For the town's Development Trust, it's been all hands to the deck, following the community open day at the end of June.

Staffing | Expanding the Campsite team

At the start of July, we confirmed the local appointments of both John Nevin, as Campsite Warden; and Saffron Sutherland, for the Campsite Cleaning.

To them we would like to print a personal message in the newsletter : "Welcome to you both. You've both made a great start and we know - unreservedly - we have the right team to make a success of this new community enterprise".

Between John and Saffron we will now have a daily presence at the campsite, year round; meeting visitors and keeping the whole site and associated facilities fully operational and looking as good as the day it (soon) opens.



With the groundworks and construction nearing completion - concluding Phase 1 of the Landscaping Works have also been instrumental to getting us open and aligned with gaining consent for the statutory permissions. To this end, to up the 'people power' in addition to John and Saffron, we were able to employ Rory Mackay and Scott McDonald - again both local to Cromarty - on short seasonal contracts, to add to the landscape squad.



This is just the sort of work, both permanent and seasonal, that we look to be able to offer up and secure going forward across the Trust. And what a difference extra hands make - at the right moment in time - to the completion of a project

Volunteering | Supporting the development of the Campsite in other ways

We also put out a call - across social media and our existing networks - for help with tree planting and general site landscape works. To this end we would like to thank the following volunteers who have or are assisting us and are expanding CCDT's volunteer team at the campsite:

Ian Donald - a 'fair weather' gardener local to the town has helped John Niven with the landscaping work over a number of sunny days.

Nigel Barnes - father of Cromarty's Helena Barnes but himself resident in Hexham - has and will continue to add to our landscape team whenever in Cromarty for extended visits.

Sheila Currie - CCDT Director and Secretary - has been in her element (although currently in denial) in coordinating the landscaping team locally at site and physically planting many of the trees.

Kevin Fraser, a forester - with 20+ years of experience from Poyntzfield, has offered up advice and consultancy, and has already checked in on the site team and advised on our replanting works.

Stewart Smith and Caoimhe McKeown - both veterinary bioscience graduates - now returned to Rosemarkie, are going to assist with regeneration and rewilding of the site. This will include the installation of bat and bird boxes for the site. We hope that Stewart might also be open to guiding a community session for the design of these. He's an expert in this.

And at last the much needed rain came...

Whilst many might bemoan the summer rains, the development trust has secretly been doing a little rain dance around the town, desperately needing a volume of water to nourish the trees at the campsite. What a difference it has made to our ability to plant ahead of opening.

It has allowed us to transfer the planting over from Green's Nursery in Nairn and critically get Phase 1 of the (Soft) Landscaping in.

This has included the replanting of:

130+ purple beech whips to form new hedges; 150+ young native trees (as a mix of birch, hazel, rowan, oak etc) across the site; some 'specials' in the form of 3 Scots pine, 3 crab apples, 2 purple hazels, 2 silver stemmed willows; 10 semi-mature single stem birches and 3 multi stem birches; a stand of dogwood.

There is also a natural regeneration happening from the seed that has been set - from the earlier clearance works in opening up the woodland to the back of the site.

With this we are also extensively seeding grass across the site, both as a mulch and general cover. We will be casting some areas with a wildflower mix - as a part of this - to further support biodiversity going forward on the site, bringing some Spring 2024 interest.

And there's more to come.

In late summer and autumn, over Phase 2 of the Landscaping, we will be planting:

Native yellow irises to the roadside ditch; a herb garden to the campsite adjacent to service building; 'edges' will be established with wildlife attracting planting; the first of these is on show in the lead up to the service building; further bare root whips - as hawthorn - to add to the regeneration.

Our agenda is not only to make a campsite, but also to start off a new area of native woodland and to 'place make' providing a new and landscaped outdoor space for the local community. That's what this very important and recent phase of work has been about - over July - ahead of getting opened.

Come August - with all the planting now in place - we'll happily accept a return to wall-to-wall sun, with the opening of the campsite.

Our daily role as tour guide commences

As stated whilst we transition from construction to operation - over July - interest has mounted and word of mouth is most certainly getting round.

