

She starts work officially on 3rd January, although she has already joined a Board meeting to meet the Trustees and has been helping us with some early planning. You will soon be seeing her about the town. She will be making herself known to you all. Please introduce yourself and make her welcome. This is a real game changing time for The Courthouse to have a full-time manager on board. Please share in the excitement.

In her first few weeks in the job Eilidh is planning to talk to as many people as she can. She will be meeting staff and volunteers as well as getting to grips with the complexities of managing our great museum. In her words: All ideas are good ideas, even if we can't achieve them all. We will be putting some ambitious plans in place to give The Courthouse its rightful place in the community. Open to everyone, providing a place for history, culture, learning and above all fun.



Eilidh brings experience in 21st century museum management, she has previously managed museums across Scotland and the North of England, most recently at Kilmartin Museum and the Dock Museum in Barrow-on-Furness. In addition, she has been working as a museums and heritage consultant across the Highlands advising museums in taking their plans and ambitions forward.

Eilidh's appointment has been made possible through grant funding from Museums and Galleries Scotland and The National Lottery Heritage Fund. To meet our plans, continue to grow, improve the collection and displays we will be doing further fundraising, asking for volunteers to help in our projects, encouraging people of all ages to come and get involved. Whatever your interests, whatever your skills. Or maybe you would just like to do something new or a bit different. We would like to hear from you. We have something for everyone. You are all welcome.

Community Development Trust

December was a very busy month, so there's a lot to say please share this with folk who don't usually see Cromarty Live. Note the key timescales in January and February.

Royal Hotel

The Trust has interviewed potential (building and business) consultants and short-listed some to invite to tender to do a feasibility study. We have liaised with Development Trust Association Scotland, Highlands and Islands Enterprise and used our own expertise to make these assessments.

We are now preparing a scope of works as the basis on an invite to tender for the full feasibility study for The Royal Hotel. The brief, invite to tender and supporting documents will be released by mid-January for a return early February. All tenders will then be scored and

assessed with all the received information forming the main body of the application for Scottish Land Fund Stage 1 funding. The application will be made by CCDT.

All being well, this will be submitted by 12 February 2024; and if successful an award will be made by 19 February 2024.

Assuming we get the grant, we'll appoint a Lead Consultant to manage the feasibility study, which will explore potential community ownership, including:

- · A full community engagement and needs assessment;
- A historical appraisal;
- Existing building condition report including
 building and structural surveys and an energy assessment
 and a current building valuation;
- · An assessment and valuation of any urgent repairs or longer term remedial works;
- · Assessment of the existing business, including a current business valuation;
- · Proposed new business model under community ownership and the associated building footprint;
- · Feasibility and business planning for this and associated costs.

If any member has the skills to join or strengthen the CCDT assessment committee for the tenders - ideally but not exclusively with a business or building or related background - and would like to contribute to this part of the process, please get in touch. cromartydevelopmenttrust@gmail.com

Note: This has to be an entirely confidential process and the outcome will NOT be published, until and providing an award is made by the SLF and has been accepted by the successful Lead Consultant.

Note: If the feasibility study shows that community ownership is NOT viable, then we won't proceed.

East Church Hall

A Working group of 3 directors and 7 members held a meeting re ECH and it was agreed:

We'd liaise with the current owners (Highland Council) to do some outside maintenance and cleaning (gutters, weeds etc), hopefully in January.

An open day will be planned for (hopefully) February. We need solid business plans from parties who would be interested in taking over, or being involved going forward, rather than general ideas of what the building could be used for.

As a Common Good asset, it must deliver community benefit and pay for itself. Long lease and asset transfer were also discussed.

Community Campsite

At the time of writing, we have two four-night bookings, around the New Year period - again two couples who plan to support the wider community through their visit - and a couple of single night bookings on different days. And we're almost certain it will fill up further; so please make everyone welcome.

Beyond this, we have been buoyed by bookings made for April, June and September 2024. In short, it's looking rosy at the end of the year!

Even in the darkest winter, it is popular! Every visitor brings money to our town!



History Society



As we go about the Black Isle, do we ever wonder where our place-names come from and what they mean? This talk will take the form of a tour around the Black Isle, stopping to peer at some of the road signs we pass by without a thought; teasing out what these place-names can tell us about the histories of the people who have lived here since these names were first written down. What do the names we give tell us about what was important to the people at that time? Which languages did they speak and how did the languages change? How did that change the place-names over time? Hopefully, you will come away with a flavour of the deep history of the places we whizz past in our car or vaguely notice out the bus window and may be inspired to do your own examining of the many hundreds of local place-names that I won't be able to mention in this talk.

After spells working in Archaeology, Geology, various factories, the Oil Industry, Nature Conservation and

Environmental Management, being retired allowed Sheila to follow her nose and be entranced by what's around her, including (very) amateur history research into this part of the world, where she has lived for 32 years now. She is fascinated by the people who have lived hereabouts since the glaciers receded some 12,000 years ago and what is revealed by the traces they have left.
