
We appreciate how difficult it can be to walk into a support meeting for the first time, so are thankful to those who were able to attend these meetings.

Residency Prize & Exhibition

We are delighted to announce that Dr Maria Maclennan, the renowned 'Forensic Jeweller', has been awarded the 2024 Cromarty Arts Trust Residency Prize. Dr Maclennan's unique contribution to the fields of forensic science and art and design have garnered international

attention, blending her artistic expertise with innovative investigative techniques.

Her ground-breaking research in Forensic Jewellery, which supports disaster victim identification through the analyses of personal artefacts, has been a trailblazing addition to forensic science. Dr Maclennan's ability to combine creative practice with scientific precision has earned her numerous accolades, and this recent recognition further highlights the impact of her work.

Maria is currently a Senior Lecturer at Edinburgh College of Art (ECA), part of The University of Edinburgh, although she has since completed an MSc in Forensic Art and Facial Imaging with The University of Dundee's Centre for Anatomy and Human Identification (CAHID), through which she continues to push the boundaries of forensic identification through her innovative work.

Dr Maclennan will be spending a month in Cromarty. She will work at the Cromarty Arts Trust and with the Hugh Miller Museum, to produce a series of new facial depictions of Hugh Miller incorporating artefacts housed within the museum's collection, including a miniature death mask. We will celebrate her time here with a showing of work and an informal talk in the evening on **28 November** at the Old Brewery.

History Society

The history of a place is the collected story of its people and their doings. Dingwall has existed for a thousand years or so and its sons and daughters have gone out into the wider world from there. If you have a low income or get certain benefits, you might be able to get help to pay less Council Tax from the Council Tax Reduction scheme. If you are liable to pay Council Tax, you might be able to get 1 of the following:

• Council Tax Reduction - if you get certain benefits or have a low income. You can make a claim whether you

own your home or you are renting, and your employment status won't have an impact on your claim.

- Council Tax bands E to H relief scheme if you live in a home in Council Tax band E to H, and your income and savings are below certain amounts
- Second adult rebate scheme if you live with another adult, who is not your partner, and they're not liable for Council Tax and have a low income.

The scheme you get will depend on which one gives you the most money off your Council Tax bill. There is no set amount of Council Tax Reduction - what you get depends on your circumstances.

As well as Council Tax Reduction, there are other exemptions and discounts that might apply to you. You might be able to get money off your Council Tax bill if:

- you live alone
- you are a carer
- you or someone you live with has a severe mental impairment, such as dementia or a learning difficulty
- there are adaptations in your home that make it suitable for someone with a disability who lives there
- your property is empty for example, you have gone into hospital or moved into a care home.

To find out more about Council Tax Reduction, exemptions and discounts, contact the Highland Council.

Council Tax is compulsory and must be paid. Local authorities have legal powers to collect Council Tax. If you have arrears and are struggling to pay your Council Tax because of financial difficulties, you can contact the Highland Council and ask about a payment plan, or contact the Citizens Advice Bureau and ask about debt advice.
