# The Cheviot, the Stag, the Black, Black Oil... and the rush for renewable energy

A significant motion was passed by Highland Council on Monday (September 30<sup>th</sup>) which should go some way to bringing order – and, more importantly, greater community consultation – in an otherwise anticipated major increase in electricity 'infrastructure' projects over the coming months and years.

Councillor Helen Crawford (representing the Aird and Loch Ness Ward) tabled a motion calling on THC to get a grip on a situation which could easily get out of control—namely, the rush for renewable electricity by private companies (and the UK Government) produced in the Highlands and exported south of the border. The motion calls for a region-wide view of planning applications relating to electricity infrastructure and not simply allowing local, single applications to be considered piecemeal. 'A Real Time ONLINE Mapping of all applications within the knowledge of Council to be published on the Council website for members of the public to view. It will include all renewables developments.'

The map will present a 'big picture' overview of the applications that are currently in the pipeline, including but not limited to, all proposed electricity generation, storage and transmission developments, grid connection, energy generation stations, BESS, and wind farms.

The motion was only narrowly passed (33-31) but it could go a long way to preventing the Highlands once again being recklessly used and abused by multi-national corporations with little regard for the impact on the landscape and those who actually live and work here.

## **Local Place Plan Update**

Following the latest Black Isle Community Councils (BICC) meeting, on 23rd September 2024, we can confirm that nominations were accepted for at least three of the initial five 'Community Councillor' Directors of the BILPP Governance Body. They were Rebecca Richmond, Paige Shepherd and Theo Stratton. Two further nominations are being actively sought.

The BICC also agreed a recruitment process (including timescale) for the selection of five Black Isle community members and hopefully agreed the process for the appointment of an independent Chair of the Governance Body.

All the Black Isle Community Councils will be receiving the opportunity to discuss, question, contribute to and agree the final 'package' during October. Hopefully by then, the Highland Council will have confirmed the registration of the BILPP (already submitted), to which the BICC's Governance section can then be attached. It is hoped that all this can be finalised at the BICC's next meeting currently scheduled for 11th November 2024.

For many this will seem a complicated process and difficult to understand its relevance to everyday life on the Black Isle. But it is important and to clarify –

Although the BILPP does not have 'legal status', its adoption by Black Isle and Easter Ross Area Committee (BIER) means they have agreed to using it as a tool to inform and support decision making about the Black Isle.

The BILPP is both a Local Place Plan, in line with national Planning Legislation and an Area Place Plan in line with Highland's Place Based Framework.

The BILPP will be used in preparation of the Highland Local Development Plan (HLDP) as guided by the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019.

Once the Governing body has been established, they will begin the work of keeping the BILPP at the forefront of the Public Sector bodies' minds, when they are making decisions that affect the Black Isle. Community Councils and Community groups will be encouraged to refer to the BILPP when they are considering projects for their local area. There are lots of established groups on the Black Isle that will be capable of delivering aspects of the BILPP.

Once the BILPP is registered, the HC Planning team will also use it in the same way.

## **Refuse and Recycling Bins**

Since the Highland Council introduced the new system of recycling and delivered the new Grey bins for both residential and business use, there has been some confusion and debate.

What has also sometimes been misunderstood is the status and use of Cromarty 'Town' bins. These bins are distributed around the town and are meant to be used for general town litter, including bagged dog waste, only. These town bins can be either black (dark grey) or green (not helpful when there are plastics etc recycling green bins for residential and business use!), but all these Town bins should be labelled as such, with guidance as to what should and should not be put in. Cromarty has 17 of these Town bins (the C&DCC will shortly be publishing a location map on its Cromarty Live website and they are (hopefully!) uplifted every Tuesday. Cromarty is very fortunate to have these Town bins because, due to budget restrictions, they are no longer supplied by the Highland Council. So please make sure they are not misused (no excess residential waste and no garden waste) or we could lose them! The red 'dog waste' bins are also no longer supplied by the Highland Council, although the existing ones will be emptied into the Town bins for uplifting.

We appreciate that the reduced size non-recyclable waste grey bins and the Highland Council's continued

refusal/inability to make brown 'garden waste' bins available in Cromarty are challenges to residents. But we are working on meeting those challenges and hope to improve things in 2025.

Sadly, we need to prepare for winter weather, even if there are a few sunny days left!


The C&DCC Winter Resilience team start in the week commencing 14th October, as they get all the machinery and supplies ready for action.