Every single day at the campsite, we now have at least 3 to 4 people arrive unannounced - to learn about our works and what the site has to offer.

These individuals are either part of the community and local to Cromarty; from the wider Black Isle; or visitors / motorhome owners with the express intention of visiting the site as a user and soon.

We wholeheartedly welcome this opportunity for community engagement and dissemination; and we are sensing the community interest and ownership growing now.

Equally, in return to showing individuals around - where appropriate - we have asked visitors to consider our works, gleaning knowledge from their experience and trouble-shooting in advance of opening, to start to 'test' the site in earnest for us.

As an example of this locally Fran Sadler brought friends Linda and Geoff along, for the 'extensive' tour.

Linda and Geoff - both past residents of the town and now relocated to Perthshire - plan to return in autumn. With this in mind we asked them to feedback on the site and facilities, plus trial parking and manoeuvring on site.



Happy camping anybody? We are soon to be open. Watch this space!

Last week, our museum played host to 23 children with 4 Young Leaders (accompanied by Wanda, Fraser and Michelle) as part of the school holiday activities arranged for members of Cromarty Youth Café.

There was a fair amount of surplus energy expended racing around the garden and community orchard! Discovering all the hidden artworks that are part of the "Beelines Trail" and coming across the Resolis Riot puppets out in the exercise gallery added to the enjoyment of exploring outside the museum.

Once inside, the children were split into small groups to discover the varied objects to be found in the museum exhibitions. Then everyone met together to hear the story of Cuthbert Mackenzie – a defendant in one of the two trial scenes to be heard upstairs in the courtroom. They found out that things are not always as simple as they seem at first and punishments were certainly harsh all those years ago.

Finally, the picnic! As it was too damp outside, the venue was the courtroom. All the mannequins were astonished to be in the midst of a veritable feast that was laid out before them – and hardly a crumb was left. This is obviously why they have the word "Café" in their title!

We hope they enjoyed their visit and look forward to seeing them again soon.



We are continuing to make changes to secure a sustainable future for our small independent museum. One of the initiatives we have recently been part of is a venture with "Smartify", the world's most popular art and museum app. As one of six Highland museums, the project has allowed us to offer a digitised exhibition and a curated tour – David Alston and Nicole Bontemps talking about "Cromarty Built on Slavery". Now our collection and stories are available to a worldwide audience. You will need to download the Smartify app on your mobile phone to access the information.

On another subject, the recent difficult financial times for many businesses, have hit museums as well. For this reason, we spent the spring writing funding applications to two different organisations in order to help put the museum onto a firmer and sustainable footing.

We are delighted to report that Museums Galleries Scotland came back to us last month to award us the funding we'd asked for from them. This is provisional on us securing backing from the other funding body we also approached. If we manage to get all the money we've bid for, the Courthouse will be able to employ a full time museum manager/curator to drive forward its development, ensuring its future as a dynamic community resource for us all. Keep your fingers crossed!

Harbour Trust Latest

As indicated last month, we continue to review access to the outer pier area, and we will shortly be moving to the gate being open for longer and from earlier in the day. We just have a couple of things to do to improve safety and to make clearer the non-fishing area. Unfortunately, I am a little uncertain of the timing due to illness within the volunteer group, but it will be days, not weeks. However, the concerns expressed last month remain and even with limited access over the last two weeks, the issues have merely been re-affirmed (see pictures below). With greater traffic, the issues are only likely to be further exacerbated from what we are experiencing today.

We will continue to monitor, e.g. the number of people fishing at a given time and where they position themselves. For information, on Tuesday night, at one point we had 22 people – 18 fishing – on the outer pier that was just about at safe capacity. For these reasons, we move forward with a degree of trepidation and should circumstances dictate, we will close the gate at short notice to get some respite. I thank my fellow volunteers for continuing to put the time and effort into the harbour and in providing a focus to improving safe access. Also, thanks to all harbour users for your understanding and engaging with us in dealing with this difficult issue. All relevant notices will be posted on our website at cromartyharbour.org and mentioned as part of the monthly newsletter.

