Some Good News for Cromarty Young Folk

Following a great proposal and a full project report from the Community Council Youth Member, Gregor Fox, our plans are well advanced to build a brand new mountain bike pumptrack on the old skatepark area, in Victoria Park. We await the final legal go ahead, but hope to have a start date for this project in the next newsletter. Funding will come from a number of sources, both in cash and inkind, so don't be surprised if you are approached to support this great new amenity for young of all ages in Cromarty.

Q: *So, what is a 'pumptrack'?*

A: A looped path designed for bikes featuring crests (rollers) and banked corners (berms). Much safer and more fun for beginners than a skatepark! Suitable for all levels of rider and all types of bikes. Progressive, so can be enjoyed by both beginner & experienced rider for years. Ideally, ridden without pedalling; it teaches balance and fundamental bike skills, is low maintenance and can be made to look aesthetically pleasing, as features are relatively small.

Plus, a little bit more good news from us: following another initiative from Gregor, we can tell you the Highland Council has agreed to organise the reinstatement of the goalposts, on the football pitch, in Victoria Park, after they were accidentally knocked down last year. So it might well be a good summer!

Highland Council and Weedkilling in Public Places

Following some social media coverage of recent inappropriate weed control examples, Cllr Craig Fraser has received both an apology and some helpful guidance from the Highland Council:

Firstly, the apology: "Unfortunately this was Highland Council that actioned the spraying. I have spoken to the Officer looking after this Ward, and the area has been sprayed too wide with some possible drift of the chemical, resulting in a wider kill than we would like, or intend. She will instruct that the brown areas are strimmed off to ground level, which will make it look much easier on the eye."

CF - Discussed at length with **IJ** about community concerns and sought assurances this should not happen again and **IJ** agreed that weed killer will only be used in specific areas and will not be used around schools, sports grounds and play parks in-line with HC policy. **CF** explained that the Links and the Park are used by families, with children and many dog walkers.


And then the guidance: "Members of the public should refrain from using hazardous chemicals in public places. Unlike Council operatives, they are unlicensed with no public liability insurance cover, do not have suitable protective clothing and are not trained. In addition, please refer to the following link (round up material safety data sheet)."

Update on East Quayside Development Nigg

- All permissions for the 225m long quay have been granted.
- Construction is due to start the week commencing 19th April 2021 and finish in 14 months.
- Dredging and the construction of a temporary causeway will start on Monday 19th April 21.
- Piling will start on May 21st and finish on November 21st – this will be noisy and noise monitoring will happen during the test pile in May.
- Piling will happen between 0700-1900 Monday-Friday and 0700-1300 on Saturdays.

Slipways and Ferries

The ferry will start from **1 June** this year. Please share this news and any social media posts etc. that we or Highland Ferries put out. We want folk to remember there is a ferry and it's for both locals and visitors! And the new slipways will make it much easier to drive on and off, and should mean far fewer cancellations due to weather that even Ronald can't overcome...

Campervans - The Story So Far

Cromarty has too many campervans parking outside people's homes. We want visitors, but we wish that it is managed well. This is why the Development Trust is building a campervan park at Whitedykes for the community. After much consultation, funding applications, comments by Highland Council etc., planning permission was issued earlier this year and the Trust now owns the land west of the Industrial Units.

We're about to start work on-site and some tree removal (as agreed with Highland Council and tree experts), with final details of where the toilet/shower block and van waste disposal are being sorted.

This has been a **huge** amount of work by a small group of Trust members and the next stages need more people to make it a success:

- Supporting/helping supervise the construction work.
- Working out how we operate the site, how we collect fees and keep it clean and tidy.
- Creating jobs to manage the site and managing those people.
- Promoting the site to customers (website, social media etc).
- Planting up new trees and hedges to screen the site. This would be a great volunteer project!
- Managing camper vans coming to Cromarty signs, byelaws, discouraging fly parking.

Cromarty Distilling are inviting people to buy shares in it. The Trust is not involved in the share-issue or the creation and marketing of Cromarty Gins; so it is completely up to individuals to decide if they want to buy shares in this new venture.

Colin Dickie from the Harbour writes:


The Cromarty Harbour is run by a small group of volunteers who freely give their time and energy to look after, improve and sustain the facility for the benefit of both users and the wider community. From previous reports you will know that we have been successful in tapping into a number of funders to help get us into a position to make the harbour more resilient and robust. Much has been achieved and it wouldn't have been possible without someone stepping up to talk to funders, identifying opportunities and developing programmes of work. In our case that largely fell to Pat Haynes. After five years and £800,000 of investment in our harbour, Pat has decided to leave our group. She will be sorely missed, but I am most grateful to her for her huge efforts, support and guidance. Few know that Pat has also been a driver in the personal fundraising efforts via commissioning our Harbour booklet and developing a series of greeting cards, all of which will have raised something in the order of £3,000. So, thank you Pat!


In other harbour news, repairs to the West pier and Smeaton Mole were completed in March. However, you may have noticed that the lime mortar in the Mole area has not cured and as such is now in need of some remediation. We are working with our consultant engineers and contractor to rectify this over the coming weeks. In meantime please do take care when walking in this area.