If you are already a regular or previous volunteer to the gritting team, we hope you are willing and able again to

## Anger as chair dumped at 'UK's most remote fly tipping site'

Cromarty Harbour has spoken of its concern over littering in the area, which is a 240-year-old historical landmark. The swivel chair has been left and if it is not claimed it will be removed

## CAB Focus on . . . the Warmer Homes Scotland scheme

The Warmer Homes Scotland scheme can fund home improvements that include:

- wall insulation
- loft insulation
- draught-proofing
- central heating including new gas boilers or air source heat pumps
- renewables

Warmer Homes Scotland cannot fund work that's already been done, or work done by non-approved installers.

You can apply to Warmer Homes Scotland if you're a homeowner or private rental tenant and meet the eligibility requirements for both your household <u>and</u> home.

You need to have lived in your home for at least 6 months, unless you're terminally ill.

You cannot apply if you've been supported by Warmer Homes Scotland since October 2023.

Requirements for your household

You can apply if your household includes someone who's either:

- over 75 and has no central heating
- terminally ill
- receiving certain benefits

Requirements for your home

You can apply if your home meets all of the following criteria:

- it's in council tax band A to F
- · it's your main home
- it has a poor energy rating Warmer Homes Scotland can check this for you

- it has a floor area of 230m<sup>2</sup> or less
- it is fit to live in it has to meet the tolerable standard

Our Sunday roast are back and served 12-3 every Sunday.



## Cinema

Welcome to October! With the spooky season upon us, our cinema is packed with a mix of thrills, chills, and heartfelt stories across every genre.

We start off with a bang with **Kill**, where brothers in the Scottish Highlands decide to kill their cruel father. But is he really dead? And is someone now hunting them? In **The Critic**, Sir Ian McKellen stars as a powerful London theatre critic who lures a struggling actress into a blackmail scheme with deadly consequences. And of course, we're celebrating Halloween with two nights of **Beetlejuice Beetlejuice** madness. Get ready for laughs, frights, and a touch of eerie nostalgia.

Sci-fi horror **The Substance** explores the dangers of an experimental drug gone wrong. And in **Joker - Folie à Deux**, you can dive deep into the gritty, unsettling world of Gotham's infamous villain. Why not take a journey into the future with **Megalopolis**, a visionary sci-fi epic that explores the rise and fall of civilizations?

Music lovers won't want to miss **Since Yesterday**, a documentary uncovering the rich, yet often overlooked, history of Scotland's all-female bands. **Notes from Sheepland** follows a visual artist finding her creativity amidst the pressures of sustainable farming.

On Saturday 19th October we have a special presentation of **Strike: An Uncivil War** - which tells the story of the

#### **CRAFT**

Inverness based jeweller and tutor Ailsa Wilde is back in Cromarty teaching another silver jewellery weekend. You'll make a trio of silver stacking rings on day one and a silver bangle on day two.

DAY 1: Silver Stacking Rings

During the first half of day one you will be introduced to working with silver, developing skills in texturising and mark making through samples in copper and learning the hot connection process of soldering, by creating a texturised ring. This will be the first of your stacking rings. Over the second half of this workshop, you will develop and consolidate your fine jewellery skills through the making of two further silver rings, which will complete your trio of silver stacking rings.

#### DAY 2: Silver Bangle

During the first half of day two, you will be working with thicker silver wire, developing skills in texturising, mark making and soldering, by creating a silver bangle. Over the second half of the day, you will develop and consolidate your fine jewellery skills through texturising, filing and finishing of your silver bangle.

This course is suitable for complete beginners and the more advanced jeweller. £170, includes tea, coffee and all materials.

## Fogbows by Jeremy Price

On Wednesday morning, 18th September when we were experiencing some very warm early Autumn sunshine, I took the dogs for a walk along the Sutor Path next to the Reeds Park Loop in Cromarty. It was a misty morning and the sun was trying to burn off the haar that obscured the view across the Firth.

As I turned to walk back towards the town, a bright arc of light appeared ahead of me, much smaller than a rainbow and with no colour. I knew that this was a rare sighting of a fogbow, known also as Ghost Rainbows, White Rainbows or, to sailors, Sea Dogs. It was something I had long wanted to see, having ticked off the Broken Spectre and Glory – two other ghostly images caused by the direction of light on clouds.

Caused by light refracting through either ice or liquid water, the phenomena is comparatively rare and those lucky enough to see it will, like the Broken Spectre or Glory, remember it for ever! The dogs, however, remained unmoved and failed to uncover any pots of gold ...
