On the 24th November Cromarty Community Rowing Club proudly launched their new St Ayles Skiff 'Tess'.

Tess is the club's 2nd skiff, and the third in Cromarty. Amazing as it comes only 18 months or so after the launch of their first skiff 'Cromba', such has been the uptake and interest in rowing in our community over the period.

'Tess' is named after the late Iain Robertson's boat. Iain's family donated the money to buy the kit so that the skiff would be a legacy to be used and enjoyed by as many in the community as possible. Everyone associated with the club is profoundly grateful to Rachel and family for this gesture, it means more to us than words can say.

The boat was blessed by our local minister Terry Burns and then Rachel further blessed the boat with some humorous words about Iain and the original Tess and also a bottle of Happy Chappy to anoint the skiff.

Cromba, along with skiffs from Fortrose, Findochty, Sutor Skiffies and Strathpeffer were present for the launch and performed the traditional ceremony of 'tossing' oars at the moment of the launch.

Shop Openings in December and the Festive Season

Light Up A Life

The annual Light up a Life service will be held in St Regulus' Church on Tuesday 4th December at 7.30pm. Locally it's known as Light Up The Highlands.

These events help families and friends to come together to remember and celebrate the lives of loved ones. The events are open to anyone, not just people whose loved one was cared for by a hospice.

Usually, the most important part of these events is the opportunity to dedicate a message in memory of a loved one by:

- lighting a candle
- · hanging a message on a tree
- recording the name of someone special in a book of remembrance, or reading it aloud.

Burial Ground Benches

Two new personalised benches have been placed in the Cromarty Wester Burial Ground to honour the memory of two young men who took their own lives within a few days of each other in October last year. A crowd of around 40 people came to see the families of James Mullery and Calum Mackay unveil and dedicate the benches to them in a moving ceremony.

Following the tragic death of James, Wendy and Patrick Mullery put on a music concert earlier in the year in the Victoria Hall and £1400 was raised. Half of this went to the Christmas Lights appeal and the other half paid for the materials and transport costs associated with the benches which were designed and fabricated as a goodwill gesture by Jonny Kerfoot of Black Isle Engineering. There had been no benches for those grieving loved ones or visiting graves and Karen Mackay worked with the Mullery family to have them installed.

Primary school news

Cromarty Primary School continues to excel in the realm of science, picking up two awards in October.

At a ceremony at the school, staff and pupils were presented with the Primary Science Quality Mark Outreach award, demonstrating how established science leadership is having a sustained impact on science teaching and learning across the school and in other schools. This is a UK wide award, with only 8 schools attaining this level, a tremendous achievement for Cromarty Primary.

The school was also presented with a special award from The Scottish Engineering Special Leaders Award (SESLA) for the schools' outstanding performance in the last five years of this award programme. This is an annual event now attracting over 15,000 entries from across schools in Scotland, where judges drawn from academia, business and professional institutions meet to consider inventions and engineering solutions proposed by pupils. The award was presented to the school given the outstanding success of the pupils over the years. There have been many Commended and Highly Commended entries over the period, and the school has had three winners, in Robbie, Connie and Aidan. Aidan and Charlie's inventions have also been chosen to be built by Strathclyde University's Faculty of Engineering, with Aidan's already on public display at the Glasgow Science Centre.

Youth Café Promotes Volunteering

The Youth Café offers a great way to get into volunteering - and pick up a Saltire Award for your efforts. Last year, on the Black Isle as a whole, 122 young people provided 8,877 hours of volunteer work. If that was paid wages it would have cost £85,000. Maritime News



Harbour

You will have noticed that the harbour is currently empty of all vessels as we prepare for the dredge which will make the harbour more accessible and safer for users. This should commence in the next few days. Many thanks to the Aberdeen University team based at the Lighthouse for their assistance in monitoring the firths for dolphins whilst any dumping of the dredged material is undertaken.