Beyond Expectations

The 2023 Open Gardens and Art & Flower display was an amazing success, well beyond the expectation of the organising team and, after paying overheads and putting an amount aside for next year, a sum of £6,970 has now been distributed among 15 local groups and charities.

Fortunately the weather was kind, but the credit for the success of the event lies with the many, many people of Cromarty who gave not just their time but also their resources free of charge to help transport chairs and tables, provide power for the musicians and tea urns, loaned marquees, provided eggs for home baking, collected supplies and printing from Inverness and Dingwall, delivered leaflets and put up signs around Highland and encouraged friends and family to come to Cromarty for the event.

A great deal of time and effort went into getting the 32 gardens ready for viewing all of which were a credit to their owners. Likewise, the artistic expertise displayed in the flower arrangements and botanical and wildlife drawings on show in East Church were the result of hours of dedication. Overhead costs were offset by the generous support of so many local businesses and, for the first time, Global Energy Group – Port of Nigg joined the list of our sponsors – a big thank you to them all.

Although the organising team said 'never again' immediately after the weekend they have now recovered and, all being well, Open Gardens and Art & Flowers will happen in 2024, possibly at a slightly earlier date in June.

Well done Cromarty – you certainly all pulled together to make it happen. Thank you.

Arts Trust

Lots of great things coming up in August from the Cromarty Arts Trust. We start off the month hosting the annual exhibition from **The Cromarty Group** at the Stables, it runs until Sunday 6th August and is open every day from 10am – 5pm. Head up for a chance to see wonderful work from your local artists.

Saturday 5th and Sunday 6th is going to be busy weekend, we have a marquee up at the Stables with a **craft market under canvas** running both days from 10am – 4pm. There will be loads of lovely stalls with high quality handmade crafts, some firm favourites returning along with some wonderful new crafters and artists.

We also have Black Isle artist Kathleen Madigan running a **Mindful Art workshop** at the Old Brewery on the Saturday 5th. This will be a quiet day of meditation and mindfulness practices, interspersed with time drawing and observing closely from nature. A chance to relax, create and be with nature without any distractions.

There is a foot stomping evening of music at the Old Brewery on Thursday 10th August. **The Woo Town Hillbillies** play a lively mix of Americana, Bluegrass with the odd ska tune thrown in. Between the three of them they play guitars, mandolin, banjo, double bass, harmonicas. BYOB, so grab your bottle of moonshine and head over to the Old Brewery for 7.30pm.

Between 19th and 27th August, there is another exhibition at the Stables. **Nigg/\Cromarty/\Nigg** is a major exhibition of new work by Sue Jane Taylor and Ian Westacott, two of the Highlands' most distinctive artists. This is the first time Sue Jane and her partner Ian, who live near Dornoch, have exhibited together and they focus on very different aspects of Nigg and Cromarty.

The exhibition brings together opposites: industry and nature, new and old, machines and trees, just as the Port of Nigg and the historic town of Cromarty face each other across the entrance to the Cromarty Firth. Open every day from 11am.

To coincide with the Nigg/\Cromarty/\Nigg exhibition, there will be a free showing of the **Rigs of Nigg film** at the Victoria Hall. Don Coutts and Lindy Cameron will be there along with Sue Jane and some stars of the film. The showing will be followed by an informal discussion and chat and some tea and coffee. The event is free and there is plenty room in the hall but you can book tickets through our website. Starts at 5.30pm on Saturday 19th August.

The following day there's a change of pace with chamber music from the **Fyrish String Quartet** at the Stables. Playing at 4.30pm on Sunday 20th August, surrounded by Sue Jane and Ian's art, Fyrish are bringing us a lovely programme of music for strings:

Dark Lochnagar (Traditional) arranged by Seonaid Aitken; Two Movements for String Quartet - Rebecca Clarke; Sound of Sleepless Kings - Emma Jean; String Quartet No. 1, Opus 13 - Carl Nielsen; Unst Boat Song (Traditional) arranged by the Danish String Quartet.

If I can sneak in an early September date, there are a few places left on Anna Wimbledon's **Landscape Oil Painting course** on 1 - 3 September, based at the Old Brewery but outdoors as much as possible. The three days are suitable for beginners and more advanced painters.
