweat is the best first defence. The traditional hot toddy works a treat for this and best taken last thing before going to. I like to do this alongside a teaspoon of the herb pelargonium sidoides - one of a few herbs with some research supporting its effectiveness. Once taken, slip on a thermal top and have an early night.

My hot toddy:
1 shot of whisky
1 teaspoon of honey
2 shots of Rochester ginger drink
Top up with hot water and sip.

Road Safety

For some time, the A41 junction at the end of Lower Road has been a safety concern for many villagers. Exiting Lower Road could be difficult as traffic heading west cuts into the exit area to get around traffic turning right towards Launton. There is a collision risk as villagers pulling up to the line could be struck by a fast-moving car coming from the right. Oxfordshire roads department has been examining ways to improve the junction and has recently added painted hatching. The purpose is to discourage west bound traffic from cutting in and potentially colliding with traffic waiting to exit from Lower Road. This has been a dangerous junction for many years, with multiple collisions and in the last two years a fatality. Hopefully this change will improve safety.

There will be a Coffee Morning on Thursday 5th December and will include mince pies and shortbread.


Our final Pub Night will be Friday 20th December and we hope to see you there.

The Merton Traffic Calming Group Update

First an apology - due to a series of unfortunate events and personal circumstances the Traffic Calming Group has had a much slower start than we all hoped for.

However, things are beginning to move forward now.

There are three key areas we are focussed on as a Group at the moment, that we are hoping to drive forward in the next two or three months.

Speed Indicator Devices (or SID for short) This is quite exciting!

The Group has to date secured a total of £6,000 of funding specifically to install a Speed Indicator Device at each end of the village.

We have some challenges around siting and possibly powering the units, although battery or solar powered units are available, but we are optimistic these can be overcome.

The data collection options are particularly

interesting, if we can afford them (or raise additional funds), as they would in effect create a traffic survey, the output of which could drive further potential initiatives in the future, such as a 20mph speed limit.

The Siting Of The 30mph Restriction Signs

Fred Foxon, who is Chair of the group, has unearthed regulations that we are hoping will strengthen our case to have both signs repositioned to give the village greater protection from cars as they enter the village and then choose to slow down after the sign, as opposed to before it. This is particularly pertinent at the Islip end, where the off-side sign is hidden behind a tree.

Speed Awareness Signage

We have secured a set of six speed awareness signs (three designs in sets of two). To be honest, their exact whereabouts is unclear at the moment but we should have them in the village in the next week or two.

We are aware that the use and positioning of these signs may require some consensus from villagers. I would suggest that once we have taken ownership of the signs, we publicise the next meeting on Facebook and anyone who has any thoughts about this would be welcome to come along and air their views.

We will post pictures of the signs here once we have them, so everyone can see exactly what we are talking about.

There are several other projects that we are pushing forward at the moment, and we will update everyone on those if and when they begin to come to fruition.

In the meantime, our apologies again for the tardiness of getting the Group up and productive, as well as for the absence of updates - they will be more regular from now on, we promise!!

We're still looking at a longer term solution for making the Hall fit for the next couple of decades – but it's being properly looked after and maintained for the time being.



The Parish Council has received notification that the Inspector has upheld the Appeal and has given consent for the above planning application on Widnell Lane for six pitches. Whilst accepting local concerns he felt many of these could be addressed and that ultimately the need for pitches in the District was paramount. PPC

is now liaising with the owners of the site. The request for costs against the District and Parish Councils was turned down by the Inspector.

VET'S REPORT

A Major Lumpectomy

Lewis is a very big, very strong & very "enthusiastic" visitor to Bicester Vets. At 40kg he's probably a bit overweight, even for a tall male Labrador, but nonetheless he is fit and strong and in good health. He is even a regular blood donor; which is a great service he does for his fellow canines (not

that he actually has a choice) – but he seems very happy to give his blood with the same enthusiasm with which he approaches everything in life!

As Labradors age they often develop soft, fatty lumps (lipomas) which usually aren't a problem for the dog.

However, some of these lumps can grow to a very large size

in which case they can become cumbersome for the dog to carry around and sometimes they can inhibit the movement of a leg. In these cases, it is usually sensible to remove the lump.

Lewis has suffered from a number of theses lumps, many of which were small and inconsequential whilst others have become very large and problematic. Today Lewis came in for the removal of 2 fatty lumps. The larger of the two was the size of a bread & butter plate in diameter. We had been monitoring its growth

over the past 6 months and could feel that it seemed to be growing underneath his shoulder blade (scapula) which gave us cause for concern.