The Trust has appointed Dingwall based engineering consultants Wallace Stone to advise on the urgent repairs to the Smeaton Mole and Inner Admiralty Pier. These works need to be undertaken before we can implement many of the FLAG funded improvements previously described. At the present time we have secured upwards of £100,000 towards the cost of these repairs with other potential grants in the pipeline. We are grateful to The SSE Sustainable Communities Fund, Marine Scotland and Highland Council for their support. We still have some way to go to raise all the money needed to implement the repairs and will be continuing our fundraising efforts. We are currently working with Historic Environment Scotland and Highland Council to ensure that all works to this Grade A listed structure are to the appropriate standards.

Cromarty (still) Rising after 3 Years

Cromarty Rising is a resident's action group representing the community on the Port of Cromarty Firth plans to transfer crude oil between tankers at anchor in the inner Moray Firth at the entrance to the Cromarty Firth. CR has been active in this endeavour for almost 3 years.

At the Port Authority Public Meeting held in Invergordon on 27th September, Cromarty Rising members asked about plans to continue with the STS licence process. Port Chief Executive Bob Buskie, whilst stating there are no immediate plans to resubmit the licence application, failed to rule out a new application in the future. He went on to say the Port Authority is keen to reinstate STS at Nigg Jetty, but the uncertain future of the Oil Terminal presents commercial and operational issues.

The Cromarty Rising petition to the Public Petition Commission of the Scottish Parliament remains open. This petition calls on the Scottish Parliament, to urge the Scottish Government, to ensure that environmental legislation in Scotland is sufficient to prevent ship-to-ship transfers of crude oil in environmentally sensitive locations, such as the Inner Moray Firth, and to enhance the accountability of trust port boards to their stakeholders.

The Cromarty Rising formal complaint to the European Commission, on the failure to consider European Protected Species (EPS) licensing in the Moray Firth Special Area of Conservation (SAC), also remains open. The Scottish Government have written to Cromarty Rising and stated that they will not consider EPS licensing for the disturbance of a protected species in Scottish waters, as ship-to-ship transfers licences are a matter reserved to the UK Government. The UK Government, in the form of the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA), say that EPS licensing matters are an entirely separate matter and this will not form part of their ship-to-ship licence award considerations. Hence, no party is considering the disturbance of protected species inside a Special Area of Conservation, as required by European Directives.

The Port Authority maintains that it is keen to build strong community relations with Cromarty. The Cromarty Rising experience is not encouraging, the Port fail to walk the talk.

Cromarty Rising are ready and waiting to challenge any and all STS applications should and when they arise.

Latest from the Development Trust

Caledonian Building Surveyors of Inverness conducted a structural survey of Townlands Barn and have now delivered their report to the CCDT. The directors will study its findings and will consider the best way forward at their next meeting on December 6.

Work to clear trees, ivy and rubbish from the barn will continue over the winter. It is planned to hold an openday to allow the community to see what has been done so far and consider the significant challenges that lie ahead. This is likely to be in the spring.

Estelle Quick and Greg Fullarton visited the Muir of Ord Hub and met those managing the community project, to see if there were ideas which could inform our thinking on the future development of Townlands Barn. The Hub project involved local residents taking over the Old Tarradale Primary School which was only being used as a store after a new school opened in Muir of Ord, and then lay empty.

It took many years, but the Hub now provides meeting rooms, acts as an information point, has a retail area for local crafts, and boasts an auditorium with stage, cinema and sound systems. There is a café run by the Calman Trust, which also has Artysans in Inverness. The trust provides employment support for local young people. Estelle and Greg will brief other directors.

CCDT has completed the first stage towards an application to the Rural Infrastructure Fund (RIF), to see if there might be financial support available to allow the CCDT to proceed with the much-needed repair and upgrading of the ferry slipways at Cromarty and Nigg.

Highland Council advisers suggested that there would be a greater chance of success if the plan also included proposals for facilities designed to improve the visitor experience and allow for the better management of the increasing number of campervans. The final RIF application has to be submitted by the end of January.

Meanwhile if you are seeking ideas for stocking fillers, Irene Mackay's handknitted fingerless gloves are back in the Post Office for the winter with all proceeds going to the Townlands Barn project.


