Middleton Trust News

Gillian McNaught writes:

The MT Trustees held their AGM at the beginning of November and considered new applications for funding to support the young people of Cromarty through sporting, creative and educational projects and activities. Trustees were once again delighted with the ideas put forward by Cromarty groups and are pleased to announce Middleton Trust funding awards will go to four organisations in the year 2022!

Cromarty Tennis & Sports Club has been awarded a grant for summer and autumn tennis coaching in 2022 for all school-age children, followed by Cromarty's own tennis tournament with trophies and prizes, 'Crombledon'.

Graffiti workshops, organised by **Cromarty Arts Trust** and led by an experienced local artist and graffiti writer, will be aimed at secondary school age pupils. It will be an opportunity to learn techniques and display a finished plyboard artwork in a temporary outdoor exhibition in Cromarty.

Cromarty Primary Parent Team have been awarded funds to support outdoor learning in the Post-Covid Recovery Curriculum for P5-P7 pupils. This includes a day at Fairburn Activity Centre and residential stays at the Shieling Project and Loch Insh.

The Middleton Trust continues its investment in the **Cromarty Youth Café** which provides muchneeded support for the wellbeing and needs of young people in Cromarty with a wide-ranging programme throughout the year.

Cromarty & Resolis Film Society receives their second tranche of funding for their 2021 project to work with older pupils at Cromarty Primary School, offering opportunities to experience all aspects of film. A recent activity celebrated Japanese film and pupils met a paper animator, watched a film made by her and tried out making origami of their own.

The Middleton Trust was established in 2012 by a generous gift from the late Henry McKenzie Johnston, in memory of his wife, Marian Middleton and all the Middletons of Rosefarm who loved Cromarty and its people. Its aim is to promote the social, educational, cultural and recreational development of the young people of Cromarty & District. The MT Trustees would like to encourage all local organisations and groups to consider if the Trust can support your project in the year 2023-24. New applications will be opened in August 2022 and further details will be publicised in due course. Cromarty Harbour

Colin Dickie writes:

Work continues to move along in the harbour area. You will have noticed that we removed the new pontoons for safe winter storage which, given Storm Arwen, now seems like a sensible decision. You may also have noticed that our contractors have returned to complete the remediation works on The Mole. This new lime mortar looks to have been much more effective, although we will keep vehicles off the site for a couple of weeks to allow it to set. It does look so much better! You may also have noticed that we have added two new ladders on each pier; this is was an overhang from our FLAG project from 2020 and forms part of our improvement programme.

The harbour is shortlisted for further HES grant which is estimated at £260k, with the need to raise the equivalent in matched funding. This funding is to finish upgrading all the pointing and voids in the 'old' sandstone areas of the harbour. Whilst I'm of the view that it isn't this high, it will still be a considerable amount to match fund beyond the reach of our serial participants of The Cromarty Trust and Friends of Cromarty Harbour. Much work is ahead of us.

It is primarily for this reason that the Trustees of Friends of Cromarty again invite you to support their latest fundraising efforts. Two winter portraits of the harbour have been captured by resident and volunteer David Kent; one for daytime, the other at night. The latter was shortlisted in the very recent Scotland Photography Photo of the Year awards, so it is great that David has allowed his work to be made available to a wider audience and to support a cause in which he quite literally sweats over. Thank you David.

Framed photographs are below and are available to physically view at Sutor Creek or virtually at our website at <u>cromartyharbour.org</u>. These retail at £40, but are also available unframed at £18. Just let Sutor Creek know or buy via the <u>website</u>. We realise that the fundraising is rather full on but just think of the movie 'The Money Pit': that's our harbour. Thank you for your support and thank you to Sutor Creek for exhibiting.


Volunteers required for a fun afternoon on the 100 Steps: 5th December!

Inner Moray Firth Development Plan Final Proposals: What does it mean for Cromarty?

Earlier this year the C&DCC submitted its comments and requests as part of the Highland Council's consultation process to develop the new 10 year IMF Development Plan. These were published to the community at that time.

