Cromarty Historian Wins Book of the Year - Twice

Congratulations to Dr David Alston and his book 'Slaves and Highlanders: Silenced Histories Of Scotland And The Caribbean'. At an event held in Edinburgh at the beginning of December it not only won the Saltire Society Scottish History Book of the Year, it was also named Scottish Book of the Year.

It was described by the judges as "the best book to date on Scottish involvement in chattel slavery and the impact of the gains from this on Highland Scotland". They added: "From his local Cromarty base, the author engages forcefully with major historiographical debates relating to Scottish participation in the slave economy and challenges presentations of this in tourist literature and major heritage institutions. An informative book based solidly in research but immensely accessible."

As reported last month one outcome from the publication of the book has been our increased understanding of the direct links between Cromarty and communities in Guyana. Cromarty Peace Group is currently promoting events to raise money to help fund structural work on the Development Centre of All Saints Presbyterian Church in New Amsterdam, Guyana. Coming up are:

Cromarty Harbour

From Colin Dickie:

I am pleased to say that the trustees have released their annual report to 31 March 2022 and this can be viewed at <u>cromartyharbour.org</u>. As in previous years, the summer season proved very busy and the harbour was again full; we expect this to be the same next year and there is no doubting that there is demand for leisure space in our harbour. We are also in the process of addressing a difficult health and safety issue which became apparent during the summer. At this time, the harbour became a very dangerous place when frankly it became overwhelmed by visiting fishing people, not always on a casual basis. The overcrowding and, I have to say, leftover and embedded tackle and waste, put visitors, users, volunteers and property at risk. Following a review, we have decided it necessary to add a gate at the entrance to the bridge to limit access on the occasions that we believe there to be an excessive risk to users. Whilst we have yet to work through the operational detail this could also include restricting access should weather conditions dictate, especially as the Outer Admiralty Pier continues to deteriorate. Our public liability risk is such that it is only prudent for us to take this action. It is not our intention to prevent enjoyment of the harbour, far from it, our intention is to manage our risk appropriately whilst maintaining the safety and enjoyment for all users.

Lastly, the harbour has been successful in two grants applications to the Community Regeneration Fund. One will allow us to look at what can be done to mitigate flows

in and around the bridge which could improve the safety of boats in the harbour, potentially increase capacity and protect the stonework in the inner basin more widely. The second grant will allow us to assess stonework and pointing issues on the East Pier. This is good news and shows the confidence that outside agencies have in our ability to make progress in helping deliver longevity to our harbour. These grants only take us so far but with a similar exercise having been done on the Outer Admiralty Pier earlier in the year, we will soon have line of sight on our main and pressing challenges.

Here are some top tips to help yourself through difficult times, anxious times and when you may be feeling depressed:

1 Talk about how you are feeling - with someone that you know will be understanding and sympathetic OR someone you don't know because sometimes it's easier to open up if you don't know them, i.e. our helpline 07563 572471, or The Samaritans 116123 also a 24/7 helpline. 2 Get some fresh air & daylight, doing this twice a day can really break the monotony of being stuck in all day! If you can't go outside because of health or mobility issues (or the snow & ice!) then sit by a window for a spell and open a crack for fresh air for five minutes. That'll do the trick.

3 Regulate your breathing if anxious. This one is called 345 - breath in for the count of 4, hold for the count of 3 and exhale for the count of 5 then breath normally, repeat until your anxiety subsides.

4 Volunteer - an act of kindness makes you feel good, and makes the person feel wanted or not alone. For instance, if you have a neighbour with a dog who isn't able to walk the dog very often, offer to walk it for them. They will be delighted that you've taken the pressure off of them, you will feel good having helped someone AND you get a little fresh air, plus of course the dog will be well.....relieved!

5 This is my new favourite. Wendy showed me a short video of a baby laughing and it was infectious. You really can't help but smile watching this & I definitely recommend it to brighten your mood.

Please do not suffer alone, we are here for you.

Business Updates

Early in December industry leaders in the Hospitality Sector (Bars and Restaurants) were predicting a 30% drop in turnover over the festive season compared to 2021. The Cheese House can confirm that in the 10 days up to Christmas, (it's busiest period of the year), this season's takings were indeed almost exactly 30% down on the previous year. If this 'trend' is reflected across the board that is alarming for a local economy such as Cromarty's. Long-term it could translate as 3 or 4 of our local businesses 'going under' in the next 12 months; at least 3-4 household incomes being lost; other household incomes being adversely affected by loss of wages etc. Undoubtedly some folk are struggling to literally 'make ends meet', but for others, one assumes, it is more about being cautious and 'holding back'. But holding back won't help us out of this mess. Now more than ever, if at all possible, please

support your local businesses where you can. Without you, without them, a community the size of Cromarty can quickly slide into a hole that is very hard to get out of.

Cromarty Post Office

Well that was a strange year - what on earth will 2023 bring? Apart from anything else, slightly changed opening hours for the post office. Don't forget that from now on we are closing at 5pm instead of 5.30pm on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Other times are unchanged.

Our dining room is available for private parties to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries or just for a gettogether with family and friends. Menus can be tailored to your requirements.



New Year - 2023

New Day - Tuesday, 17th January, 7.30pm

New Venue - Victoria Hall

The Cromarty History Society opens 2023 with a talk by Diana Hamilton-Jones, who writes, "James Braidwood (1800-1861) was born in Edinburgh and grew to be a serious young man, diligent, thoughtful, brave, patiently persistent, kind, a devout Christian, a great family man and a fair and considerate leader who inspired love and respect. Above all, he was a man of vision. At the age of only 24 he was appointed as Superintendent and Master of Engines of the world's first municipal fire service which was established in Edinburgh in 1824. Before this time there was no official fire-fighting service. By 1833 he was installed as the first Superintendent of the newly formed London Fire Engine Establishment and was always

making improvements, keeping his men well trained and well cared for, constantly having to battle against authorities with deep pockets, tight purse strings and not a little arrogance. He was the first to introduce many different pieces of equipment and methods. Nowadays so much is taken for granted, but it is time to stop, think and pay homage to a man who is the rock on which is built today's modern fire service and ensure that his name is properly recorded in the history books. It is my hope that this talk will raise James Braidwood's profile and his legacy in the public conscience".

Diana spent the first 8 years of her life in Wales, the Far East and then Germany before attending an English boarding school until the age of 18. Her aptitude for languages found her employed in Frankfurt where she started in banking but quickly moved to Sotheby's and later transferred to New York, where she remained until the mid 1990s, organising several international travelling exhibitions. After a spell with the Asia Society, she moved to Amsterdam in 1996 working with the UN, first with the OPCW (Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons) and then with the CFC (Common Fund for Commodities). She and her husband retired to the Highlands in 2017.
