"What would I do with the money?" the old Greek asks. "Why, you could build yourself a big house and hire servants to do everything for you."



Film premier in Cell A

Thank you to everyone who filled in a survey for us; we had an astonishing 185 responses! They were overwhelmingly positive and will really help us as we develop our intentions for the museum's redevelopment as part of the feasibility process. We will update you on our next steps at the end of the feasibility stage in July.

In the meantime, Freya and the team have been busy refreshing Cell A and turning it into (possibly) Cromarty's smallest cinema so that we will have a space to show a newly commissioned film of life in Cromarty in the 1960s. We were awarded a grant from the Art Fund to work with an artist to turn a donation of cine film into a short narrative film about community life on the Black Isle. You may have seen the trailer in the Changing Tides exhibition but the **entire film will premier during Open Gardens** come and see how many faces you recognise!

We are delighted that our trustee, Liz Broumley, has been nominated as SCVO's Trustee of the Year 2025 for her hard work, dedication, and commitment to Cromarty Courthouse Museum.

Despite facing profound disability herself, Liz has dedicated herself full-time over the last three years to supporting the museum. She applied for funding for the first professional member of staff in over a decade whilst she led a ground-breaking project to create a free audio tour on Cromarty's links to slavery. Liz's deep care and advocacy for accessibility has informed our entire approach and ethos as a charity. Her vision and drive has taken us from facing closure to a redevelopment project in 13 months. She is generous and curious, and has been transformational to our museum.

Voting is now closed, and we await the awards ceremony on 19th June in Glasgow. Whatever the result, we are so proud that Liz has been nominated, recognising her incredible work as part of our board.

Historic museum celebrating World Ocean Day!

As we creep closer to the school holidays, Hugh Miller's Birthplace is gearing up for the **Summer of Science**! We have already started taking bookings for our school holiday kids club and citizen science beach walks - it seems everyone wants to explore the natural world with us. So we have added another special event this summer: join us on **Sunday 8th June for World Ocean Day**! This internationally recognised event celebrates the amazing worlds below the waves and the creatures that live in them. We will be hosting a series of activities that day at the museum; from kids crafts to inspire young ones, to displays of fossils from oceans long since vanished. We will also be using this day to launch the return of **Cromarty Coastal Critters** - our marine life and dolphin watching walking tour. Our World Ocean Day activities are included with admission with the exception of our **Critter's tour which requires online booking**.

We also have more brand new fossils, this time from England's Isle of Wight, that were kindly donated by Wight Coast Fossils - we have new dinosaurs! Visit us during the **first week in June** to see the tail from a Brachiosaur, and the bones from Iguanodon and Mantellisaurus! These fossils will be on display in our gift shop.

We have more good news too: in June we will be **open daily from 11am** (last entry 15:30) so you can enjoy Hugh Miller for even longer - and with Open Gardens weekend almost upon us, there is no better time to visit the birthplace of Cromarty's most famous historical individual.

Work starts on East Pier

Last Tuesday saw work start with our contractor Aberdeen Marine coming on site. That's the East Pier now closed to vessels and pedestrians. Whilst the work is scheduled for six months, the team are hopeful that if we have a good summer, it can be reduced. That doesn't mean longer workdays, just hopeful of good weather.

To remind readers, we are looking to replace damaged stones, remove patched infills, repoint in lime mortar, fill in voids, especially around the bullnose and to have two new sandstone staircases as our centre piece. Do all that and we will have secured the pier for future generations to enjoy. More information will be posted on cromartyharbour.org as the project progresses.

Lastly, we have added a **donation pillar at the West Pier entrance** which we hope will be supported by visitors looking to help us in our restoration efforts. The money raised only goes to restoration.





News from Nigg

The Red Zed1

On the 28th May, the Red Zed1 arrived in the Cromarty Firth to float off a cable barge from its deck.

The vessel sailed from the Far East and the ballasting operation to move the barge off the deck was conducted on the 29th May in the deep pocket of water between Nigg and Cromarty. The high voltage cables which are on the barge will be used to connect large infrastructure such as offshore wind farms into the national grid network. These are typical of the cables which will be manufactured at the Sumitomo factory.

Upon completion of the float-off operation, the barge will dock at the East Quay at Nigg, where one of the cables will be spooled off, and put into storage at the Port of Nigg. The other cable will be taken away for installation for an offshore wind project.

These "float-off" operations are impressive to see, and very technical to perform. A large number of tugs (6 in total) are utilised to prevent the large carrier vessel from turning with the tide, and others are used to safely hold and manoeuvre the barge from the deck of the carrier when it begins to float.