The final Highland Council (HC) draft proposals were recently agreed by the Black Isle Highland Councillors, before going for full Highland Council approval and then onward to the formal public consultation process. The whole process may take 12 months to be implemented. Below is a 2-page extract of the Cromarty proposals contained within the Plan. In general, it is clear that the C&DCC submission was listened to and many of our requests have been included in the HC proposals. However, there was one clear error of fact. Under the 'Summary of Issues Raised in Comments' of which there were 18 (including the C&DCC ones), it was stated that the "C&DCC opposed CM03". This was not correct. After consultation with Tim Stott (HC Principal Planner and author of the proposals), C&DCC was asked to clarify our comments to Black Isle Highland Councillors before they considered their approval. This was done and has therefore been corrected on the attached extract (highlighted in yellow).

We propose that the Plan's new Greenspace General Policy (see Appendix 2) applies to the areas indicated on the map below

The C&DCC had in fact not commented on CMo3 at all, because it was outside the town's existing Settlement Development Area Boundary, which is marked in white on the attachment. C&DCC had purely stated that we supported CMo1 and part of CMo2 for Affordable Housing which should satisfy Cromarty's dire need for such housing, as opposed to any 'development for profit' that was already at saturation levels in Cromarty.

C&DCC now knows that the HC 'Recommendations & Reasons', stating that the CM01 (Jock's Field/Sandilands) had continuing problems, were a result of a meeting between the HC and Albyn Housing, who have reconfirmed that they are not presently able to consider developing this site. As a result, HC have turned their attention to the CM03 site because the landowner (McBean) was very open to considering an affordable housing development, under an official Rural Housing Burden managed by the Communities Housing Trust. These discussions are at an advanced stage and much work has already been done detailing the proposed development with a Call for Sites having already been submitted to the HC. As a result, the HC are proposing to extend Cromarty's Settlement Development Area Boundary. C&DCC is seeking further clarification on the reference to self-build units requiring Active Travel improvements to the Paye (where McBean also owns land).

The C&DCC is pleased that the HC has listened to its submissions and the CM03 proposals would provide the needed Affordable Housing which C&DCC are keen to support.

In addition, C&DCC's request for the Links, Victoria Park and the Townlands playspace to receive protected Greenspace status has been accepted and included. NatureScot's support on this proposal will have helped. CM01 will be left in the Plan, but is now regarded as a more 'long-term' project. The proposals for CM02 now contain a 'contamination assessment' to see if any development can be considered, in addition to the CDT's existing Campervan/Camping site proposals.

And finally, do you need to report a problem to the Highland Council?

Just a brief reminder for residents wishing to report problems to the Highland Council. Preferably use the website link: <u>https://www.highland.gov.uk/report</u> or call the Service Centre contact number 01349 886602 to request a repair. This is important as a reference number will be given. If not the resident should insist one is given. This reference number starts an audit trail that relevant departments, such as Housing, can and must follow up. If telephoning, residents may have to wait for their call to be answered or to call back at a different time. But do keep on trying until you get that reference number!

Hopeful Funding News

You may remember that The Development Trust applied for (but didn't get) funding for a Development Officer post to take forward the work needing done by the Trust for Cromarty.

The Development Trusts Association for Scotland (DTAS) invited those Trusts who did well last time but didn't get funding to apply again. So we have - with a freshened-up application!

Thank you Nigel Shapcott

Nigel has stepped down as a Director of the Trust after several years of extremely hard work to develop and manage some of our key projects: a big player in the Slipways project, the main player in getting the Motorhome site to where we are now (ready to invite tenders), the main man in getting the Reeds Loop Path widened and resurfaced, as well as doing much of the work in shaping ideas for upgrading of the 100 Steps. We wouldn't be anywhere near where we are without you Nige, so all the Directors say a **massive thank you!**

This does leave a big gap in our spread of Directors. Even if we get a Development Officer, we'll still need Directors to oversee that post and steer them where the community needs them to go, though the hands-on work may be less.




Christmas Eve Watchnight Service - 11.00pm – More mince pies and hot drinks after midnight!
