## Oyster Plant (Mertensia maritima) ..

.. was supplied by Poyntzfield Herb Nursery for one of the cinema planters. However, it clearly didn't like being there, so removed itself to a crevice between the cinema wall and the paving, where it's thriving! Seaside plants, such as this one, often have difficulty finding enough water because of their proximity to the sea, creating a high concentration of salts (hence the similarity in taste to oysters). To reduce water loss as a result of the harsh winds in its exposed habitat, the oyster plant has tough, fleshy leaves presenting the minimum surface area and reducing evaporation.



# **Cromarty East Church**

## **Maintaining Scottish Churches**

An introductory one-day course, to explore how a historic building works and the practical steps that can be taken to look after it.

# Tuesday 16 September 10am - 3.30pm £14 including sandwich lunch

Caring for a historic building can feel like a never-ending task, but thankfully there are some simple steps you can take to keep your building in good condition and reduce the likelihood of large repair projects further down the line.

You'll be able to put your new knowledge into action right away, with a practical exercise looking at the host building inside and out to identify maintenance issues and areas of vulnerability. There will also be the opportunity to discuss your building with the course tutors and others attending.

Armed with a new understanding of how traditional buildings were constructed, how they work, and how they decay, you'll leave with the skills and confidence you need to spot and tackle common problems that put your old building at risk.

Who is this course for?

This course is aimed at those directly involved in the maintenance of church buildings in a voluntary capacity.

The morning session will be held at the **Cromarty Arts Trust, The Old Brewery, 19 Bank Street, Cromarty IV11 8YE.** This is directly opposite **Cromarty East Church, where we will be for the afternoon walk-about session.**

One service held recently was the funeral of Anne Short (Finlayson) M.B.E. Anne's passing is a sad loss to her Cromarty friends and our town as a whole. Her funeral, on Friday 15 August, at the East Church was packed out, a clear acknowledgement of the love and esteem in which she was held. However, many people were unable to hear, so here is a short summary of Anne's life...

Anne was born in 1938 in Cromarty Cottage Hospital, the eldest of four children, to Dan and Peggy Finlayson, one of the oldest Cromarty families, with ancestors going back generations.

After leaving Cromarty School, she trained to be a nurse and nursed at the Princess Margaret Rose Hospital in Glasgow. She returned home to Cromarty to nurse her mother.

Following this, her career path changed totally to camp management, firstly in Shetland (Sulom Voe) and ultimately leading to a challenging role in the Falkland Islands. In 1982, the company she worked for was awarded a contract to provide life support services to the contractors building the new airport in the Falkland Island after the war with Argentina. Looking after 1200 men on a remote island some 8000 miles from home was a huge task. Recruiting staff, arranging travel and setting up supply chains in the days of no internet was a role Anne could ably fulfil. She had many tales to tell of her decade working there.

On retirement, she threw herself into Cromarty life and was a stalwart of so many organisations: –

Community Council, Courthouse Museum, Care Project, Middleton Trust and also a key supporter of the many clubs and events here. Her lasting legacy was her stewardship of the Fourways Club – a founding member of the club when it was established in 1975. Fourways survives as a strong local organisation in its 50th anniversary year due to her hard work, determination and dedication over all those the years.

Her interest and support for Cromarty never wavered. In 2004, Anne received an M.B.E. from the Queen at Buckingham Palace, for services to charity – it was the honour of her life.

Graham retired in 2002 as Principal of Inverness College and published a book about Redcastle in 2009, the first of many books and articles. He specialises in the history of 'School Log Books' and 'Corrugated Iron Buildings' and has won awards for articles on his research.

His illustrated talk begins with the invention of corrugated iron sheeting and why its use became widespread across the Highlands from the 18th Century until after WW1.

Meetings begin at **7.30pm in the Victoria Hall,** Cromarty and are followed by refreshments. The fee for each talk is £5 but a whole year's membership costs only £15 for all 8 meetings. (Please bring cash.)

## **Scottish Geology Festival returns to Cromarty!**

Firstly a massive thank you to everyone who came along to our science experiment demonstrations at Cromarty Primary School's 150th birthday party; we hope you thoroughly enjoyed watching diet coke explode and rockets shoot into the sky! Exciting things have also been happening at the museum; our brilliant Charles Darwin letter made it onto the news as we are pleased to finally have it on display for visitors to see - you can find it in our Miller's Fossils Room.

September 1st marks the start of the 2025 Scottish Geology Festival, and Hugh Miller's is once again taking part in it. From the 31st August our new temporary exhibition goes on display inside the museum: "Stories in Stone: Fossils and their Folklore". This exhibition ties into the 190th anniversary of Hugh Miller's "Scenes and Legends" book and traverses the boundaries between fact and folklore; from snakestone ammonites to devilish toenails!

Fancy exploring the rocks and formations around Cromarty? Then our "Earth, Wind, and Fire" introductory tour to geology is the perfect activity for you. Taking place on **Tuesday 16th September** (a school in-service day too) let us take you across a billion years over the span of ninety minutes!

All this and more, including our beloved Fossil Walks, is taking place at the museum - check our Facebook and website for more details and to book on our events!

# **Cromarty Harbour's welcoming arms**

## A personal perspective

Our harbour has been embracing and safeguarding mariners and vessels, for trade and prosperity, for fishing, for many of our parents to commute to work at Nigg, and now for tourism and leisure for over 241 years.

The East Mole works are sorely needed to strengthen her arm, and not a moment too soon, since it was discovered that hollowing out of her foundations at the bullnose threatened her very existence.

As a curious local, keen to have my say about the harbour, especially with the preservation and renovations, I've been on a steep learning curve, talking recently to the handful of volunteers who are the Harbour Working Group. There's no doubt they are a salty bunch; dedicated, and committing daily hours to the harbour for no pay. None.

#### I've found out the following:

The current project is the culmination of years of the Chair and Treasurer's campaigning, writing of laborious bids, negotiations with funders and consultants, and nail-biting financial Tetris, with the added headache of finding match-funding.

It's to the credit of the Harbour Working Group and the Harbour Master's daily vigilance and maintenance, that safe usage, employment and play can continue. Operational costs are always on a financial knife edge. Into the future, more help, volunteering and passion will be needed, and these volunteers are a very hard act to follow.

And there's still danger to the structure, with the perilous state of the reinforced concrete Admiralty Pier, needing millions to make it good, with many frustrated efforts to find funding in a dire economic climate.

For me, the harbour and its fabric are part of the fabric of my life; playing on the piles, orange nylon line fishing with my Dad, taking Albert's boat to and from Nigg. And these days rowing, swimming and kayaking in her lee. I know I want the harbour to not just be preserved, but to be developed to haven the Cromarty generations to come. I think we might just need a call to arms to help that happen.

Find us by the ferry slipway, right next to the cinema and The Last Splash coffee shop.


We'll be open right through winter, with updated session times posted every two weeks on our website.

#### Other news

Since 2017, CCDT has steadily been able to do more for Cromarty. CCDT owns the Thrift Shop (run by volunteers), the Community Campsite (run by John & Rory, supported by Matt Grist & Ronald Young of the CCDT Board) and we manage the ferry slipways.

All of these bring in income which supports staff and new projects.

CCDT also works with others on the Community Sauna and the Community Garden (see other stories).

We employ six staff now. As well as John, Rory, Lindy, Jess and Helena; Hayley Muir coordinates community events and promotes the town of Cromarty to visitors. As we earn more of our own income, we hope to be able to offer more hours or more jobs to more people.