Lewis had a routine blood test in the morning to check that his blood count and organ functions were ok before anaesthetising him ready for surgery. As the surgery progressed it became apparent that the lipoma was located underneath some of his chest muscles and was tightly attached to his rib cage. It extended back towards his last rib and forward underneath the scapula as predicted. Luckily the lump was well defined and separated from most tissues

easily. There were some firm attachments to the ribs but once these were resected the huge fatty lump was removed. The lump must have weighed over a kilo and covered both my hands when holding it.

Once a mass like this is removed from between tissues it leaves a cavity which we call "dead space". We want the

tissues to heal themselves back together so that the space disappears but this isn't always this straightforward. Dead space, especially near a moving leg, has a tendency to get fluid build-up called a seroma which will slow the healing process. To reduce this risk, I placed a

number of flat latex "drains" which are intended to create a

track for fluid to escape from the cavity to the outside thus allowing the healing to continue. Lewis was full of beans when he was collected this evening. He was wearing a medical pet shirt which is like a tight pet T-shirt. This will create some gentle pressure on the area as well as preventing Lewis from licking or chewing the wound & drains. All going well he'll be back next week for the drains to be pulled out (just in a consultation). Then we'll check him again a week later and hopefully that will be

the end of this episode.

This is not the first time Lewis has had a large lipoma removed and unfortunately, due to his predisposition, it may not be the last. I always look forward to seeing Lewis and his owner at the surgery; they both have a great approach to life and are always in good spirits. Here's hoping his wounds heal uneventfully and that his lipomas stay at bay for a long time!

OXFORD CAMBRIDGE EXPRESSWAY

NO EXPRESSWAY GROUP

The No Expressway Group (NEG) has launched the brand new 'STOP the Ox-Cam Expressway' NEG Petition on the NEG website noexpressway.org/petition-signup. What? Another petition? Some previous petitions have been locally focused or have been closed early on Parliament's petition website due to the election and will not be

reopened or debated.

This new petition aims to bring together in one place all opponents of the expressway and of the associated over inflated housing targets and destruction of our environment across the whole Arc. As it is NEG's petition it's not subject to the vagaries and restrictions of those on the Parliamentary site and we'll be able to keep you up to date with its progress. Whatever other petitions you may have signed, please sign this new one now and ask all your friends and family to as well! We need to get so many signatures the Government daren't ignore it. The NEG Election Challenge! NEG is challenging every parliamentary candidate along the Arc to support our campaign, demanding that the new government scraps the Ox-Cam Expressway and inappropriate housing targets (3-6 times ONS national average growth rates by 2050), and instead invests in public transport systems such as a fully electrified East-West Rail. Build the railway. Stop the expressway!

In the news (full details on noexpressway. org):\

Highways England – have delayed consultation on route options further due to the general election.

Cherwell District Council – Has missed an opportunity for substantive debate on the Ox-Cam Expressway, by voting to approve Cllr Wood's motion to review the impact on local plans of route options once known, and until then "maintain an open mind" about the expressway. Wherever it goes, the expressway will cause tremendous environmental damage. Is CDC happy to see such damage if it's not in CDC?

Oxon County Council votes to oppose the Ox-Cam Expressway – Having passed a motion to make Oxon carbon neutral by 2030, OCC voted to oppose the expressway, with 35 in favour, 11 against with 8 abstentions. Hudspeth, Leader of OCC, also wants to "wait until we see exactly what the details are." Cllr Constance said claims that the road would encourage creation of dormitory towns for London commuters were unfounded. BUT. the Expressway and housing aspirations of one million new homes along the arc (confirmed in July by MP Robert Jenrick), will cause destruction wherever they are. And the NIC commissioned 5th Studio report shows housing targets include 240,000 homes for London overspill.

Bidwells (property consultants) launch alarming 'Radical Regeneration Manifesto' with Perkins & Will (global architects) and Blackstock (property PR consultancy). They want to "think big about UK regeneration" across the country, starting with the Ox-Cam Arc. They are lobbying for special planning and compulsory purchase powers to speed up planning. They want to "get the politicians out of the planning process." Yes, our democratically elected officials, who don't always get things right, but are answerable to us! How does this sit with the democratic process and community involvement?