Commercial activity has increased with the arrival (and temporary departure) of Toplander and Pegasus providing much needed funds. These workboats are here to service the Aberdeen harbour blocks and the mussel farm, respectively. The ferry is due on berth next month and leisure users will also now start to fill up the harbour for the summer months. We have managed to increase capacity over the winter, courtesy of having installed additional pontoons which themselves have created some challenges with the volunteer team - adding new holding brackets and chain work to cope with the combined effects of weather and tide - as well as clearing some obstructions away. It will be great to see our harbour full again!

The Friends of Cromarty Harbour charity are again active on the fundraising front. Just newly updated is the booklet, 'Cromarty Harbour - A Brief History'. The price remains at £5 and is available for purchase from our website and local shops. For those that bought previously, please download the newly updated pages (42 & 43) from our website at no cost.

Lastly, some further fundraising news! The charity has developed a series of A3 posters along a retro theme. Three styles and views are available and thumbnail images are shown below. These which will be available to order from today. Prices are £10 each (£18 for two) in a tube or £16 each (£30 for two) in a A3 grey frame (no mount). The Courthouse garden will open again on Saturday 1 May. The garden gate will be left open so that you can come and find a spot of calm and check out how our flowers and orchard are coming on. It will remain open to all through the summer and autumn.

The museum itself will reopen on Saturday, 29 May and remain open through until Thursday, 30 September. Opening hours: 12.00am – 4.00pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays. **Closed on Mondays and Fridays.** However, we will open on the following Bank Holiday Mondays - 31 May, 2 August and 30 August. As usual, admission is free to all (but remember that we rely on donations!).

Many of you know that our main focus, during lockdown and restrictions, has been to install a new digital sound system throughout the building and work with a local author to create scripts for a whole new soundscape within the museum. On your visit, you will encounter a journey through Highland justice, as experienced in our local parishes of Cromarty and Resolis. All our 'voices' are local people and we hope that they all have a great time at the various recording sessions this month!

Our temporary exhibition this year is named "Coastal Cromarty" and links with the Year of Coasts and Waters 20/21. It will include the sails made of collages, part of The Sea Inside project last year - a collaboration between the museum, local artists and the communities of Cromarty and Resolis. If you missed their brief outing in October last year, make sure you don't miss them this time!

Special Note: **The Courthouse Shop will be open on Saturday 8th May from 10 to 12 noon**, primarily for the sale of the new Cromarty Heritage jigsaw. This is a joint venture with Cromarty Harbour Trust and depicts various scenes including the Courthouse! A 'must' for all puzzlers!

Cromarty Community Markets

Many of you are missing the monthly community markets provided by Transition Black Isle (TBI) at the Victoria Hall. So are we! We don't know yet when the Hall will be open again, when stallholders will be able to return or when you - the customers - will return. It's likely that we'll have to play it by ear and open up slowly and in stages. We'll let you know as soon as we know.

TBI pays for a Market Organiser to work with stallholders, the Victoria Hall Committee, other Black Isle Market organisers/TBI; and to oversee the market on the day. Louisa Garratt has been doing this for a while and has done a great job, but she has other commitments coming along. Cromarty Cinema Update

With cinemas allowed to reopen from May 17th, we will be working with our volunteers and with Eden Court to determine opening again for public screenings and hires, in line with government regulations.

During the lockdown period the Cinema has, with the help of Aberdeen University Lighthouse Field Station, installed high quality video conferencing equipment which will allow the Cinema to broadcast and stream live conferences, training events etc. We hope to develop this facility and offering in partnership with other local businesses. Our first conferences are booked in for later this year.

We have appointed a part time Cinema Manager, Grazina Scuckaite, who has previously worked on events at Eden Court. Grazina will work with our volunteers on reopening, running and developing the cinema. This post has been funded by ScreenScotland through our partnership with Eden Court.

Our partnership with Cromarty Primary School has been fully underway with pupils from Primary 6 & 7 meeting animators, developing research, analytical and literacy skills. Students have also been making films themselves as part of the process. *A celebration of reading* is core to the whole programme. Books have been purchased with project funds to work together and assess how text translates to film. Feedback from the school has been warmly enthusiastic with plans shaping up for the coming weeks.

Other cinema behind-the-scenes work includes weekly meetings of the Young Programmers who are working together to develop a special programme for the new Cromarty Community Cinema with funding support from the BFI FAN Film Exhibition Fund. Plans are still firming up plans for the summer – but there will be talks, Q+As, special screenings of shorts, artists' films, features and old classics on two key themes. More to follow on this!


James Support Group

Ocean Endeavour Rig on Mooring 12

And a few local voices write:

Since 20th April, numerous noise and vibration complaints have been raised, particularly by residents on the east side of the town, regarding the intrusive noise and vibration experienced since the Port of Cromarty Firth chose to locate the Ocean Endeavour rig on Mooring 12. As with previous rigs moored in this location, this has caused numerous incidents of sleep disturbance. If you have been impacted you may wish to lodge a complaint with Highland Council and with the Port of Cromarty Firth. It is quite straightforward to do this with the Council online here.

The Port can be contacted at Port@POCF.co.uk. In terms of filling in the online form this is a "non-domestic" incident and you need to provide an address for the source of the noise, which is a bit tricky for a rig at sea, but you could input the Port of Cromarty Firth's address, which is Port Office, Shore Rd, Invergordon IV18 oHD. The rig is supposedly meant to leave by 11 May.
