

Is Cromarty Becoming Ever More Popular As A Holiday Destination?

Once again the town has seen its fair share of visitors over the summer months. There have been many tourismrelated developments over recent weeks too - a big increase in the number of accommodation providers in the town, the Highland Council consultation on a Visitor Levy, success in securing funding for a new motorhome and campervan facility, the consultation on Traffic Management, as well as the never-ending issues around parking on the Links – to name just a few. Many groups and individuals are making great efforts to address some of the challenges that come with an increase in visitors. But is it all a bit piecemeal, and re-active? Maybe now is the time, when people's day-to-day experiences are still fresh in the mind, to have a serious conversation and come up with a properly joined-up plan: a more radical approach that pre-empts some of the problems that are likely to grow. One that is aspirational and determines how we want the town to be in the future rather than simply allowing things to happen and always having to play catch-up. The Community Council took a significant step this week by appointing newly co-opted councillor Marcel Gommers with responsibility for Tourism, and the September meeting will consider the CC's formal response to the Black Isle Tourism Strategy. Cromarty Community Development Trust

The Highland Council has agreed to sell the wooded area around the units at the Whitedykes Industrial Estate to the Cromarty Community Development Trust (CCDT).

This has been earmarked by the trust as the location of the proposed site for motorhomes, which is part of its project which so far has attracted over £400,000 in funding.

The CCDT had made an offer of £1 for the land valued at £5,000 and members of the council's Environment, Development and Infrastructure Committee accepted the bid. The transaction was conducted as a Community Asset Transfer (CAT).

The Community Empowerment Act of 2015 introduced this right for community bodies to make requests to all local authorities, Scottish Ministers and a range of public bodies for any land or buildings they feel they could put to better use.

The original committee papers had said the CCDT wished to lease the land for £1 a year, but at the meeting of August 15th Pablo Mascarenhas, the council's Community and Democratic Engagement Manager, explained the trust had decided that purchase would be better. The councillors accepted the change and supported the CAT application, along with another three other communities.

After the meeting committee chair, Councillor Allan Henderson said: "All of these transfers are integral to the sustainable development and viability of the future plans of these organisations. I am pleased the committee showed their support by agreeing the transfers and I wish all of the groups well with their projects."

The CCDT's plan for the development of a motorhome site, has still to go through the planning process.

The project, which also includes the upgrading of the ferry slipway, has occupied most of the CCDT directors' time and energy during the past few months. But they are not forgetting about the Townlands Barn, and plan to return to it shortly once all issues relating to the slipways/campsite have been addressed.

AGM

The CCDT plans to hold its annual general meeting in October, date and venue to be confirmed.

All members are encouraged to attend. In addition to the presentation of progress reports and the election of new directors, there is a particularly important item of business.

During discussions with funding bodies over the summer, it emerged that there is a problem with one of the CCDT's articles of association, number 27.

It says:

"The directors may, at their discretion, refuse to admit any individual or organisation to membership where they have reasonable grounds to believe that he/she/it might, if admitted to membership, act in a manner which would damage the reputation of the company, undermine the efficiency of its operations and/or disrupt the proper conduct of its meetings."

The Scottish Land Fund, the principal supporter of community acquisitions of land and buildings, believes this runs counter to its own codes of governance.

As a consequence, if the CCDT is seeking grant support from the Scottish Land Fund, article 27 will have to be removed. There is every prospect the trust will indeed be seeking such assistance, so the CCDT board is recommending its removal. A two thirds majority of those attending the general meeting will be required.
