## **Community Development Trust**

It's been a very busy time across most of our projects.

## **Royal Hotel**

We are ABSOLUTELY DELIGHTED to be able to announce that we've got funding from the Scottish Land Fund to carry out a Feasibility Study into the possible community buyout of the Royal Hotel.

We have appointed contractors (Impact Hub of Inverness, who have a lot of experience of this type of work). They will be going over the building with a fine-tooth comb, assessing the business possibilities, doing community consultations to translate the list of possible ideas you told us last Autumn (and any new ones!) into viable ideas.

We absolutely have to know that the building is good for the community's needs, that there are strong and realistic and affordable ways of using the buildings and bringing in income to cover costs, and - not least - that there are strong and realistic community bodies able and willing to take on such a large venture and keep it going over many years. We will be keeping everyone informed as we go on. Look out for a timeline of when we expect the different phases and work to happen. Following the Open Day in February, a number of local interested parties came forward with ideas about using this building (a Common Good property currently managed by Highland Council/Highland Highlife). We are working with all of them as they develop their Business Plans and then the Trust will see how each idea can best use the building, ensure community benefit and cover its costs.

## **Cromarty Campsite**

You might have noticed more and more camper vans staying at our campsite, which is great! and we had our first 'full house' last weekend, with every pitch taken.

More income pays wages and visitors spend more money in the town. We're noticing that many of the campers come here because of other Cromarty things - such as the good food, the pubs, the cinema, Cromarty Arts events, the great shops - which supports all our businesses.

Every £ spent in the town circulates amongst our shops and businesses and pays local wages, after all.

Most of the vans are here via word of mouth as we've not really been doing much advertising to date (better to start slow and iron out the wrinkles early!) but we're starting to get our site better known in the tourism marketing media.

They have some work at the Nigg side to enhance the slip there; but all the work will be finished well before the ferry starts up again at the beginning of June.

# CAB Focus on . . . Benefits if you have children

#### **Child Benefit**

You can get Child Benefit for any of your children who are under 16 and live in the UK. If they stay in school, college or training after that age you can get Child Benefit until they're 20. If you get Child Benefit, you will get £24 per week for your eldest child and £15.90 per week for every other child. Only one person can claim Child Benefit for a child. You should claim Child Benefit as soon as your child is born or, if they're adopted, as soon as they come to live with you. Child Benefit can only be backdated for up to 3 months so if you claim it any time after this you'll miss some payments.

#### **Scottish Child Payment**

You may be able to get Scottish Child Payment to help towards the costs of supporting a family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look

after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

You may be able to get Scottish Child Payment if all of the following apply:

- you live in Scotland
- you or your partner are getting certain benefits or payments
- you or your partner are the main person looking after a child who's under 16 years old

#### **Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods**

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments: Pregnancy and Baby Payment; Early Learning Payment; School Age Payment. Best Start Foods is a payment every 4 weeks during pregnancy and when your child is under 3. You will need to be receiving certain benefits to get these payments.

#### **Universal Credit**

If you receive Universal Credit, you could get an extra amount for your children if they live with you. You'll only get an extra amount for your first and second child. You will not get an extra amount for any more children unless your children were born before 6 April 2017.

#### **Child Disability Payment**

Child Disability Payment provides support for the extra costs that a disabled child might have. You can apply for Child Disability Payment for a child under 16 with mental or physical disabilities. You can also apply if the child's disability has not yet been diagnosed.

## **Harbour News**

From Colin Dickie:

Perhaps a month early with this but the reason will become obvious. The month May is a significant one in the history of Cromarty Harbour, for on 17th May 1784, 'An Act for the better preferving and maintaining the Piers and Harbour of Cromarty in North Britain' came into being. June is also another highlight month, as on 16th June 1834, a revised Act with much the same title as before, but replacing preferving with preserving and dropping North Britain, received Royal Assent.

Despite a couple of technical updates, the provisions within the 1834 Act still governs much of how we operate today. Moving forward and doing the maths, 2034 will then become significant year; the harbour will be 250 or 200 years old? There are ten years to plan a party!

Firstly though, operational matters, the new information and safety board has replaced the previous dilapidated one.



Three of the pontoon fingers will be back in the water in two weeks, the other two are being held back on the grass to effect repairs caused by storms Antoni and Betty coinciding with especially high tides during August last year. The damage led to a review of aspects of their design which stretched our engineering prowess, however we are hopeful that the redesign and repairs will make them more resilient, the replacement parts are in production and will be delivered in late April.

The harbour will be full again this year as has become the norm.

Turning to the East Pier repair and renovation; whilst we have been highly successful in accumulating over £100k to match a commitment from Historic Environment Scotland, there remains a small funding gap to bridge and now the clock is ticking as some grant funding offers may expire. We are grateful to those that have helped us accumulate such an impressive total and work continues to secure the necessary funds for the project to move forward.

Our newly redesigned, and advert free, harbour website acknowledges past and current supporters. Fundraising to support the ongoing repairs and renovation is a continuous process and our revised website now gives dedicated space to Friends of Cromarty Harbour to support their efforts to raise funding. Merchandise sales continue through the website and in some local shops; sorry the jigsaws are out-of-print.







## **History Society**

Births, deaths and marriages, property records, wills, census, military service — most historians will know where to find these in national archives. But what about the little bits and pieces, the details of a place, the chance encounters? This talk, whilst not comprehensive, aims to tease out a few interesting sources for information on Cromarty in some of our larger archives across Scotland and perhaps beyond.

Nicola Mills graduated with a PhD from St. Andrews
University before going on to train as an archivist in
London. She worked at the School of Oriental and African
Studies, the Scottish United Services Museum (now the
National War Museum of Scotland) in Edinburgh Castle
and the Scottish Record Office (now the National Records
of Scotland) before becoming freelance. Since then she


has specialised in estate archives and military, medical and distillery records, working for Aberdeen City and Shire archives, Aberdeen University, and the Scottish Episcopal Church amongst others. She also teaches the Latin modules on the Dundee University archive course.
